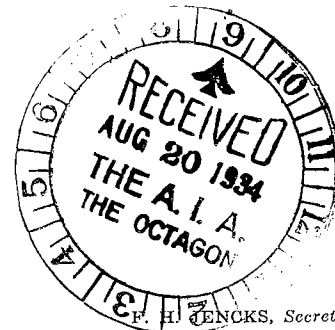

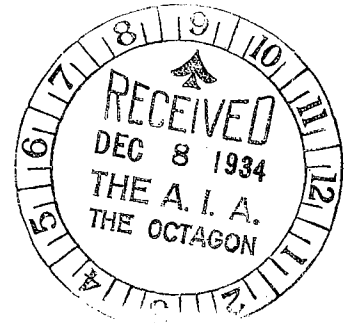

Dear Mr. Scheick:

During the past two years or more it has been necessary for me, for reasons of health, to greatly modify my architectural activities, and to restrict my work to consultation -- of which there has been relatively little. Having carried on my practice in Baltimore for approximately 45 years, during which, for approximately 35 or more, I have been a member of the Institute, I am maintaining my registrations in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Delaware, Rhode Island and Maine, and I am also retaining my certificate in the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards. However, the national and chapter (Baltimore) dues have become rather burdensome.

I understand that it is probably possible for my Institute membership to be put on an emeritus basis, and that this will materially lessen my dues.

Gentlemen:

I enclose herewith application for Membership Emeritus in The Institute.

As noted in the application, it is my recollection that I joined The Institute in 1928, 1929, or 1930, having been preceded as a member therein by Edward H. Glidden, Sr., who died May 2, 1924--see your records and those of Baltimore Chapter.

Upon Mr. Glidden's death I succeeded him as head of the office.

During the past several years extremely poor health--emphysema and bronchial asthma--has made it impossible to continue the normal activities of a full practice--preparation of drawings and specifications, supervision of construction, etc., and it has been necessary to limit my service to consultation, of which there has been very little.

I am registered in six states--see application--and have continued these registrations in the hope that an improvement in health would permit greater activity. So far, this has not been the case, and, while I doubt that it will be, I shall continue registrations in order that I may, as a registered architect, offer, gratis, a consultive service in connection with matters of a charitable or public nature.

After some 35-40 years of association with my fellow architects through the Institute I would very much like to continue as a member, but a non-existent earned net income makes the current National and Chapter dues quite burdensome--see application.

Should I be allowed Membership Emeritus, I shall be glad to make a contribution to both the National and Chapter organizations at the rate of \$25.00 per annum until my seventieth birthday on March 27, 1971. If a modified emeritus status, with dues not in excess of \$25.00 is available, I shall be glad to accept it.
