It allows a positive and helpful response to requests for factual information on architects, and in that way constitutes a service to the profession.

The American Institute of Architects assumes no responsibility for the accuracy of statements made in this Questionnaire. The obligation to maintain this record as a current description of an architectural firm rests with the firm, and supplementary record forms are available for this purpose.

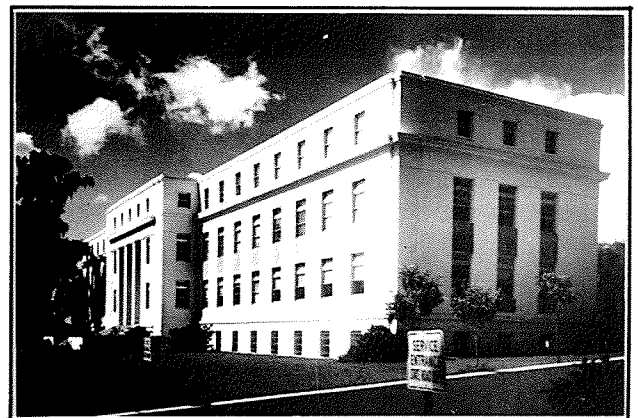




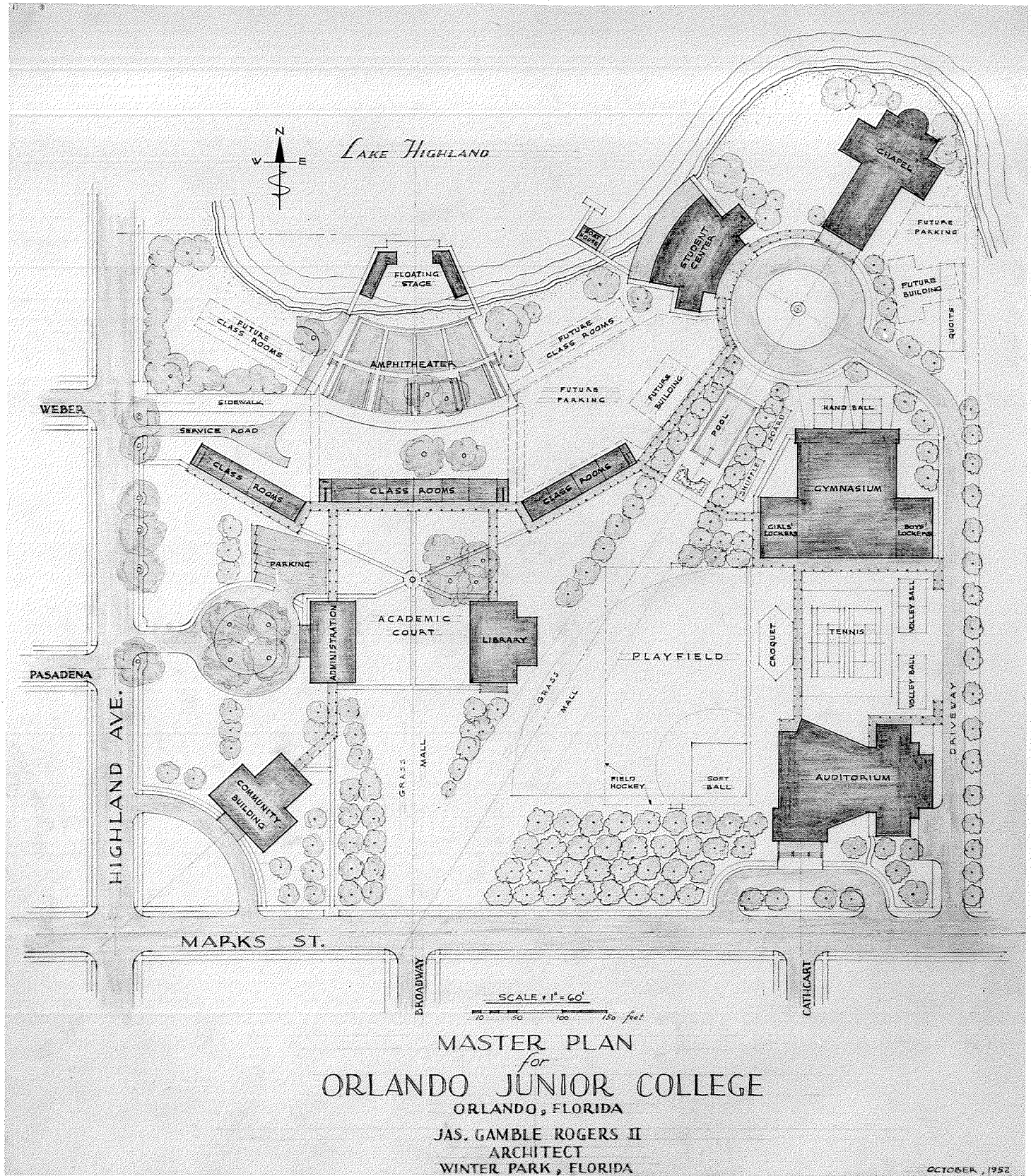
SUPREME COURT BUILDING

BUILT 1948 & 1949 COST \$2,000,000.

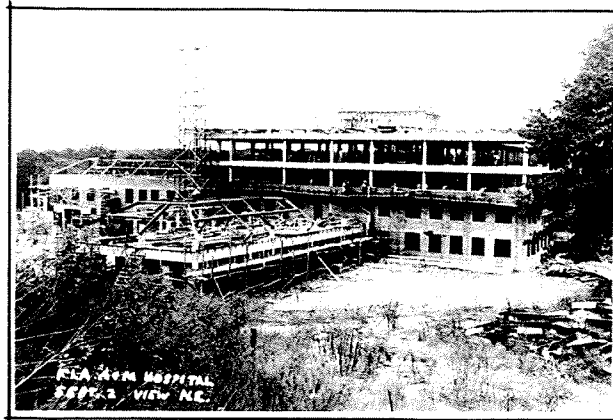
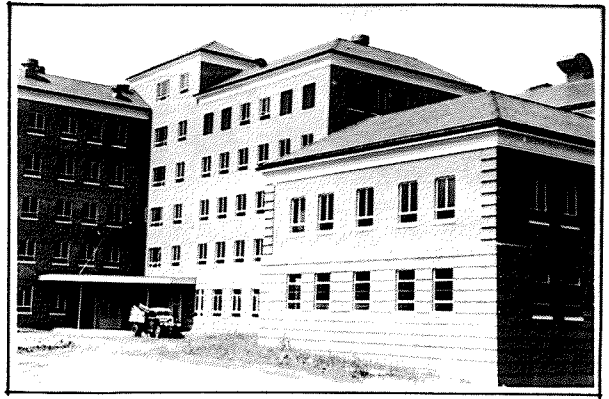
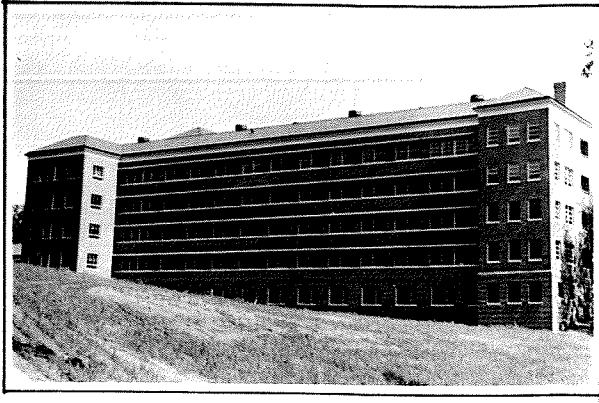


FLORIDA CITRUS BUILDING

BUILT 1949 COST \$500,000.

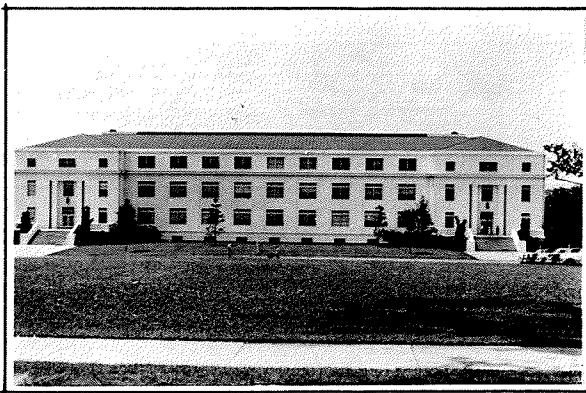


STATE ROAD DEPARTMENT OFFICE BUILDING

BUILT 1948 & 1949 COST \$1,200,000.

