This will acknowledge, with regret, your letter of January 10th, withdrawing your membership in the Institute, effective December 31, 1932.

As you know, severance of Institute membership also carries with it termination of Chapter membership.

Neither the Institute nor the Philadelphia Chapter can afford to lose your affiliation and support.

The Officers and Directors of the Institute are keenly aware of the financial problems which confront every practicing architect.

Procedure for Reinstatement FROM CHAPTER I, By-LAWS, A. I. A.

Article 9. Reelection to Membership.

Section 1. Procedure.

(a) If any person who has forfeited or been deprived of membership in the Institute desires to regain his membership therein, he shall make application to the executive committee of the chapter to which, if reelected, he would be assigned, stating in said application the reasons why he forfeited or was deprived of his membership, whether all indebtedness to the Institute and chapter has been discharged, and on what grounds he bases his application for renewed membership. Upon the receipt of such an application, the executive committee of the chapter shall consider the facts, and may call the applicant before it for interrogation or examination. If the decision of the committee is favorable to the applicant, the secretary of the chapter shall report the application for reelection to the Board of Directors of the Institute, endorsing said application and giving the reasons therefor. The executive committee of the chapter may in such cases recommend that the Board waive the Institute initiation fee and may agree that upon the reelection of the applicant, the chapter initiation fee will also be remitted.

Section 2. Approval of Chapter, and Initiation Fee.

(a) The Board of Directors shall consider only such applications for reelection as are endorsed by the executive committee of a chapter, and in such cases may, in their discretion, reinstate a member, and may in such cases, if they see fit, waive the initiation fee. Such reinstatement by the Board will be equivalent to election, as elsewhere provided for new members.

Explanatory Note: Reinstatement in the Institute and the Chapter can be effected by the Secretary of the Institute without delay, but the application for reinstatement must come to him through the Secretary of the Chapter concerned, and meeting the requirements set forth above.




