Experience with the Roster since its establishment in 1946 has shown its usefulness. Growing out of an earlier Register of architects qualified for public works, The Roster provides at The Octagon an accurate, current record of the qualifications and achievements of members of the profession. It allows a positive and helpful response to requests for factual information on architects, and in that way constitutes a service to the profession.

The American Institute of Architects assumes no responsibility for the accuracy of statements made in this Questionnaire. The obligation to maintain this record as a current description of an architectural firm rests with the firm, and supplementary record forms are available for this purpose.

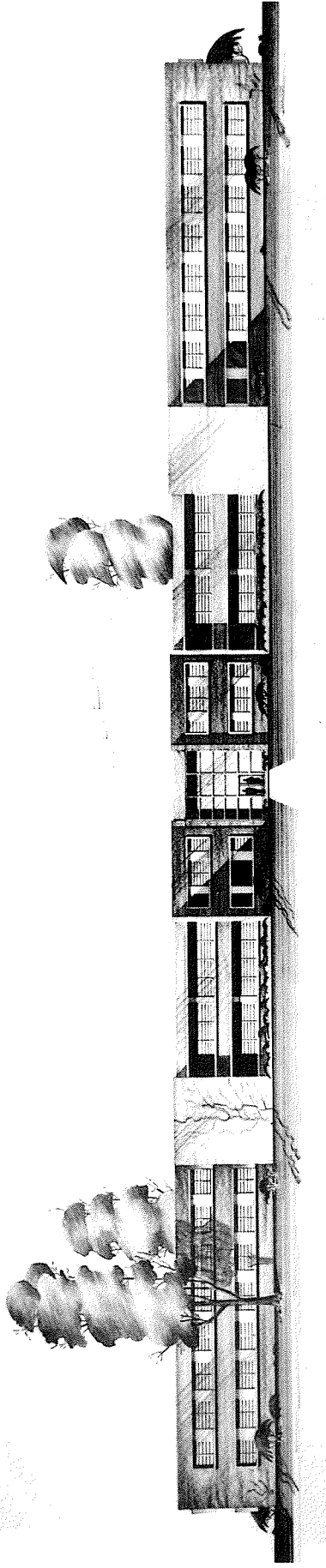

Engineering Research Analyst with U. S. Strategic Bombing Survey, Physical Damage Division.

