My dear Mr. Kemper; -

I have your favor of the 6th, and am sending to Chicago for such papers as I think I shall need in order to make the report to the convention.

Inasmuch as I have not heard from the Board since my last report to them, I am rather in a quandary and at a loss to know how to make a report on the latest activities, covering the proposed changes in the amended By-Laws of the Institute. Dear Mr. Perkins:-

A response to your letter of March 11th has been delayed by my absence in Philadelphia in connection with Convention arrangements.

The various proposed amendments to the Institute By-laws were presented by Mr. Parker after a conference here with Mr. Runk and Mr. Fenner. I believe Mr. Parker had letters from you on the subject which were used, but no formal communication in the nature of a report from the Committee on Chapters was submitted at the Board meeting.

The proposed changes were sent out in a notice to Institute members on February 25th, copy of which is enclosed herewith.

Several additional amendments have come in under the procedure provided in the By-laws and these will be distributed next week.

It would seem to me that your suggestion as to the nature of the final report for the year will fully meet the situation, but you of course are the best judge of this.



Dear Mr. Kemper:

The copy of your letter to Mr. U. Herrick Hammond, dated Mar. 12, 1927, has just been received by me here and I am amazed at the declarations made therein with reference to unpaid dues.

Had any statements of indebtedness reached me, checks in payment thereof would have been sent with reasonable promptness considering my movements abroad.

I have a distinct recollection of a payment or payments of dues sent to the A. I. A. since I have been in Europe. I can state with certainty that notice of 1927 dues has never reached me and it is safe to assume that no notices for 1925 and 1926 came, as an examination of check books which I have with me, covering payments in United States since the late Autumn of 1924 show the usual payments to all clubs and societies except the A.I.A. and including the Boston Society of Architects — its Chapter.

Inasmuch as statements from other clubs and societies, some annual and others semi-annual, have reached me regularly, it seems fair to assume that your executive office has failed to send statements to me.

It would be altogether too improbable a coincidence to have three A. I. A. statements in three years the only ones lost in the mails.

Also, if a reasonably prompt return from the first was not received is it not your custom to send a duplicate and after an undue lapse of time to write the supposed delinquent direct instead of making such statements as are contained in your letter and broadcasting them?

I can only conclude that the fault lies in the executive office and I deeply resent your action in writing as you did to Messrs. Hammong, Bergstrom and Ripley.


