April 15, 1946

Memorandum of telephone advice of Mr. Beresford of  $^{\mathrm{D}}.\mathrm{C}$ . Registration Board:

Exempt from registration in D.C. -

"Any officer or employee of the United States or District of Columbia practising architecture in that capacity alone."

Mr. Beresford Said:

"I think if he is consulting architect only and the work were to be done by either government architect or a registered architect here in the District of Columbia, then the consulting architect might not be required to be registered, provided he is registered in his home state."

"He would have to be a registered architect in the District of Columbia to prepare plans."

"To be exempt from registration, would have to be consultant with an officer or employee of the United States doing the actual work - or a private architect who is registered here in the District. In this case, do not think it would be necessary to be registered when acting only as consulting architect."

Mr. Beresford recommends that Mr. Neild write to the District Board for a decision in any case.

- (a) Since 1910 nominee has been recognized as outstanding authority on School Building design and construction, and has contributed greatly to the development of the modern school building, both elementary and high school. Examples of these buildings, numbering well over 100, are distributed throughout North and Central Louisiana.
- (b) Nominee has been recognized as an authority on the design and planning of courthouses (Ref. page 2, par. 10-3).
- (c) During past eight years, firm has planned ten major hospital projects, both public and privately owned. These buildings are noted for their efficient planning, choice of materials and finish.

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## Edward F. Neild-Artist of Construction

No other man in Shreveport's history has had a greater role in building and beautifying his city and his state than Edward Fairfax Neild, whose death Wednesday ended a brilliant architectural career that brought him national recognition.

The heart attack which claimed Mr. Neild's life came while he was in Kansas City on a mission which, in itself, attested to his professional eminence. At the time he was stricken he was preparing for a conference with an old personal friend, Former President Harry S. Truman, concerning plans for the proposed Truman Memorial Library.

In telling the Shreveport Journal of his personal grief over the death of Mr. Neild Wednesday, Mr. Truman recalled how the Shreveport architect happened to be engaged in 1929 or 1930 as a consultant for the construction of the Jackson County Courthouse in Kansas City. Mr. Truman related that he had visited in Shreveport while still a judge and was so impressed by the beauty of the new Caddo Parish Courthouse that he persuaded Mr. Neild, its architect, to give his professional attention to the Kansas City project. Out of this meeting more than 25 years ago there developed a friendship and respect which resulted in Mr. Neild's being engaged as a consulting architect for the remodeling of the White House while Mr. Truman was its occupant as President of the United States. Before his death Mr. Neild had the satisfaction of helping complete most of the plans for the Truman Memorial Library.

It would be impossible to list all of the magnificent structures with which Mr.

Neild and his associates have helped make Louisiana and other states beautiful. Among them, however, are such imposing buildings as those of the VA Hospital in Shreveport, the United States Post Office and Courthouse in Alexandria, county and parish courthouses in Phoenix, Ariz., Baton Rouge, Ruston, Alexandria, Winnsboro, Shreveport and Kansas City, the Louisiana State Office Building in Baton Rouge, the Louisiana State Exhibits Museum in Shreveport, the Baton Rouge General Hospital, Baptist Hospital Buildings in Alexandria, and State Hospital Buildings in Monroe, Pineville, Jackson and Greenwell Springs. Mr. Neild and members of his staff drew the plans for some of the most beautiful structures on the campuses of Louisiana State University and other state colleges, as well as for many of Shreveport's public schools.

The new 20-story Henry C. Beck Building in downtown Shreveport and the new nine-story Schumpert Sanitarium will stand with all his other structures as monuments to the memory of Mr. Neild, who was born in Shreveport Dec. 3, 1884, and who had maintained his home here all his life.

An artist of the construction world, Mr. Neild also was an outstanding churchman and civic leader. His contributions to the welfare of his community were immeasurable.