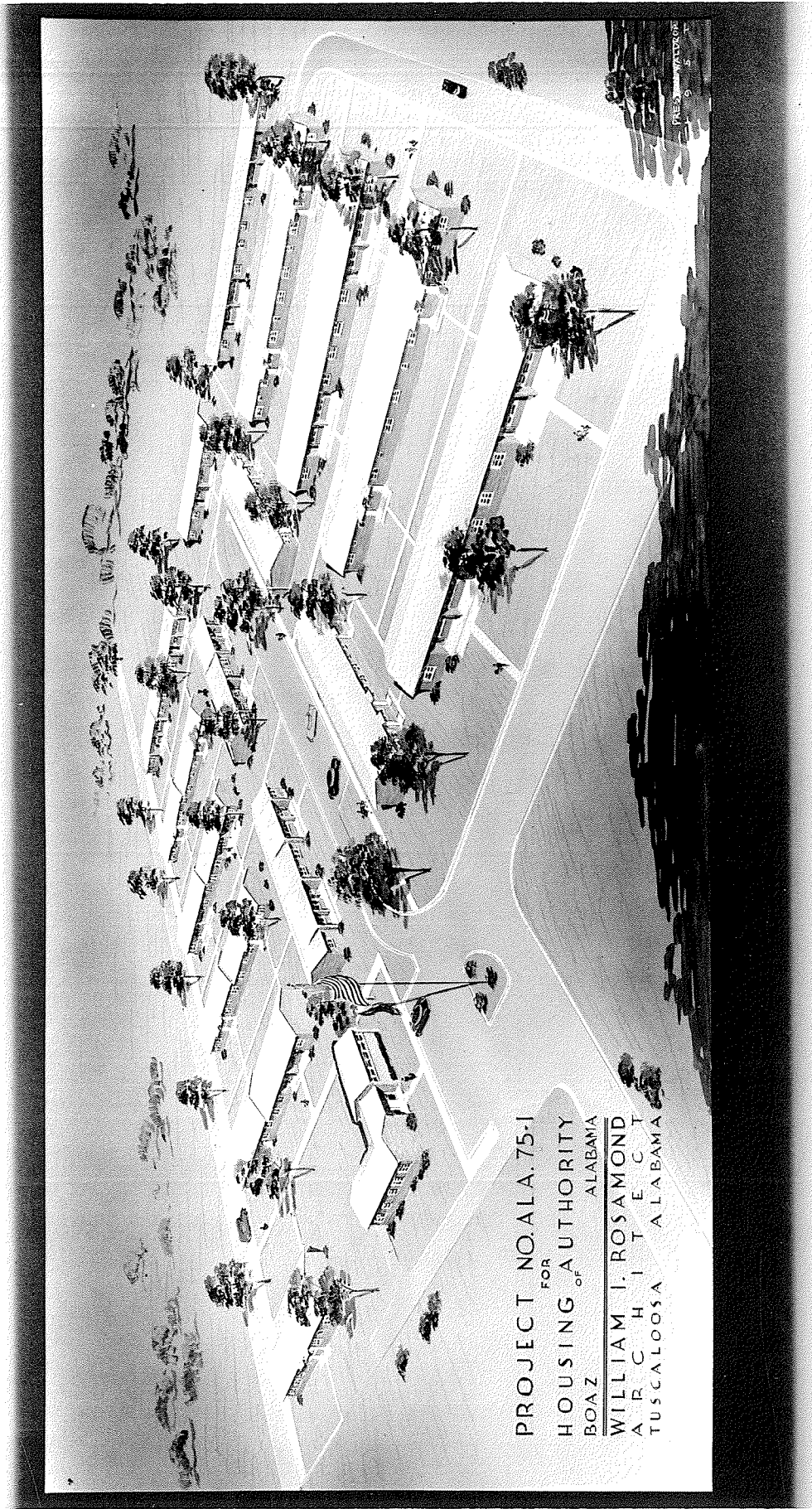

This work was done in conjunction with outstanding engineers of this country and was carried out in England, France, Belgium, Germany, and Japan.

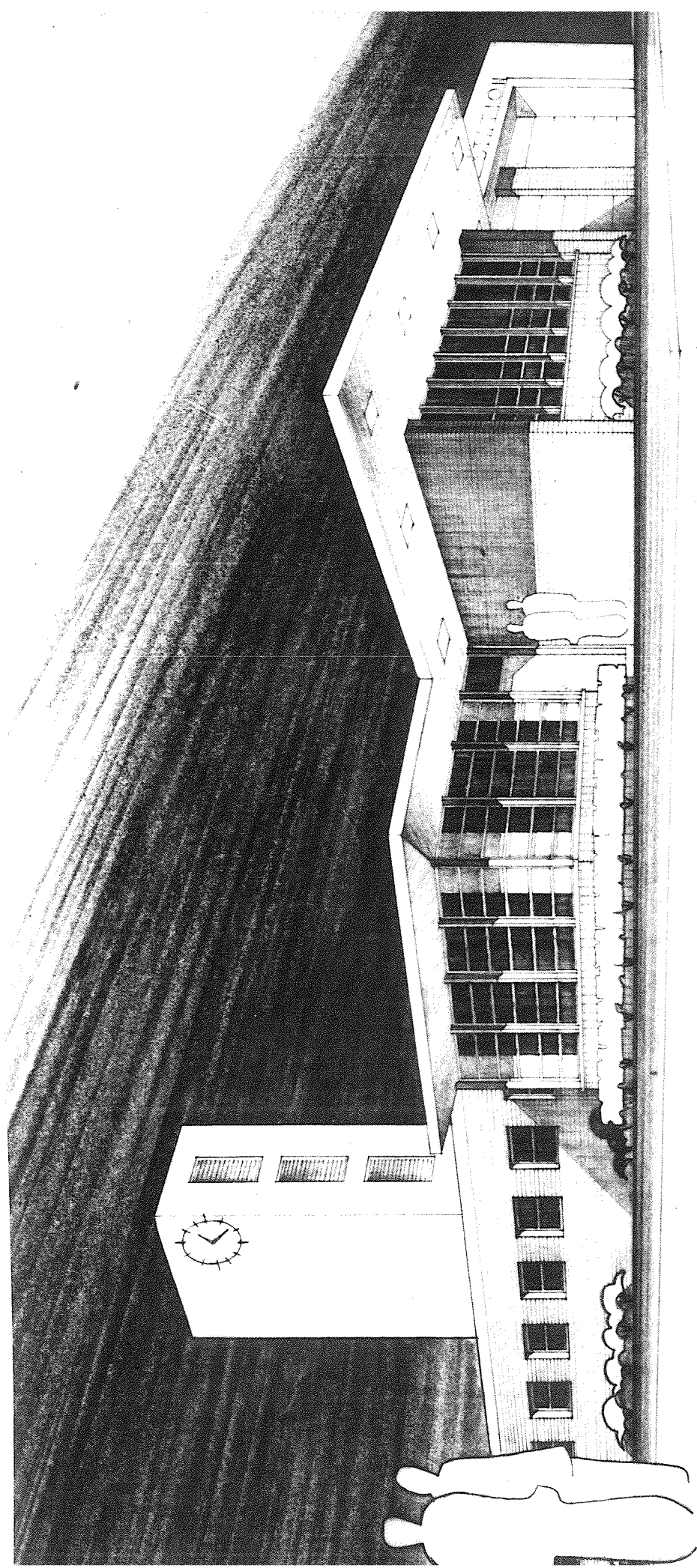


**CHRONIC DISTURBED BUILDING
