Gentlemen:

It is a great pleasure for me to endorse the nomination of Mr. Joseph J. Patterson for Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects in the category of Design and Education.

Prior to the time I first knew Mr. Patterson he was a member of the Architectural Department at Oklahoma A & N College, now known as Oklahoma State University. Four of his former students at the college became members of the faculty and are still playing notable roles in the advancement of its School of Architecture. At the present time, Mr. Patterson is showing his interest in Education as active Director of the Architects-in-Training Program of the Fort Worth Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and is doing an excellent job.

Mr. Patterson has designed many structures. One of his recent and most notable projects is the Fort Worth Children's Museum. This building, the first of its kind in the United States to be designed exclusively for a Junior Museum, required years of research and planning. Problems unique to this type of museum had to be solved. It has been commended by many Junior Museum authorities, including the founder of the Brooklyn Children's Museum, the first in the world. As the result of his work on this building, as well as for other research and planning done in collaboration with Director Wm. G. Hassler of the Fort Worth Children's Museum and with Mr. John Ripley Forbes, of the Hornaday Foundation for Junior Museums, the nominee was appointed Consulting Architect for the Foundation in 1954.

"Pat" is a member of Phi Kappa Phi (Honorary Scholastic), Sigma Tau (Honorary Engineering), and Alpha Rho Chi (Professional Architectural).

He is also active in A.I.A. affairs, serving as President of the Chapter in 1950 and was appointed to complete the term of the late Hubert Hammond Crane as Chapter Director of the Texas Society of Architects in 1959. "Pat" is now serving in that capacity in the first year of his three-year elective term. He has represented the Chapter as delegate to the National Conventions of 1949, 1950, 1951, 1955, 1956, 1957 and 1959. In addition he has served on many, many committees of the local Chapter.


I have known Mr. Patterson for thirty years and during this period I have been

Gentlemen:

I am writing as a member of the Executive Committee of The Fort Worth Chapter A.I.A., and past president of the Chapter, in support of the nomination for Fellowship in the Institute of Joseph J. Patterson, of Fort Worth. Our Chapter is particularly desirous of having Mr. Patterson so honored because we have for many years, recognized his great contributions to the profession of Architecture, particularly in the fields of "Design" and "Education", and we feel that he is richly deserving of this advancement.

Having been associated with the field of Architecture for 50 years since he first entered the office of John McCoy, Architect in Danville, Illinois, at the age of 16, "Pat" is considered the "Dean" of Architects in this area, but still exhibits the youth and vigor which is necessary to inspire the younger Architects who come under his guidance either as employer or through the Architect-In-Training Program which he is so ably running for the Fort Worth Chapter in his capacity as Chairman of the Chapter Affairs Committee and Chapter Director of the Texas Society of Architects. "Pat" was well prepared for his present Chapter assignment through his eight years of teaching "Architectural Design" at the now Oklahoma State University, leaving as a legacy for that institution, four of his former students as members of the faculty of the College of Architecture.

In the field of "Design", "Pat" is known as an expert in Ecclesiastical Architecture, which is his first love. He has designed outstanding churches in almost all of the various Architectural periods including English Gothic, Byzantine, Georgian and Contemporary. Almost all of the large residences built in the Westover Hills area of Fort Worth (the elite residential area of the city during the 20's) were designed by Mr. Patterson and have stood the test of time. They are still the most attractive residences in the city. His "Childrens Museum", for the city of Fort Worth, has been acclaimed one of the outstanding buildings

It has come to my attention that Mr. Joseph Julian Patterson of this City has been nominated for elevation to Fellowship.


I have been personally acquainted with Mr. Patterson for nearly forty years. I first knew him when, as head of the Department of Architecture at the Oklahoma A & M College, Mr. Patterson served under me as Assistant Professor in Architectural Design. Some years later, when I had joined the firm of Sanguinet, Staats and Hedrick, Architects of Fort Worth, Texas, I was instrumental in securing Mr. Patterson to serve as designer for that firm and he continued with the successor firm, Wyatt C. Hedrick, Inc. He later practiced in his own right for a short period of time and then as senior partner of the firm Patterson and Teague. This partnership was later dissolved and he formed a partnership with Edward L. Wilson under the firm name of Wilson and Patterson. This firm has continued since its inception in 1939, with a possible exception of a short period during the war, and has now been expanded, becoming Wilson, Patterson, Sowden, Dunlap and Epperly.