The Journal joins with Mr. Neild's many other friends in expressing sorrow at his passing. To his widow, Mrs. Ethel Land Neild; his daughter, Mrs. James A. Van Hook, and his son, Edward F. Neild Jr.and to all of his professional associates—we extend our condolences.

#### Edward Fairfax Neild, Sr.

Edward Fairfax Neild, Sr., was far more than the dean of Shreveport architects. He was nationally recognized in various fields of architecture but particularly as the designer of public, institutional and business

Mr. Neild's death at the age of 70 came in Kansas City where he had planned to confer with former President Harry S. Truman on the \$1,500,000 Truman Memorial Library building, for which ground already has been broken. In designing this structure Mr. Neild was associated with a Kansas City firm, but he was the chief architect.

Several years ago, when Mr. Truman was President, he called upon Mr. Neild to handle the architectural end of the remodeling of the White House at Washington. In the earlier lives of both men, Mr. Truman had summoned Mr. Neild to design the Jackson County (Missouri) Court House. This assignment for the county that includes both Kansas City and Independence, Missouri, the latter being Mr. Truman's lifelong residence, came as a result of Mr. Truman's admiration for the Caddo Parish Court House here in Shreveport, for which Mr. Neild also was the architect.

Mr. Neild has been a member of the American Institute of Architects since 1918 and in 1948 he was one of 20 architects of the entire nation selected by that Institute who were made Fellows of the Institute in special ceremonies conducted at Salt Lake City, Utah. This is one of the highest honors that can be accorded an American architect.

Born here of British parents, Mr. Neild made Shreveport his home and his business headquarters throughout his life. He loved this city and took a deep interest in its growth and development entirely aside from his natural desires to see it become archi-tectually beautiful. He was an active churchman, and so far as his time permitted, always willing to do his share in civic betterment of the community.

Mr. Neild's death will be regretted by a host of friends here and in the architectural field throughout the nation. The Times joins them in extending sympathy and condolences to those who survive him.

## E.F. Neild **Final Rites** Here Today

Noted Architect Dies Unexpectedly In Mo. Waiting to See Ex-President

Funeral services will be held today for Edward Fairfax Neild Sr., 70, dean of Shreveport architects who died unexpectedly in Kansas City, Mo., at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday shortly before a scheduled conference with former President Harry S. Truman.

Mr. Neild, according to word re-ceived by his family here, apparently was stricken with a heart attack as he was preparing for the conference. His body was found on the bathroom floor by a bellboy he had sent for ice water. He was

staying at the Kansas City Club.
Mr. Neild had left Shreveport
Tuesday night and had arrived in
Kansas City early Wednesday
morning. He had gone immediately
to the Kansas City Club to fresher up before conferring with the former President over plans for the Harry S. Truman Memorial Li-brary building.

Truman, when notified of Mr. Neild's death, termed it "a great shock."

"I was very fond of him and very close to him," the former chief executive said. "He was a great architect. I feel the loss as deeply as if he had been a member of my own family."

The former President recalled that he first met Mr. Neild in 1929 or 1930 while touring to inspect courthouses prior to the construc-tion of the Jackson County, Mo., courthouse. He said he was so impressed by the beauty of the Caddo Parish courthouse, designed by Mr. Neild, that he contacted him to design the Jackson County building.


Later, Mr. Neild served as consulting architect for the rehabilitation of the White House.

Mr. Neild, who had been engaged in the practice of architecture continuously since 1908, had designed some of the best known buildings in Shreveport as well as in many other cities of Louisiana and else-

where in the nation. Friends said he had suffered a

heart attack about one year ago but had seemingly recovered without ill effects and was engaged actively in the practice of his profession at the time of his death.

He was working on plans for the new Shreveport Club, to be erected adjacent to the Henry C. Beck Building, recently. His firm also designed the new Schumpert Sanitarium, now under construction, as well as the Broadmoor Baptist Church. Mr. Neild was a native and life-long resident of Shreveport. He was born here on Dec. 3, 1884, a son of the late George Frederick Neild of Liverpool, England, and Mrs. Elizabeth Moss Neild, daughter of a prominent Versailles, Ky., family.

