

Edwin B. Phillips, a past president of the Tennessee Chapter of the American Institute of iteats died at his home at 1855 Harbert at 4 p.m. yesterday

after a long illness. He was 67.



Mr. Phillips specialized in churches and had designed St. Luke's Methodist Church, Calvary Methodist and Madison Heights Church among others in Memphis.

He returned to the drawing boards, working three years in Chattanooga before coming to Memphis in 1922.

He headed his own office in the Exchange Building.

Work Was Hobby

He enjoyed watching football and played tennis occasionally but his hobby was architecture-"I get more fun out of pondering a design than any possible hobby," he said.

He was a past president of the Memphis Optimist Club, past president of the Men's Loyalty League of Calvary Episcopal Church, a member of the Miliary Order of World Wars and he Kiwanis Club.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Mary deBrutz Grainger Phillips, and a daughter, Mrs. John C. Wyck-off II, both of Memphis; one sister, Mrs. C. F. Reed of Washington, and five grandchildren. His son, Lt. Comd. Brewster Phillips II, died in 1947 while in the Navy,