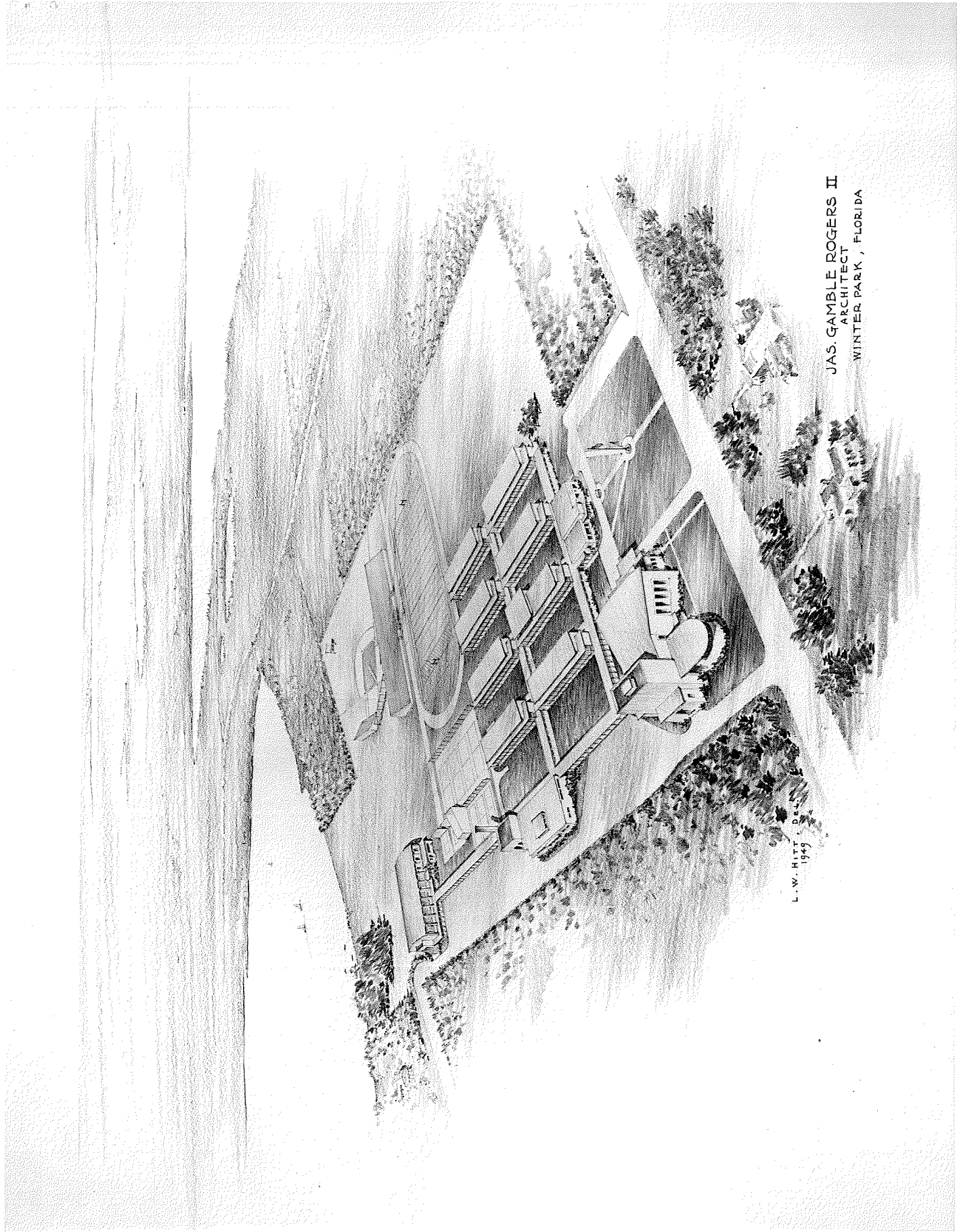




GENERAL HOSPITAL *for* FLORIDA A&M COLLEGE

BUILT 1949 & 1950 ▽ ▽ COST \$ 2,000,000.