He was educated in the public schools of Shreveport and was a graduate of the engineering school of Tulane University. He earned his bachelor of science degree in 1906 and later traveled extensively in Europe in pursuit of his study of architecture and allied arts.

From 1908 to 1934, Mr. Neild had practiced architecture on an individual basis, but since 1934 he had been practicing as senior partner of the firm of Neild-Somdal-Associates. His partner in the firm, Dewey A. Somdal, is in Europe at

the present time.

Mr. Neild had been a member of the American Institute of Architects since 1918, and in 1948 he was among 20 distinguished architects made fellows of the institute in ceremonies conducted in Salt Lake City, Utah. This is one of the highest honors that can be accorded any architect, and Mr. Neild was cited at that time as "one of the chief influences in elevating the standard of civic design in his state.'

Former President Truman said most of the plans for the Truman Memorial Library already had been worked out by Mr. Neild and Lon Gentry, partner in the Kansas City firm, and no delay is antici-

pated.

Gentry said Mr. Neild had telephoned him from Union Station in Kansas City shortly after his arrival there and had made arrangements to meet him for breakfast as soon as he had freshened up from the trip. His body was found a short while later. Coroner Joe Conners of Kansas City investigated and said a request for a post mortem examination would be made to Mr. Neild's family.
Mr. Neild, who resided at 1075

Erie St., was a member of the Shreveport Club and the Shreve-port Country Club. He also was a member of St. Mark's Episcopal Church. He had served as a director of the Shreveport Chamber of Commerce from 1947 to 1950 and, throughout his life, had been a patron of the arts.

By political affiliation, he was a Democrat although he never engaged actively in politics. He had been a personal friend of Truman

for many years.
Mr. Neild's firm designed Japanese relocation centers for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at Rohwer, Ark., and Jerome, Ark., during World War II.

The U.S. post office and court-ouse at Alexandria and the house at courthouses in Baton Rouge and Phoenix, Ariz., also are examples of his work.

Locally, his outstanding works include the Veterans Administration Hospital and the Caddo Parish courthouse. The Louisiana State Exhibit Building on the Fair Grounds also was designed by Neild.

Other examples of his work are

the following: Baton Rouge General Hospital, Baton Rouge; Baptist Hospital buildings, Alexandria; the Louisiana State Office Build-ing, Baton Rouge; hospital build-ings for the state of Louisiana in Monroe, Pineville, Jackson and Greenwell Springs; numerous buildings on the campus of Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, and many buildings on the campus of Louisiana College at Pineville.

In addition, he also designed many public school buildings, office buildings, hotels, churches and commercial structures throughout the state.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Ethel Land Neild, whom he married in 1907; his son, Edward Neild Jr.; one daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Neild Van Hook; five grandchildren, Edward Neild III, Helen Neild, Patricia Neild, James A. WERE CO-ARCHITECTS — A Shreveport, La., architectural firm, Neild & Somdal shared the responsibility with the Kansas City firm of Gentry & Voskamp in the planning and designing of the Truman Library. The architects' preliminary plans were drawn up for a site at the Truman farm near Grandview.

Mr. Truman's first connection with Neild & Somdal was back in the late 20's when he heard about the courthouse the firm had built at Shreveport. He inspected it personally and the firm together with a Kansas City firm got the job for designing the present Independence courthouse.

When Mr. Truman moved into the White House he named Edward Neild to membership on the National Commission of Fine Arts, which is charged with maintaining high standards of building design in the Capital City. Also during this early period the White House was renovated and in the early discussion of this problem, Mr. Truman called on Mr. Neild for advice.

When plans for the Library got under way Mr. Truman again called on his old friend, Edward Neild. On July 6, just a year ago, Mr. Neild died unexpectedly in a Kansas City hotel while here in con-

From the time of his graduation to his death, he practiced his profession in Shreveport; however, planning commissions carried him into many states in the country.
