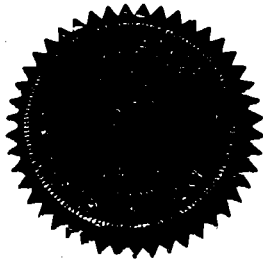

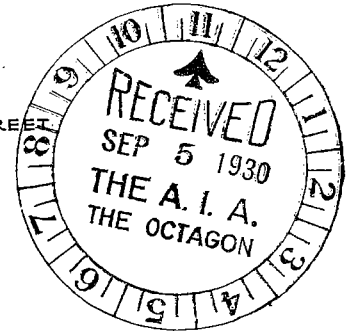

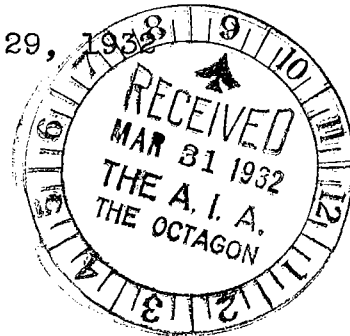

Dear Mr. Bergstrom:

I have before me my bill for dues to the Institute from January 1st, 1932 to December 31st, 1932, inclusive, which I regret to say I am unable to pay at the present time.

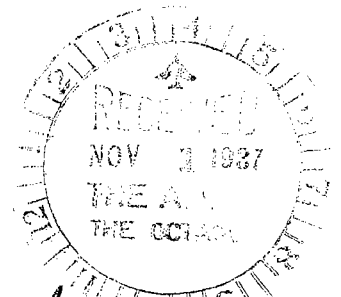

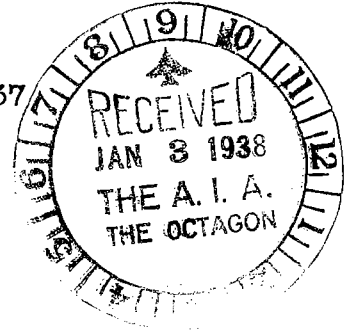

Having taken advantage of the allowable option to pay my Institute dues in installments I am now enclosing my check for six dollars for the final installment due today.

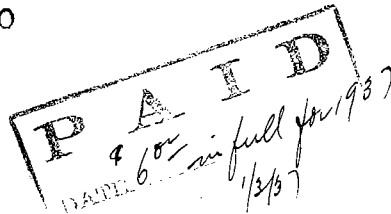

ISIDOR RICHMOND, Boston architect awarded a Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects last night at the Institute's 87th convention in Minneapolis, Minn. Also named a Fellow was Walter Francis Bogner, Professor in the School of Design at Harvard University.

Architect Paid High Tribute

A versatile architect who can design a place of worship, an incinerator or an urban housing project—and who has designed all three—was chosen last week for a fellowship in the American Institute of Architects for "achievement of design."

He is Isidor Richmond of 16 Arlington St., for 30 years a Boston architect. His versatility is by no means restricted to his accomplishments in his professional field, either.

He can paint a picture or pilot a plane, he loves to sail, he is a veteran of two world wars and was a prize winner in the recent Boston Arts Festival.

Early in his career, he aligned himself with the top names in architecture, forming affiliations with such firms as Cram & Ferguson, Guy Lowell, and Bellows & Aldrich.

Educated at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, he won the Rotch Traveling scholarship in 1923, and spent two years traveling and studying in Europe, with residence at the American Academy in Rome.

A private practice, founded in 1925, brought to life a diversity of designs ranging from a Christian chapel in India to an incinerator in South Brookline, the latter designed with Carney Goldberg, his

present partner. (After World II, the firm became Isidor F. Wood & Carney Goldberg, Architects and Engineers.)

In between have been industrial plants, schools, libraries, housing projects, community centers, private homes and Jewish temples.

In addition, he has served as president of the Boston Society of Architects and the Boston Architectural Center.

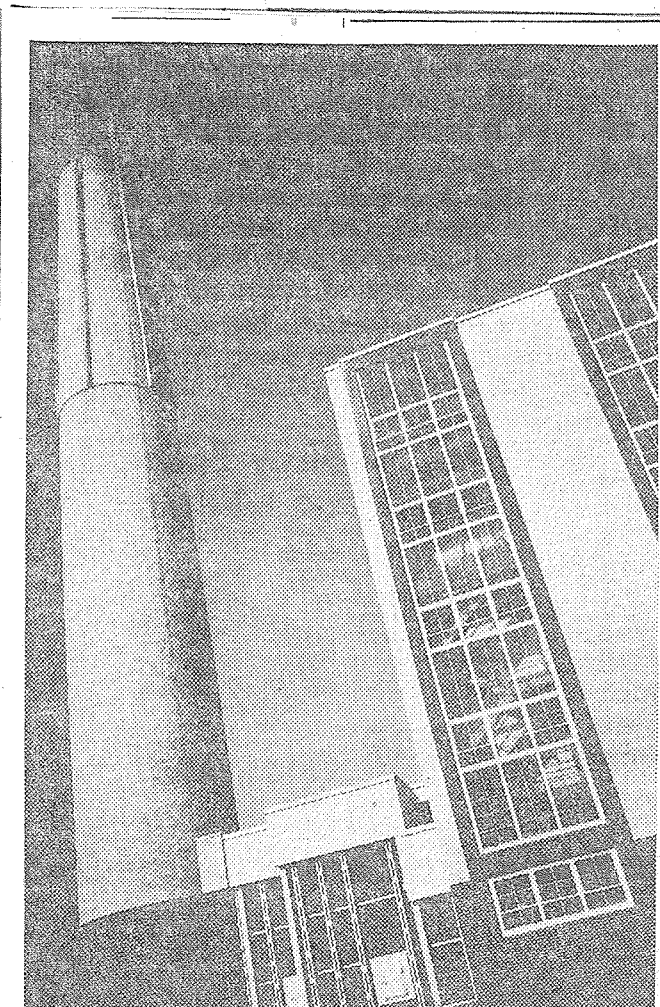
One of the Richmond designs that the College of Fellows chose for exhibit last week at the convention—a religious building, Temple Emeth and its community center in South Brookline.