In my opinion, Mr. Patterson is a very competent Architect and Architectural Designer. While he has a number of outstanding projects to his credit, he is particularly to be commended for the Fort Worth Children's Museum which was planned under his immediate direction. This building has been commended by many authorities and as a result of that work he was appointed Consulting Architect to the Hornaday Foundation for Junior Museums.

In addition to his work in architectural design, Mr. Patterson is vitally interested in architectural education and is active Director of the Architect-In-Training Program of the Fort Worth Chapter, American Institute of Architects.

I strongly recommend elevation of Mr. Joseph J. Patterson to the position of Fellowship.

## BIOGRAPHICAL DATA

JOSEPH JULIAN PATTERSON WAS BORN IN DANVILLE, ILLINOIS ON MAY 3, 1894. HE ATTENDED DANVILLE HIGH SCHOOL AND THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, RECEIVING THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN ARCHITECTURE IN 1917.

HE REGISTERED FOR THE MASTER OF ARCHITECTURE DEGREE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS, WITH PROVISION FOR STUDY, IN ABSENTIA, AT OKLAHOMA A & M COLLEGE WHERE HE JOINED THE ARCHITECTURAL FACULTY IN 1917. HIS THESIS WAS "AN EPISCOPAL CATHEDRAL AND ITS SUBSIDIARY BUILDINGS." THIS WAS CARRIED TO ABOUT 75% COMPLETION BUT WAS NOT FINISHED BECAUSE HE LEFT THE FIELD OF EDUCATION IN 1925 AND THE NECESSITY FOR THE DEGREE BECAME LESS IMPORTANT.

HE WAS ORIGINALLY REGISTERED IN 1919, BY EXAMINATION, BY THE DEPARTMENT OF REGISTRATION AND EDUCATION OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS. THIS LICENSE IS NOW INACTIVE. HE IS PRESENTLY REGISTERED IN THE STATES OF TEXAS AND OKLAHOMA AND HAS COMPLETED ALL BUT THE FINAL STEP FOR NCARB REGISTRATION.

THE NOMINEE BEGAN WORKING IN THE OFFICE OF JOHN MCCOY, ARCHITECT, OF DANVILLE, ILLINOIS, AT THE AGE OF 16. HE CONTINUED TO WORK ON SATURDAYS AND DURING THE SUMMER VACATIONS ALL THROUGH THE REMAINDER OF HIS HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE LIFE, BEING EMPLOYED BY SEVERAL ARCHITECTURAL FIRMS IN DANVILLE, CHAMPAIGN, AND CHICAGO, ILLINOIS.

HE WAS A DESIGNER FOR MUNDIE AND JENSON OF CHICAGO, WHEN HE WAS OFFERED THE POSITION OF INSTRUCTOR IN ARCHITECTURE AT OKLAHOMA A & M COLLEGE IN THE FALL OF 1917 AND ACCEPTED THE APPOINTMENT.

WHILE A MEMBER OF THE COLLEGE FACULTY, HE DID A LIMITED PRACTICE IN PARTNERSHIP WITH F. W. REDLICH.

IN 1925, HE RESIGNED FROM HIS COLLEGE POST TO ACCEPT THE POSITION AS DESIGNER FOR SANQUINET, STAATS AND HEDRICK, OF FORT WORTH, TEXAS, LATER BECOMING A PARTICIPATING MEMBER OF THE SUCCESSOR FIRM, WYATT C. HEDRICK, INC.

IN 1932, HE OPENED HIS OWN OFFICE AND IN 1934 FORMED THE PARTNERSHIP OF PATTERSON AND TEAQUE.

IN 1939, THIS PARTNERSHIP WAS DISSOLVED AND HE FORMED A PARTNERSHIP WITH EDWARD L. WILSON UNDER THE FIRM NAME OF WILSON AND PATTERSON.

