Dear Mr. Payne:

Your letter of January 11 to Mr. Kemper relating to the delinquent members in your Chapter was forwarded to me, with the suggestion that I might want to supplement his letter of acknowledgement to you.

The Treasurer appreciates the survey you have made of the members, and wishes that such an analysis would be made in all the Chapters. Such analyses would be most helpful to us in Washington and I know they would be educational to the Chapter officers who make the surveys. So far as I know, your survey is the third out of all the Chapters effected by the motice of November 50 to delinquents of two years or more, and only one other than yours seems to have been as thoroughly made.

The conclusions you have reached bear out most emphatically the records at the Octagon. Practically two-thirds of our members pay their dues within the first four menths of the year. Of the balance a certain percentage always wait until the last minute of the last notice before they forward enough dues to held their memberships. They are the ones who are on the delinquent list when times are good and when times are bad they are the ones who take advantage of the leniency shown to those members who are actually unable to pay their dues. You have found some such members in your own survey.

Then as you have also found there are always some members who are temporarily embarrassed and deserving of every aid. They have been faithful members of The Institute and their Chapters, meeting their professional and financial obligations as they should. Suddenly some of them find they are without business, and with families to support and children to educate. When the depression is as long as the one through which we are passing, they must use every cent for living from day to day. They can not pay The Institute dues, and they should not. Membership in The Institute is a financial burden under those circumstances. The Treasurer can not too strongly emphasize that The Institute is really aiding such a member financially when it refuses to let him continue a membership that it feels is an everincreasing burden to him.

These times bring out that the member desires to hold on to his Institute membership after he seems to have given up everything else, and it makes it very hard for the Board to act in the manner it is convinced is the best for the member and for The Institute. Invariably it has extended the time of making the dues payments long beyond the period contemplated under the By-Laws, but there finally comes a time when The Institute, from its seventy-five years of dues collecting experience, knows that the member is accumulating an indebtedness that he will not meet; or if he does meet it, that will entail a burden that he probably should not have undertaken.

For his own peace of mind, the Treasurer wishes there was some way and some means provided by which The Institute could carry its worthy members through such times as this. Unfortunately, no such ways and means have been provided, and therefore the Board must rely on its experience and act in its best judgment accordingly. The Treasurer is going to propose that a fund be set up for this purpose, but that will not help the present troubles.

I did not intend to write a long latter to you when I started, but now that I have gone this far I would like to have you bear with me a little longer so I can set out to you the attitude of the Board and just what can be done for the membership under the present conditions.

Some of the Chapters are deploring the attitude of The Institute in not granting greater lemiency during this time of stress. If they could sit in a meeting of the board where the matters of delinquent dues are discussed, they would realize that that attitude is as far as can be from the attitude with which the Board approaches the problem. It is fully aware of the conditions in your State and is deeply sympathetic with the problems of its members in that State, but the Board knows if it permitted the members who owe \$50 to increase their indebtedness to \$75, as must automatically happen on the first day of January each year, that it would lose the members anyway, and that less than 5% of them will return. It also knows that when a member owes \$100 he will not pay, or return. On the other hand, it knows, if a member is not permitted to owe more than \$25, that the number of members who pay, or having paid will return, will be larger than would be the case if they owed the greater amounts. I am speaking, of course, of averages, and not of individual cases.

The Board always hesitates to deny a member the privileges of the Institute because he can not meet his financial obligations to it, and it does not ever do so without giving him and his Chapter ample notices of the default and the liability that the member incurs if the default continues. Nor has it failed to heed a Chapter's request for leniency in any particular case and to comply with it when it could do so in fairness to the rest of the membership.

It is apparent that the local officers of a Chapter have the opportunity of knowing the circumstances of their own men better than any one in Washington. The Chapter knows its members who are actually deserving of help and is in a batter position to help those members than is The Institute. Several of the Chapters are now helping their members. In at least one of them it has been the practice for those members who can afford to do so to advance the money to may the defaulted dues of these deserving men, as private loans. I know of another Chapter where a procedure on somewhat similar lines is now being carried on, by means of a voluntary revolving fund. The Institute has suggested that it will accept notes for the defaulted dues, and I believe has never refused one when offered, although we are aware that a great percentage of the notes so given will never be paid. At the same time I am not aware of a single case where these private loans have been defaulted; the members will pay the private loans where they will not pay the notes to The Institute.

