The status of the two former members about whom you inquire is as follows:

# RICHARD KENNON PERRY, A.I.A.

### 1890 - 1954

As generations parade across the stage of time, there occasion; ally appears one individual whose ability and talents place him above the rank and file of the others, and one whose personal characteristics endear him to his fellow men.

So it was with Richard Kennon Perry, whose passing on August 29, 1954, has saddened the hearts of all who knew him, particularly his fellow members of the Georgia Chapter, American Institute of Architects.

The fact that much of his best architectural work was located out of atlanta, together with the fact that his modesty prevented him from "Letting his light so shine that all men might see it", kept many of the younger men in the Profession from knowing the beauty of his architectural design, and from knowing and appreciating his work as an artist.

Bulloch County, and Union Springs, Alabama, can take pride in being the birth place and childhood home of Mr. Perry.

He was a graduate in Architecture of Alabama Polytechnic Institute. where he was a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity.

As an Architect, he was registered to practice in the states of Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

He was a Member of The American Institute of Architects, having joined in 1925. He was, at the time of his passing, one of the Directors of The Georgia Chapter, A.I.A. The Georgia Chapter was indeed fortunate in having as a member of its Executive Committee a man of Mr. Perry's sound judgment during one of the most active periods in the Chapter's history.

He was active in cultural, civic, fraternal, and social affairs through membership in the Atlanta Art Association, the Atlanta Historical Society, the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, Gate City Lodge No. 2, Faak, the Scottish Rite, the Yearab Temple, The Lions Club, the Atlanta Alumni of Phi Delta Theta, and the Atlanta Auburn Club. He was formerly a member of the Capitol City Club.

His Church membership was with St. Lukes Episcopal Church.

His wife was the former Miss Wyolene Purtell, of atlanta.

after his graduation from Alabama Polytechnic Institute he worked for some years with Edward Emmett Dougherty, A.D.G.P., architect of Atlanta. An example of his excellent work while with Mr. Dougherty is the detailing of the residence for Dr. Phinizy Calhoun.

After Mr. Dougherty closed his Atlanta office to devote full attention to his Nashville practice. Mr. Perry became associated with Robert and Company as Architect where he remained for a number of years. His work here covered many types of buildings and extended into several states. One of the well known jobs done by him while with Robert and Company was the Physics Building for Georgia Institute of Technology.

After leaving Robert and Company, Mr. Perry entered the independent practice of Architecture. Outstanding among the many prominent projects he designed are the homes of the Garland Jones', the Tom Parroths, the Ellis Peniston's, the William Bank's, the Raleigh Arnold's, and the Dan Manjet's, all of Newman, Georgia.

The design and detailing of Mr. Perry's traditional work bears the marks of a true master. His numerous schools, churches, and residences are a credit to the Profession. He had the ability to incorporate into his design that rare quality of charm and refinement that placed his work in a class far above average.

As an artist, Mr. Perry was equally at home in the mediums of water colors, and oils. Several of his water colors were used by Architectural Record as covers. His work has been exhibited at the High Museum of Art.

Mr. Perry's life exemplified the "Golden Rule", "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

an incident which affected the writer is used as an illustration.

Upon my return from Europe in the fall of 1938. I found that my mail contained correspondence relating to two projects of which I had no knowledge.

Investigation revealed that atlanta School Officials were applying to one of the Federal agencies for financial assistance in the construction of additional school facilities, and that two projects had been allocated to me.

At a meeting between School Officials and the various Architects. my absence was noted and inquiry was made as to my whereabouts.

When Mr. Perry heard that I was in Europe on a trip of several months duration, and that my absence from the City would cause me to loose the jobs which had been allocated to me, he volunteered to carry them on for me until my return.

What could have been more generous, considerate, and unselfish than that? This incident typifies Mr. Perry's whole life.

The communities in which he has worked, the Profession of Architecture, the Georgia Chapter, Emerican Institute of Architects, and his many friends have all been blessed and have profited by knowing and associating with Richard Kennon Perry. He was truly blessed of His Pather.