IN 1952, THREE ASSOCIATES WERE ADDED, THE FIRM BECOMING, WILSON, PATTERSON AND ASSOCIATES. THE ASSOCIATES WERE MADE FULL PARTNERS IN 1954 AND THE FIRM NAME IS NOW, WILSON, PATTERSON, SOWDEN, DUNLAP, AND EPPERLY.

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IN THE DESIGNING OF THE FORT WORTH CHILDREN'S MUSEUM, THE NOMINATORS FEEL THAT THE NOMINEE HAS CONTRIBUTED NOTABLY TO THE ADVANCEMENT OF THE PROFESSION OF ARCHITECTURE. THIS BUILDING, THE FIRST OF ITS KIND IN THE UNITED STATES TO BE DESIGNED EXCLUSIVELY FOR A JUNIOR MUSEUM, REQUIRED YEARS OF RESEARCH AND PLANNING. PROBLEMS UNIQUE TO THIS TYPE OF MUSEUM HAD TO BE SOLVED. IT HAS BEEN COMMENDED BY MANY JUNIOR MUSEUM AUTHORITIES, INCLUDING THE FOUNDER OF THE BROOKLYN CHILDREN'S MUSEUM, THE FIRST IN THE WORLD. AS THE RESULT OF HIS WORK ON THIS BUILDING, AS WELL AS FOR OTHER RESEARCH AND PLANNING DONE IN COLLABORATION WITH DIRECTOR WM. G. HASSLER OF THE FORT WORTH CHILDREN'S MUSEUM, AND WITH MR. JOHN RIPLEY FORBES, OF THE HORNADAY FOUNDATION FOR JUNIOR MUSEUMS, THE NOMINEE WAS APPOINTED CONSULTING ARCHITECT FOR THE FOUNDATION IN 1954.

THE NOMINEE BECAME A MEMBER OF THE FACULTY OF THE ARCHITECTURAL DEPARTMENT OF THE OKLAHOMA A & M COLLEGE IN THE FALL OF 1917. WITH THE EXCEPTION OF TIME SPENT IN ARMY SERVICE, HE REMAINED THERE UNTIL THE SUMMER OF 1925, ADVANCING FROM THE RANK OF INSTRUCTOR TO THAT OF ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR.

IN THE OPINION OF THE NOMINATORS, THE BEST EVIDENCE OF HIS INFLUENCE IN THE FIELD OF ARCHITECTURAL EDUCATION IS THE FACT THAT FOUR OF HIS FORMER STUDENTS BECAME FACULTY MEMBERS OF THEIR ALMA MATER, NOW KNOWN AS OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY, AND HAVE PLAYED, AND ARE STILL PLAYING, NOTABLE ROLES IN THE ADVANCEMENT OF ITS SCHOOL OF ARCHITECTURE TO THE POSITION OF EXCELLENCE AND IMPORTANCE IT NOW ENJOYS.

THE NOMINEE IS STILL VITALLY INTERESTED IN THE FIELD OF EDUCATION. HE IS NOW SERVING AS THE ACTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE ARCHITECT-IN-TRAINING PROGRAM, THE FORT WORTH CHAPTER'S MAJOR PROJECT.

HONORARY AND PROFESSIONAL FRATERNITIES OF WHICH HE IS A MEMBER ARE: PHI KAPPA PHI (HONORARY SCHOLASTIC), SIGMA TAU (HONORARY ENGINEERING), AND ALPHA RHO CHI (PROFESSIONAL ARCHITECTURAL).

THE NOMINEE HAS ALWAYS BEEN MOST ACTIVE IN INSTITUTE AFFAIRS ON BOTH CHAPTER AND REGIONAL LEVELS. HE SERVED HIS CHAPTER AS PRESIDENT IN 1950 AND WAS APPOINTED, IN 1959, TO COMPLETE THE TERM OF THE LATE HUBERT HAMMOND CRANE, FAIA, AS CHAPTER DIRECTOR OF THE TEXAS SOCIETY OF ARCHITECTS. HE IS NOW SERVING IN THAT CAPACITY IN THE FIRST YEAR OF HIS THREE-YEAR ELECTIVE TERM. HE HAS REPRESENTED THE CHAPTER AS DELEGATE TO THE NATIONAL CONVENTIONS OF 1949, 1950, 1951, 1955, 1956, 1957, AND 1959. IN ADDITION HE HAS SERVED ON MANY COMMITTEES, AMONG OTHERS THE FOLLOWING:


I have known Joe Patterson since 1946. I feel his contribution to Architecture as a profession is indeed impressive.

