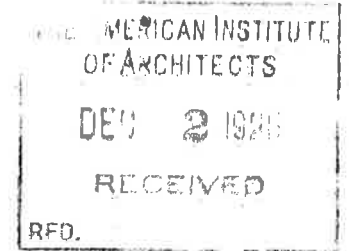

at the termination of the year.

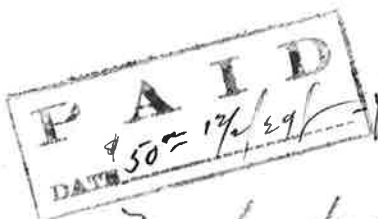
I have felt for some time that I
