Bernard B. Rothschild FCSI, 50, of the firm of Finch Alexander Barnes Rothschild & Paschal, has practiced architecture in Philadelphia, Detroit and Atlanta.

He was made a Fellow of the Construction Specifications Institute last year after serving as president, vice-president and director of the Atlanta Chapter, CSI. CSI awarded him the "President's Plaque" in 1963.

Rothschild has been active in state and local AIA chapters, having been president, vice-president, secretary, director and editor for the Georgia Chapter, AIA. He received the Chapter's AIA Award for Service to the Chapter in 1960.

Rothschild is founder and past president and director of the Architects and Engineers Institute, Atlanta. He is also a member of the Georgia Engineering Society and the American Concrete Institute.

Outstanding buildings designed by his firm include the Peachtree 7th office building, Dinkler Plaza Hotel addition, Atlanta Jewish Community Center, Peachtree-Baker office building and Georgia Power Co. offices.


Dear Mr. Rothschild:

I have your letter of October 18 and note that you think we should prepare a group of street scenes or ~~a~~ group of buildings for the national release in connection with Charleston's A.I.A. citation. This can be done and I will see to it but I am waiting to see what Dick Stitt says in the letter that he is to write to me going into this request.

Two points come to my mind, what size prints should these photographs be and how mounted; also how many photographs should we make, 10, 12 or how many?

It is quite possible that when I hear from Mr. Stitt that these and other points will be gone into in detail and also when this set of photographs should be ready. As you state, fall is not the best time for picture taking and the longer we can delay it within reason as regards time of release will be better as once the leaves get off the trees the street scenes and details will be much clearer from the architectural photography view point than doing them when in full leaf. It is quite possible Mr. Stitt's letter will cover all this but I thought I would write you without waiting for its arrival.



Bernard B. Rothschild has served his profession continuously in many capacities since 1951. He has held every office in the North Georgia Chapter, AIA, and has chaired some important committee each year. Now, as Director of the South Atlantic Region, AIA, he is bringing to bear his years of experience, his energy and thoroughness on the architectural affairs of the Region.

Three landmarks of his career to date are:

1. His long fight to pass an adequate Architectural Registration Law for Georgia.
2. His work with the founding of The Architects & Engineers Institute, Atlanta, and
3. The launching of the Georgia Council, AIA.

All three of these accomplishments required years of the most intense effort.

In addition to his work with AIA, he has served his profession through his work with the Associated General Contractors and Construction Specifications Institute. He represents the architects to the Georgia Branch, A.G.C. and is under constant call to clarify problems arising between architects and contractors. His fairness and knowledge have earned him the respect of the contractors, as well as the architects.

The C.S.I. has recognized his contribution to the building industry by elevating him to Fellowship.

In addition to these activities, he has taken time every year to pass on his knowledge of office practice to students at Georgia Tech taking a refresher course for State examination.

The chronological list below spells out in detail his many contributions. What cannot be shown is the driving force of Bernard Rothschild to accomplish his goals; and those goals have always been the betterment of his Profession, Architecture.

- 1956-1963 Chairman, Government Relations Committee - began work to revise Georgia's Architectural Registration Law, in 1956.
- 1958 Continued to work with Law until a revised version was presented to the State Legislature in 1958.
- 1959 After defeat because of outside influence (A.R.A.) sought revised version of the Registration Law. Again defeated by efforts of A.R.A. and Home Builders.

WASHINGTON D.C., May 15, 1966 -- Three Georgia architects are among 60 in the nation advanced to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects. The AIA announced 1966 recipients of the lifetime honor today.

Aside from the Gold Medal, which may be presented to a single architect from any part of the world, Fellowship is the highest honor the Institute can bestow on its members.

The state residents are Joseph Amisano, 2072 Roxboro Road and Bernard B. Rothschild, 3715 Conifer Circle, N.E., both of Atlanta, and James Joseph Walton Biggers, 1836 Wynnton Road, Columbus.

The 60 new Fellows bring the number of Institute members using the letters FAIA after their names to 698, representing only 3.8 percent of the more than 18,000 architects who are corporate AIA members. There are now 18 Georgian architects who hold this distinction.

Investiture of the new Fellows will take place at the annual banquet and ball Friday, July 1, climaxing the 98th annual convention of the Institute to be held in Denver, Colo., beginning June 26.

Amisano was elevated to Fellowship for outstanding design achievement. Biggers was advanced for educational service and Rothschild for service to the profession.

Joseph Amisano, 49, is a principal of the firm of Toombs, Amisano and Wells, 70 Fairlie Street N.W., Atlanta. He received his bachelor of science in architecture degree from Pratt Institute in 1940 and held a scholarship at the Prix de Rome from 1950 to 1952. He served the Georgia chapter AIA in 1963 as vice president and chairman of the Architectural Design Committee. Amisano has been a member of the chapter since 1953.

