Dear Sir:

Your letter of the ninth of June arrived during my absence from the city for several weeks. I regret the apparent discourtesy in not replying sooner. Please accept my apologies. On my return Monday last I started getting exhibits together, had the plans printed and I had the photographs which I send, but waited till today hoping that the man who took the Belden Hotel photographs would be ready with the Shoreland pictures. The building is only just completed. There has been only a week or so in which it could be done, if weather permitted, especially as the court gardens, planting, and the cascades are not yet finished.

As it is, am only able to send a very poor and lifeless photo taken by one of our draftsmen of the Shoreland. I have designed for the Gottschalk organization and been responsible for all architecture, selection of materials, all decorations, furniture, fittings, draperies, etc., for four such great hotels and four thirty-five hundred seat theatres and very many minor works, such as office buildings, shops and apartment houses, in all amounting to about forty million dollars. There are assisting me about sixty draftsmen and detailers, five structural engineers and four mechanical engineers (most of the time) besides our head draftsman.

As the Institute is considering taking me into the fold, I feel bound to state the case as it is and wish to say that one of the things which brought about my connection with this big organization who finance

and build was the three per cent (and less) architect, and the attitude of most owners considering only first cost and not permanency and low upkeep and not realizing that only for full fees can an architect do himself or the owner justice. Collections, too, are very difficult even for the big firms here, and I had no big capital to fight with.

The La Salle Hotel, which I designed for Holabird & Roche and the Blackstone Hotel for Marshall & Fox, and the Ansonia in New York for W. E. D. Stokes (all with mansards) had given me a reputation so that some years ago Mr. Gottschalk approached me with an offer to give me all their work if I would give them preference in the event I had work for other clients to do. They have kept me so constantly busy all of the last three or four years that I have been buried in their million dollar organization and hence have not been, except with them, in the public eye.

I hope this explanation will give the necessary light on my position I have as it is a class of work to do which I could not in competition with Holabird & Roche and others personally acquire and I can be ethical, not cut fees, and do the tricks many do who get work to do. I am ethical, professional and feel right with myself and the Institute.