We often find members who are keeping their Chapter dues up to date, but who are not paying their Institute dues. Many of them are quite frank in stating that under those circumstances The Institute should carry them. That attitude is not defensible and quite often a remission of the Chapter dues will enable a member to be carried through his Institute year.

The Chapter and The Institute may remit dues. The Board may remit The Institute dues of any member for a current year, but it has rarely done so unless sickness or other critical emergency has made it impossible for him to practice during the year. Nor does it remit such dues unless the Chapter has remitted its Chapter dues to such member, and has recommended to the Board that it shall remit The Institute dues. Remission of dues is not encouraged, but the board is open-minded with respect to each individual case.

While the action with respect to delinquent members taken by The Institute can not be recalled, we are assuring them that the action will not close the way to a complete restoration of the membership, without formality. We are telling them that such as liquidate their indebtedness within the next sixty or ninety days will be carried on the Institute records as members without lapse, and furthermore that the Treasurer does not doubt that The Institute will carry the names of such delinquent members as the Chapter requests through the year 1932, on the condition that each of them that liquidates his indebtedness before the end of that year will be restored to a member without lapse, and that those who do not do so will

have the termination of their membership recorded as of December 31, 1931. The latter event will therefore not add the dues of 1932 to their indebtedness and make it that much easier for them to come back. No petition for readmission will be necessary; the check or note of the member will be sufficient to have his record cleared.

While of course it will be necessary for the delinquents to clear their records before they can become of good standing again in The Institute, nevertheless the Board will accept the payment of their indebtedness in installments as low as \$5 a year, if that will be of help.

The Treasurer notes you are arranging the affairs of the South Texas Chapter so you can carry on with a reduction of more than 50% of the dues of your members. This is a most commendable budgeting action and again you have shown the way for other Chapters to act. Why don't you get a letter out to each of the Chapters stating that you have found it feasible to do this thing, and suggesting that it might be a way out of some of their difficulties?

It is much more feasible for the Chapter to cut down than it is for The Institute. Strange as it may seem, the members require considerable more correspondence and other work to be done at the Octagon during these slack times, than they do during the times when they are all busy. On that account. The Institute has not yet felt it justifiable to out down the clerical and stenographic force, and, of course, it can not very well do without Er. Kemper and his assistant. The activities of the Educational Committee are paid for by trust funds. The structural service work could be reduced by doing away with the man in charge of that work, but the Board has hesitated to do that, for it would entirely oripple the department. The only other thing left is to reduce the meetings of the Board and the Executive Committee, or else to ask the members to pay their own railroad fares and expenses at the meetings. I am sure it is not right that the directors and officers who are giving so much of their time should be asked to make that further sacrifice, nor could they afford to do so in most cases. We have been able to omit one executive meeting for each of the last two years, but that seems to be the limit. So it is harder for The Institute to economize, with its headquarters and personnel to maintain, than it is for the Chapters, which have no such overhead expense. Mevertheless, if the present times continue, there is no doubt that The Institute will have to give up some of its personnel.

If you have read this far you have been very patient, and I have quite a load off my chest. I am looking forward to seeing you in April and surely hope you will get up to Washington.

Undoubtedly the attached clipping from the February Forum has either been read by you or brought to your attention previously.

It is not necessary for me to state that a ruling such as has been made in the Michigan Circuit Court with respect to our Contract Forms is of wide spread interest and at the same time very personal interest throughout our membership.

Specifically it has reminded me of a recent contention by a Texas Attorney, which while it did not tend to invalidate the force and effect of a Contract prepared on our forms; did raise the contention that a Contract so drawn represented an attempt by Architects to practice law, contrary to the laws of the State of Texas.

Opinion of counsel and consideration by applicable Institute Committees seems dictated under the circumstances.

Institute Documents repeatedly state that the preparation of Contracts is a function of the Architect and AIA. #177 particularly states "and the preparing of Contracts". If it should be that you can make a direct reply to this letter or make reply through pertinent agency, it would be personally appreciated by me. This I state knowing full well that you are operating under a very busy schedule. None-the-less the value and the continued use of Institute Documents is certainly at stake and in jeopardy.