Prominent examples of his design abilities include the Lenox Square Shopping Center and the Northwest Mutual Insurance Building, both in Atlanta and both winners of design awards. Also exemplary is the Winter Park Shopping Center in Winter Park, Florida, for which he received an AIA regional honor award in 1964. Indicative of his versatility as a designer are outstanding buildings for the University of Georgia, Davidson's parking garage, and schools and office buildings, most of which are in Atlanta.

Amisano is a member of several professional societies, including the American Institute of Planners, and the American Educational Theatre Association and the American Academy in Rome, as well as numerous public service and civic organizations in Atlanta.

Bernard Rothschild, 51, is a principal in the firm of Finch Alexander Barnes Rothschild and Paschal, 70 Fairlie Street, N.W. Current director of the AIA's South Atlantic Region, he has been a member of

the AIA since 1947. He has held every office in the North Georgia Chapter, AIA, and has been chairman of an important chapter committee each year.

He worked diligently to pass an adequate architectural registration law in Georgia, founded the Architects and Engineers Institute in Atlanta and formed the statewide Georgia Council AIA.

Rothschild has served his profession nationally through liaison work with the Associated General Contractors and the Construction Specifications Institute; also he has taken time each year to assist students at Georgia Tech taking refresher courses for their state examination.

A 1937 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania with a bachelor of architecture degree, he has been responsible for the designs of several of Atlanta's notable buildings, including the YMCA, Northside Branch, the Jewish Community Center, office buildings, hotel additions and the Cinerama Theatre.

James Joseph Walton Biggers, 73, is a native of Columbus and a principal of the firm of Biggers-Scarborough-Neal, 1353 13th Avenue. He earned his bachelor of architecture degree in 1915 from the Georgia Institute of Technology.

For the past 40 years his practice has been distinguished in particular by his sensitive restoration work and numerous designs of a traditional character.

Fellowships in educational service are given occasionally to architects who have been distinguished leaders in preservation, partly

because the subject is little understood by the public. According to the principles underlying the bestowal of Fellowships, leadership in preservation of buildings of historical and architectural merit constitutes a "signal and lasting influence.. (and) a notable contribution to the advancement of the profession."

Biggers has won widespread recognition and respect of his colleagues for his mastery of the fundamental principles of design and his wide vocabulary of materials and techniques, as well as his taste in ornamentation and detail. Examples include the C.F. Williams summer estate, the D.A. Turner residence and several public buildings, notably the Bradley Memorial Library and the St. Paul Methodist Church in Columbus.

**ROTHSCHILD, Bernard**

Bernard "Rocky" Berman Rothschild, FAIA, FCSI was born January 28, 1915 in Philadelphia, PA and died Friday, September 16, 2005 in Atlanta, GA. He is survived by his wife of 62 years, Barbara Haas Rothschild of Atlanta, GA; three children, Robert Rothschild of Atlanta, Richard (Carol) Rothschild and Nancy (Ken) Lyons, all of Roswell, GA; three grandchildren, Richard and Renee Rothschild and Kathryn Lyons. A 1937 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania School of Architecture, Rocky served as a member of the Board of Overseers and the Graduate School of Fine Arts and served as an Associate Trustee of the University from 1976 until 1983. After World War II, Rocky moved to Atlanta and formed the firm Alexander and Rothschild. In 1958, Alexander and Rothschild merged with another firm to create the prominent architectural firm of Finch, Alexander, Barnes, Rothschild and Paschal (FABRAP) which is today known as Rossler, FABRAP International. Throughout his career, Rocky was extremely active in the American Institute of Architects (AIA). He served in numerous capacities including the Georgia (Atlanta) chapter president in 1955, regional director of AIA from 1965 to 1968 and president of the Georgia state chapter in 1972. In 1966, he was elected a Fellow of AIA and during the period 1984 to 1985, served as Chancellor of the AIA College of Fellows. During his career, he received many awards, including a citation for outstanding service to AIA in 1982 and one for exceptional service to the board of directors in 1981. Rocky was also active in the Construction Specification Institute and was elected a Fellow of CSI in 1964. He earned CSI's National President's Plaque in 1963 and 1965. The two most prestigious honors Rocky received were the 1973 Kemper Award and the establishment of the Bernard B. Rothschild Award in 1981. The Rothschild Medal is awarded periodically by the Georgia AIA for outstanding achievements within the profession. Funeral services will be held Sunday, September 18 at 2 p.m. at the Sunrise Chapel Mausoleum at Arlington Memorial Park with Rabbi Judith R. Beiner officiating.
