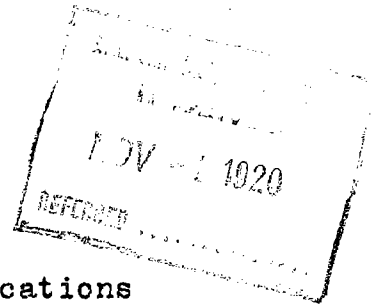

The architectural fraternity of Columbus was shocked at hearing of the death, Friday, May 21st, of George R. Bassett, prominent architect who passed away in Columbus.

Mr. Bassett is a junior member of Bassett & Tresselt, 257 E. Broad St., Columbus.

While on a fishing trip several weeks ago the auto in which Mr. Bassett was en route to Sandusky crashed into a bridge abutment. The deceased is survived by his widow and a brother, Harry C. Bassett.

### Architect Robert Reeves Dies

Friends of Robert R. Reeves, widely known Columbus (O.) architect, were deeply grieved at hearing of his death Saturday at his residence. His death was due to a heart attack. Mr. Reeves was recognized as one of the leading architects at Columbus, having designed many of the most beautiful homes in this city while a member of the former firm of Miller & Reeves.

A past president of the Columbus Chapter of the American Institute of Architecture, Mr. Reeves several years ago won a national competition in design for the U. S. War Memorial Hospital in France.

He is survived by his wife and one son, Robert Rov, Jr.