His career presents an inspiring picture of service to his fellow man both within and without the profession which, in the judgment of his sponsors, eminently qualifies him for advancement to the rank of Fellow.

Services to the Chapter -

Harry's services to the Houston Chapter have contributed materially to its growth and development. As Treasurer and Director in its formative years he helped put the Chapter on a sound financial basis and make it a significant factor in the professional life of the architects of this locality. He worked vigorously and effectively for the passage of the Texas Architects Registration Act. The Houston Chapter Group Insurance Plan which he conceived, sponsored and guided to its present success has drawn architects and draftsmen together in a common cause, developing mutual understanding, stimulating Chapter progress and relieving the distress of individual architects and their families in hundreds of emergency situations. Harry's concern with the architect's responsibilities to his co-workers. clients, contractors and the general public led to the expansion of the Chapter Insurance program to include the dissemination of information on all forms of professional liability and means of protection, and has done much to create a new consciousness of responsibility on the part of the profession.

Services to the Texas Society Harry was a founder and charter member of the Texas Society of
Architects. As first chairman of the School Plant Committee,
he took a leading part in the establishment of the research and
development work in school design which has borne fruitful
results both educationally and architecturally in this area.
By adapting the Houston Chapter Insurance Plan to the needs of
the state he has enlarged this program to include some 1250
architects, draftsmen and dependents, many of whom have shared
in the \$140,000 in benefits which have been secured and distributed since 1949. Harry's personal contribution to this work,
as intermediary between participants and the insurance carrier
is widely recognized, as are his continuing efforts to make the
program of increasing value and significance to the profession
in Texas.



Dear Bernice, Win, and my favorite Piano Virtuosi:

This is addressed to your home, for the reason that I deem each of you will be interested, because I have not responded to your prompt good wishes (appreciated message of 'prayers, esteem, and affection') bearing date of August 26; and Win's ps. of October 18, reporting Bill Scheick's observations as to my appearance in course of TSA. San Antonio Convention.

The very few visitors admitted while I was in the oxygen tent for three weeks, and my nurses, all told me I looked wonderfully well, and I suppose that I was because I was having evrything in the world poured into me. I continue to look well, all probably due to the fact I had nothing against me physically at the time of the attack, having been assured of this in course of a thorough examination just four days prior to the attack. Also, undoubtedly this is due to the perfectly magnificant attention I have received and had accorded to me.

I will dwell on this but a little further. The attack was more than the mild& affair described or as appraised by my Doctor, probably in order that Margie, our children, and even I might not be unduly disturbed. In the ambulance, on the way to the hospital (though suffering tremendously), I made certain I had not lost any use of my arms, legs, hands, feet and mind. Never at any time fearing I had reached or approached the termination of my journey, on that trip I did repeat over and over in my mind the Apostles' Creed, in ascertainment that my mind was functioning. For no reason which I can reconcile, the emergency room staff kept asking as to whether or not I had blacked-out, which I hadn't.

The foregoing reads as though I might be in a state of hypochondria, but Win your October 18, letter read as though you wished to know as to my progress, and I had to have a starting point.

The Doctor gave me a thorough check-up yesterday with laboratory tests, et al. He expressed himself as being very proud, laid out a course for further treatment and exercise, and cautioned that nature's rebuilding demanded rest, freedom from worry and the discord of conflict.

I know that I am mentally alright, having made a point of solving and thinking through a number of obtuse problems and situations, requiring acute and perceptive sensibilities.

Physically, I am continuously able to extend myself more and more each day, though constantly bearing in mind my Doctor's prohibition against over-strain, which might tear down nature's rebuilding as previously mentioned.

I do not spend my time and energy in analysis of my situation. I am full of optimism and confidence, generally free from introspection.

I regret that I shall not be able to see and visit with you, and hear some good progress in musicianship, at the time of the forthcoming Committee meeting.

No doubt exists in my mind but that I shall return to my normal activities and interests, within the foresee-able future; but do trust that God will vouchsafe to me the good judgment to determine the relative values of those matters with which I may be confronted, also to determine those matters concerning which I may be capable of effecting improvement as against those circumstances which may be beyond my capabilities.

There is no more humiliating experience than to offend one's respected associate and a cherished and loyal friend.
