Dear Sirs-

At a meeting of the Executive Committee July tenth, the following resolution was adopted:

That it is recommended by the Executive Committee of the Boston Chapter, American Institute of Architects, that Brainerd and Leeds, being guilty of unprofessional conduct in having entered an unauthorized competition for a school at Foxboro, Mass., and having previously violated the rules of the American Institute of Architects, be expelled from the Institute, and that the Secretary be directed to inform the A. I. A. Committee on Practice to this effect. (Art. V. Section 2, By-laws.)

This firm was involved in a similar case in February, 1920, in an unauthorized competition for the Manchester Schools, and evidence was forwarded to the Institute at that time. They are, in the opinion of the Executive Committee, hardened offenders.

At the same meeting the Executive Committee of this Chapter voted to suspend for a period of one year Charles R. Greco, who entered the same competition; he had in March, 1919, been censured by the Executive Committee for entering an unauthorized competition.

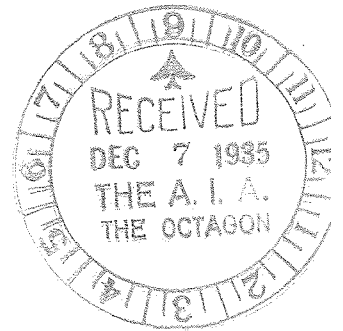

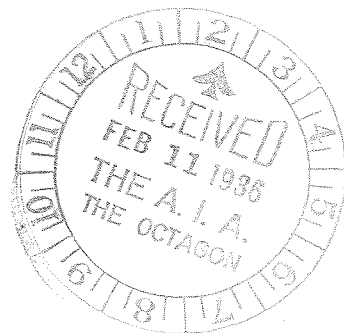

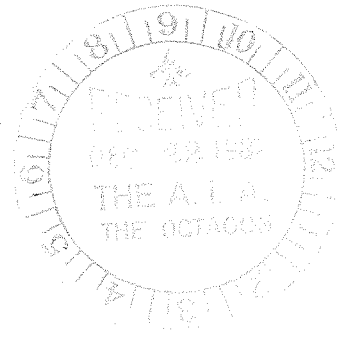

Enclosed is a copy of a letter I have written to the President of our Northeastern Section at Boston referring to an item appearing in the "Boston Daily Globe" of March 14, 1941, in which is featured the testimony given by Charles R. Greco, said to be an architect and Chairman of the State Art Commission of Massachusetts. The clipping bears a full-length picture, double column, and 7 inches in height of Mr. Greco.

In addition to Mr. Greco's testimony to the effect that he paid about \$21,000 to the Mayor, or to one Mannos, the article recounts that a member of this Society, Edward A. Varney, similarly paid a total of \$7,719.

The President of our Local Section has called this to my attention suggesting that it may be a matter for our Committee on Professional Conduct to investigate and I am writing this letter to you, not for the purpose of calling attention to Mr. Greco, but only that if the American Institute of Architects shall be interested as it is proposed that our Society shall be interested, I will be appreciative to you for letting me know what goes forward within your Institute.

Dear Mr. Farwell:

This will acknowledge with appreciation your letter of March 14th with its enclosure of a page from the "Boston Daily Globe" of Friday, March 14th, wherein attention is called to the testimony said to be given by Edward A. Varney, a member of the Society, in connection with the trial going forward with respect to Mayor John W. Lyons of Cambridge, and Paul Mannos, Brookline contractor.

The first paragraph of the item reads as follows:

"The government yesterday dropped 14 of 64 counts against Mayor John W. Lyons of Cambridge and the 61 against Paul Mannos, Brookline contractor, who are on trial in Middlesex Criminal Court charged with requesting and accepting bribes and conspiring to do both, and called as the final witness for the prosecution Charles R. Greco, architect and chairman of the State Art Commission."

As I read that paragraph, it would appear that there had been 61 counts against Paul Mannos and that all of those 61 counts had been dropped. It also appears that Varney's testimony had relation only to Mannos.

