





EMERY ROTH DIES; NOTED ARCHITECT

Specialist in Apartment Houses Since 1898 Designed Ritz Tower, St. George Hotels

Emery Roth, noted New York architect since 1898 who specialized in apartment houses and hotels and designed the St. George Hotel in Brooklyn and the Ritz Tower Hotel, Manhattan, died yesterday in Mount Sinai Hospital after a long illness, at the age of 77.

Mr. Roth was the senior partner in the architectural firm of Emery Roth & Sons, 18 East Forty-eighth Street, with his sons, Julian and Richard Roth of New York. He had lived at the Hotel Alden. 225. Central Park West, which he designed.

The Ritz Tower was completed in 1926 for the late Arthur Brisbane, Hearst editor and columnist. The St. George was finished four years later. Altogether Mr. Roth designed more than 500 apartment buildings in New York.

Designed Many Hotels

Some of the structures he designed were the Mayflower Hotel, Central Park West and Sixty-first Street; Oliver Cromwell Hotel, 12 West Seventy-second Street; Eldorado Apartments, 300 Central Park West; Dorset Hotel, 30 West Fifty-fourth Street; Drake Hotel, 440 Park Avenue, and the St. Moritz Hotel, 500 Central Park South

In 1893 Mr. Roth ar lived in New York and joined the architect Richard M. Hunt. He sided Mr. Hunt in designing many suburban home interiors for wealthy home owners. Five years later he established his own architect's office here. He practiced alone until 1938, when his sons became his partners:

Won Prize for Work

Mr. Roth designed the Hotel Beverly, Lexington Avenue and Fiftieth Street; the San Remo Towers, an apartment house at Central Park West between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth Streets, and the Normandy, an apartment house at 140 Riverside Drive. The office building he and his sons designed for Fifty-finth Street and Park Avenue is nearing completion. He also did hospital work.

Several years ago he received a certificate of merit from the First Avenue Association for his design of an apartment house at 434 East Fifty-second Street! Later Mr. Roth won the first prize of the Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce for his design of an apartment house at 35 Prospect Park West, Brooklyn. This year the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects awarded to him its apartment-house design medal for 1948 for his design of 300 East Fifty-seventh Street, an apartment house.

He was a member of the institute and of the National Democratic Club, City Athletic Club, Metropolis Club and the Central Synagogue.

His wife, the former Miss Ella Grossman, died in 1943. Besides his sons, he leaves two daughters, Mrs. Raymond D. Mindha of New York and Mrs. Herbert Lederer of Cleveland, and two sisters, Mrs. Max Schlesinger and Mrs. Bella Grossman of New York.
