Sir:-

In view of the absence of the exhibit drawings required by the accompanied application and the nature of my eighteen years service with the U.S. Government, I am respectfully submitting this supplemental memorandum with my application.

I have been an architectural draftsman and architect in the Office of Supervising Architect, Treasury Department, since 1906. Prior to that date my architectural training was secured in the Columbia University (now Geo Washington), also in the following offices in Washington D.C.; Waddy B Wood, Geo Oakley Totten, office of Municipal Architect, D.C. and Navy Department, then four years in the Office of Supervising Architect at Washington.

The period of 1908- 1910 was construction superintendent on Federal Buildings, O.S.A., Since 1910 to date have been employed as Architect by the Supervising Architect, Treasury Department in a supervisory capacity. My official position as architect was secured through the Civil Service Commission upon competitive architectural examinations. During the late world war period (1917-1919-) was Captain Engineers U.S.A. overseas.

Owing to my official connections and conduct of the Federal Building work the identity of my original work is obscured and filed in Washington the property of the Government. My official position limits my private practice to architectural consultations, instructing, and small building projects, not interfering with my official business nor the architectural profession at large.

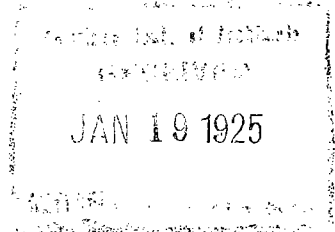

Dear Sir:

Under the regulations laid down for the guidance of the Board of Examiners, applicants for admission to the Institute must qualify under one or more of certain stipulated conditions. As the attached application of Mr. Irving D. Porter of Dallas Tex. is not accompanied by the unanimous endorsement of the local chapter, by exhibits of his work, or by a statement of his graduation from one of the accredited colleges, the Board of Examiners before taking further action, would appreciate some information in addition to that contained in the memorandum accompanying the application.

Paragraph three of the memorandum contains the following.

"Since 1910 to date have been employed as Architect by the Supervising Architect, Treasury Department in a supervisory capacity. My official position as Architect was secured through the Civil Service Commission upon competitive architectural examinations."

The Board desires to know what the applicant's official title is, whether the supervisory duties mentioned carry with them the authority to make decisions on major architectural questions, and whether the construction he supervises is from drawings and specifications prepared under his supervision.

In the paragraph above quoted, the applicant refers to an architectural examination of the Civil Service; does this apply to an examination taken for his present supervisory position, or for his earlier position as architectural draftsman?

Does the original work, referred to in paragraph four of the memorandum "filed in Washington", refer to buildings designed under the supervision of the applicant? In such cases it has been the practice of applicants to submit blueprints of such drawings.

In the absence of drawings for government work, would not the applicant care to submit data on the private work mentioned, such as statements on his practice as consultant and instructor

or photographs and drawings of buildings designed by him.

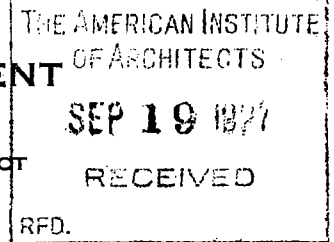

Dear Mr. Kemper:-

Reference is made to your letter of October 16th 1925, and to our conversation of the 8th instant while I was in Washington, all in connection with my application for the Institute membership, and the delayed exhibits of my work that you require.

In this connection, and along the lines of our conversation, there is forwarded you parcels post insured, under separate cover, one bundle of four sets of drawings covering four construction projects that have been completed, where I was the Architect. The drawings, specifications, contracts and general supervision is my individual efforts.

The four sets of drawings sent you for the review of the Board of Examiners consist of, Exhibit A- Exhibit B-Exhibit C and Exhibit D. This is only a few of my efforts that I have been able to handle, when not regularly engaged in my official duties for the Office of The Supervising Architect, Treasury Department.

This work is not submitted as an exhibition of the quality of draftsmanship nor the type of construction that we as Architects are especially proud of. I like many others, would prefer to submit something of a monumental character and work suitable for a public exhibition hall, however, I am submitting these exhibits with a view of showing you the quality of service I am attempting to give my clients, in the matter of detail, complete drawings and protection .

Exhibit "A"- was not constructed, although the site was cleared and foundations staked out, as can be ascertained from the letter of owner, due to sudden slump in building construction. However, all work was completed up to point of drawing up contract. The work will no doubt proceed shortly. Cost \$60,000.

Exhibit "B"- is a clinic for crippled children and also for reconstruction of children and adults. Cost \$45,000.00

Exhibit "C"- First design was for two story, but the project was built for two stories, and finished for the present as a one story. Cost \$14,000.00 - two story about \$24,000.00

Exhibit "D"- small residence cost about \$4500.00 and

is submitted to show that I give as much attention to a small job, in detail and completeness of drawings as a big job. This job was finished about three months ago, and I have not as yet had a photograph of the finished project, and do not want to wait for one to submit with drawings, as I am now anxious to have my application completed at an early date as practicable.

I am sure that the Exhibition Committee will consider these exhibits adequate, as an index to the service given a client, which I believe is the principal object of the Institute.

Kindly return the drawings after they have served their purpose, at my expense. I wish to state that I enjoyed my little visit to the Octagon House last week, although it is no stranger to me, as I was raised in Washington. I also enjoyed our visit and conversation with you and trust I will have the pleasure of another visit in the near future.

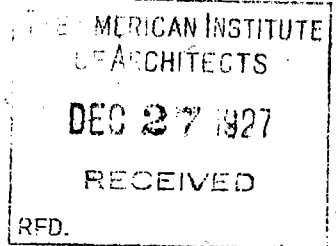

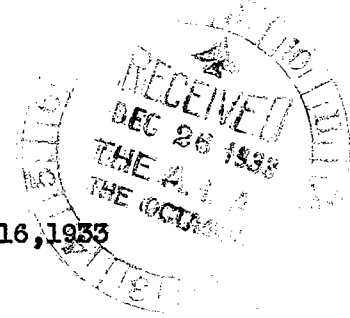

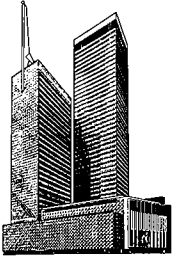

Confirming our telephone conversation of this morning, James H. Wilkerson is not liable for supplemental dues as he has no employees.