However, the second paragraph states: "It is expected that Dist. Atty. Robert F. Bradford will rest the government's case upon the completion this morning (Saturday, March 15) of Greco's testimony."

It will be appreciated if you could send to me a copy of newspaper account of what happened on Saturday morning. Also, it would be of help if I might know who is meant by the words "the government" in the first paragraph. Also, I hope that you will keep in touch with the situation sufficiently to know what becomes of Mr. Varney.

I take the liberty of asking these questions because I believe that if the Society's Committee on Professional Conduct is to take up this matter it would need that additional information.

Dear Mr. Seabury:

Your letter of March 17 came to hand yesterday, with reference to the report in the Boston Daily Globe of Friday, March 14, concerning the trial now going forward with respect to Mayor John W. Lyons of Cambridge and Paul Mannes, Brookline Contractor, who apparently are charged with the acceptance of bribes.

It is noted that the newspaper report mentions Mr. Charles R. Greco, who is described as an architect and Chairman of the State Art Commission.

Mr. Greco is a member of The American Institute of Architects and if a question arises as to his professional ethics it will automatically come before the Executive Committee of the Boston Chapter of The Institute.

In that event and should the Committee find an apparent case, the evidence would be submitted to the national committee of The Institute known as The Committee on Professional Practices, whose duty it is to investigate charges of unethical conduct.

Following such an investigation and in the event of apparent guilt, a final adjudication would be by The Board of Directors of The Institute.

In cases of this kind, no action is taken by The Institute as a national body in advance of action by the local chapter having jurisdiction.

If there are developments in this matter, we will not fail to send you such information as may be available.

CONFIDENTIAL NOTICE OF DISCIPLINARY ACTION

TO THE MEMBERS AND CHAPTERS OF
THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTS:

The by-laws of The Institute require that when a charge of unprofessional conduct has been acted on by The Board of Directors The Secretary shall send notice of the action taken to each member and chapter of The Institute.

The Board of Directors has acted on charges of unprofessional conduct before it, as follows:

Dismissal of Charges of Unprofessional Conduct

The Board dismisses charges of unprofessional conduct against P. John Hoener, corporate member, and exonerates him of the charge of injuring the professional reputation, prospects or practice of a fellow architect.

Participation in an Unauthorized Competition

The Board suspends the corporate membership of Mortimer J. Murphy for a period of two years, beginning March 19, 1942 and ending March 18, 1944, for unprofessional conduct in participating in an unauthorized architectural competition.

The Board suspends the corporate membership of Roswell E. Pfohl for a period of six months, beginning March 19, 1942 and ending September 18, 1942, for unprofessional conduct in participating in an unauthorized architectural competition.

Acts Detrimental to the Best Interests of the Profession

The Board terminates the corporate memberships of Horatio W. Beal, John W. Beal, Charles R. Greco, James E. McLaughlin, G. Houston Burr, and Herbert S. Cleverdon, effective March 19, 1942, for unprofessional practice detrimental to The Institute and to the profession at large while soliciting and securing public work.

Using the Mails to Defraud

The Board terminates the corporate membership of Leon C. Weiss, effective October 31, 1940, for unprofessional conduct in using the United States mails to defraud of which crime Leon C. Weiss was convicted on the 31st day of October, 1940, in the United States District Court.

Acts Detrimental to the Best Interests of the Profession

The Board terminates the corporate membership of George Edwin Bergstrom, effective March 21, 1942, for improper and unprofessional conduct as President and as a member of The Board of Directors during his term of office as President of The Institute.

The attention of every member and chapter of The Institute is called to the provision of the by-laws of The Institute, chapter XIII, article 2, section 7, which states that "the charges, evidence and action of The Board in any case of unprofessional conduct whereunder a penalty is imposed shall not be made public."

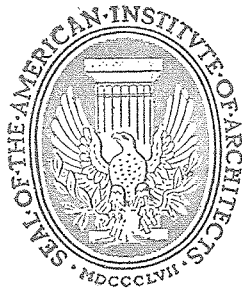