Mr. Joseph J. Patterson has been nominated by the Forth Worth Chapter of A.I.A. for a Fellowship in the categories of Design and Education. I wish to add my endorsement of his candidacy of this nomination, as I feel this nomination has long been overdue.

Mr. Patterson was in charge of design in architecture here at Oklahoma State University (then known as Oklahoma A. & M. College) when I enrolled in the School of Architecture as a freshman, in the fall of 1921. The next four years he spent in progressively teaching us the basic functions of planning and composition sensitivity of design, particularly the consciousness of human scale, proportion of architectural masses, the sculptural play of light and shadow of exterior masses and the change of scale necessary for the more intimate needs of the interiors. He taught us relationship of building to building, of landscape-textural uses of materials, their characteristics of usage, color and aging.

Mr. Patterson's method of teaching design has much to offer us to-day, in my way of thinking. He firmly expected the student to develop his own design concepts, and then, and not until then, were his efforts criticized. This criticism was complete, giving the student a growing base of self criticism, a most important development. This proved its worth in the eras of conflict that were to come to our profession, the traditional over contemporary. Those of my classmates who survived this revolution, with myself, feel a deep debt of gratitude to Mr. Patterson, a practical and gifted design teacher.

Mr. Patterson was my lone instructor in architectural design during my entire years of formal professional studies.

Again, he reflected such a love for the profession, as well as the cultural fabric of life. He brought this enthusiasm and inspiration into the classroom, giving us a relish for the arts, respect for the religious and a desire for a broader conception of life.

All of my remarks above have been about my relationship with Mr. Patterson when he was my instructor. Since that time, and that has been more than three decades ago, I have been very much aware of his continuing to mature and develop throughout the ensuing years. I have attended the Texas Society of Architects' meetings, as well as architectural school meetings in that state, and have been deeply impressed with the influence he has had on the profession there. I find I do not stand alone in my overall appreciation of his unselfish sharing of his excellent talents to our Institution and profession, but am joined by my former classmates, as well as those many people who have worked with him in his chosen state. His influence has had a lasting and fine effect on the profession in many ways. Some of these are as follows:

He brought to our School of Architecture its first real approach to architectural design and appreciation of the aesthetics of the profession.

His former students attest to his helpful influence in their professional lives. Many of them are either heads or principles of distinguished architectural firms, at least a few are teachers of architecture. In our own School, three of us are teachers and were classmates. We are in complete agreement as to Mr. Patterson's initial influence in our choice of the teaching profession. One of us, Raymond E. Means, Professor of Architectural Engineering, has been recognized particularly for his work in soils analysis. His articles on his research in this field has been widely published, most recently in South America. Another one of us, John Rex Cunningham, Professor of Architectural Design, was given the award for outstanding service to the profession in the field of teaching, this recognition coming from your College of Fellows, A.I.A. This was one of the first awards given, I believe.

I feel it an honor to have been a friend and former student of Mr. Patterson, and hope to see him a Fellow in the American Institute of Architects.

Gentlemen:

This is written in support of the nomination of Joseph J. Patterson for Fellowship which has been made by the Fort Worth, Texas, Chapter. In my opinion this nomination is highly merited and somewhat overdue.

His nominators and others I am sure have given complete biographical information concerning his career and have listed in such information the all too short period which he spent in formal teaching. They have also detailed his work in the Institute and his accomplishments as a designer to all of which he has brought skill, capacity and enthusiasm of very high degree.

I was associated with him throughout his "formal" teaching experience, for approximately one year as a difficult student and for the rest of the time as an instructor working daily with him, and it is to his contribution to the difficult and frequently inaccurately appreciated work of training others to competently practice our complicated craft that I wish to attest.

While the biographical statement will indicate this teaching experience to have covered a period of but approximately seven years, this does not give an accurate picture for he has always been a teacher or mentor. 
