John Graham Dies at 68: Falls Church Architect

John Graham, jr., Falls Church architect who helped design area schools, died yesterday in Arlington Hospital after a short illness.

Mr. Graham, who was 68, was a member of the National Capital Regional Planning Commission, vice chairman of the Northern Virginia Regional Planning Council and co-chairman of the American Institute of Architects' Committee on the National Capital.

Active in civic affairs in Falls Church, he was a member of the committee which selected the site for the Northern Virginia Detention Home in Annandale in 1955.

With his partner, James M. McHugh, Mr. Graham designed the Mount Daniel Elementary School in Falls Church and the Oak Ridge Elementary School in Falls Church.

Mr. Graham was born in Philadelphia and was graduated in 1911 from the University of Pennsylvania School of Architecture. After a tour of duty during World War I as a Captain in the Army Engineers, he was in private practice in Philadelphia, specializing in homes, apartments and schools.

He came to Washington in 1938 to join the staff of the

United States Housing Authority, where he served as a project planner for new public housing projects here and in Baltimore and Wilmington, Del.

During World War II, Mr. Graham was technical adviser in Defense and War Housing. He resigned from the Government and resumed private practice here in 1945.

He was a director of the Falls Church Rotary Club.

Mr. Graham made several trips to Europe in connection with his profession, and was the author of "Housing in Scandinavia," published in 1940.

Mr. Graham is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth McGilvary Graham, and a daughter, Milla Graham, both of the home address, 216 Little street, Falls Church, and a brother, David L. Graham of Mexico City.

A memorial service will be held in Philadelphia.

John Graham, Architect of Falls Church

John Graham Jr., 68, Falls Church architect who helped design area schools and to select a site for a Northern Virginia detention home, died Tuesday in Arlington Hospital after a short illness.

In 1955 the Northern Virginia Regional Juvenile Detention Home Committee selected a 6-acre Annandale tract, one of several Mr. Graham, consultant to the group, had submitted. The home has not yet been built.

He was associate architect of Mt. Daniel Elementary School in Falls Church and Oak Ridge Elementary School in Arlington.

At the time of his death, Mr. Graham was co-chairman of the American Institute of Architects Committee on the National Capital. He was on the National Capital Regional and the Northern Virginia Regional Planning Commissions and was formerly director of the Washington Metropolitan Chapter of the AIA.

Born in Camden, N. J., he was educated at Norfolk (Va.) Academy and Chestnut Hill Academy in Philadelphia. He was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania School of Architecture in 1911.

In World War I Mr. Graham was a captain in the Army Engineer Corps. As a private architect in Philadelphia he designed colonial homes in the suburbs.

He was technical adviser on housing for the State of Pennsylvania with headquarters in Harrisburg before coming to the U. S. Housing Authority here in 1938.

Mr. Graham was planner for new public housing projects in Washington, Baltimore, and Wilmington, Del., and later technical adviser of defense and war housing until he resigned in 1945.

He then started a private practice in Falls Church and was associated with James M. McHugh of Arlington. Mr. Graham wrote a book, "Housing in Scandinavia," published in 1940. He was a director of the Falls Church Rotary Club and served on the Falls Church Planning Commission.

Surviving are his wife, Elizabeth McGilvary Graham, and a daughter, Milla Dupuy Graham, of the home address, 216 Little Falls st., Falls Church; and a brother, David L. of Mexico City.

Mr. Graham, 69, was associate architect of Mt. Daniel Elementary School in Falls Church and Oakridge Elementary School in Arlington. He acted as consultant to the Northern Virginia Regional Juvenile Detention Home committee in 1955. The home has not yet been built.

A RESIDENT of 216 Little Falls St., Mr. Graham was co-chairman of the American Institute of Architects committee on the National Capital at the time of his death. Formerly director of the Washington Metropolitan Chapter of the AIA, he served on the National Capital Regional and Northern Virginia Regional Planning Commissions.

Until he resigned in 1945 to go into private practice in Falls Church with James M. McHugh of Arlington, Mr. Graham served as technical adviser of defense and war housing. Before that he was planner for new public housing projects in Washington, Baltimore, Md., and Wilmington, Del.