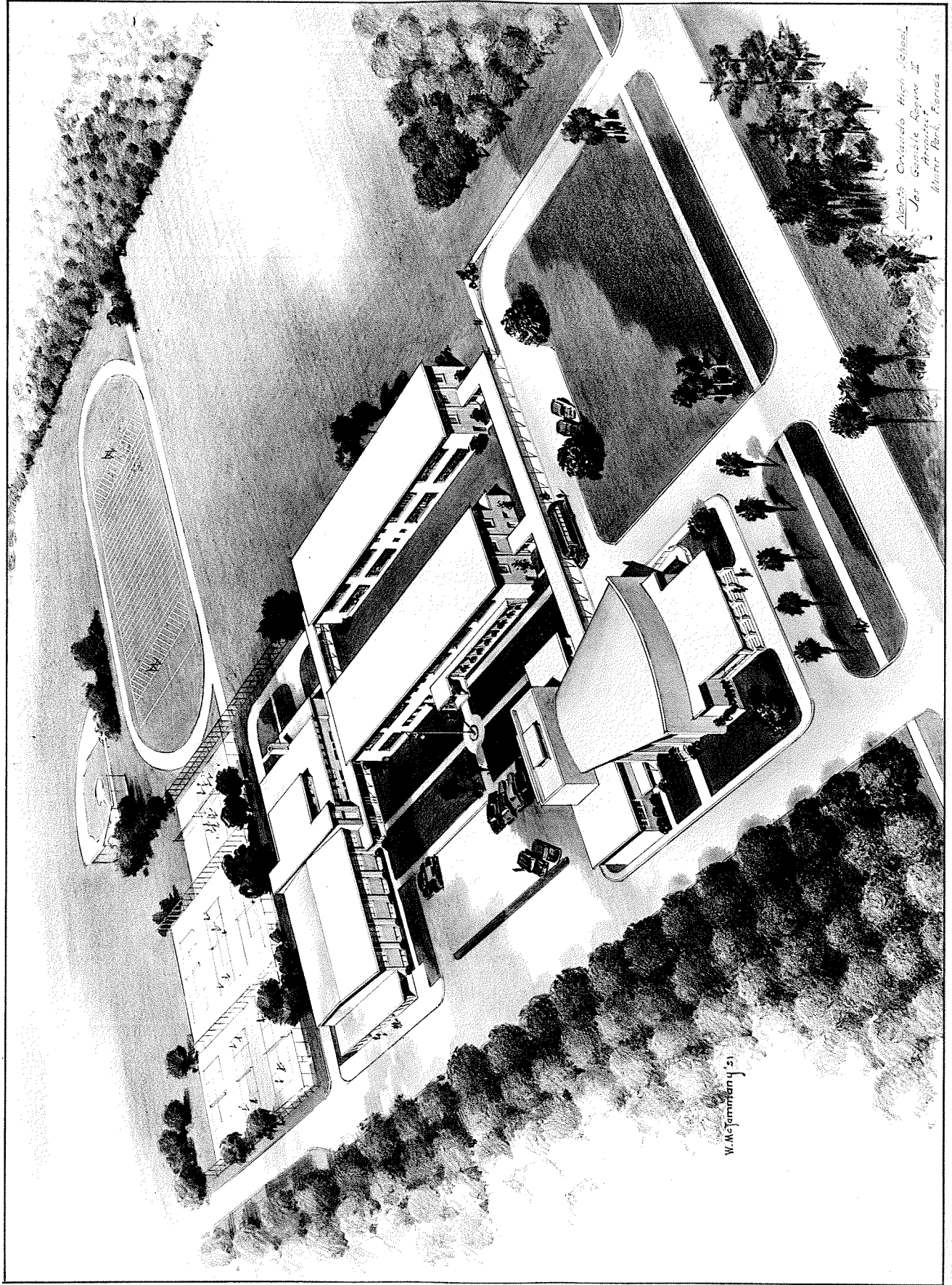


CALDWELL OFFICE BUILDING
