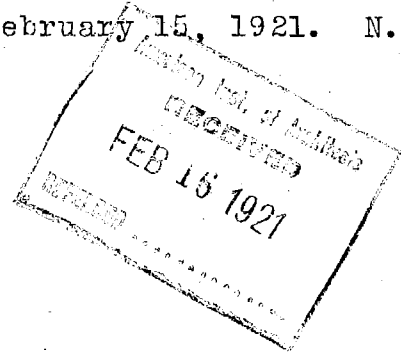

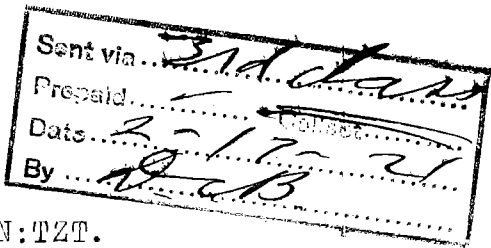
Dear Mr. Kemper:

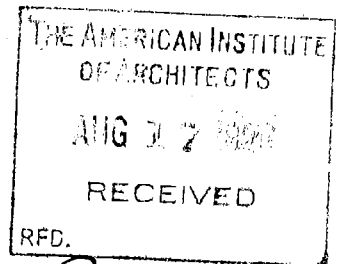
