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A member, by virtue of his membership in The Institute, becomes a member of the chapter of The Institute within the territory of which he resides or has his place of business, as he elects, but he pays an admission fee to The Institute only. The admission fee to membership in The Institute normally is twenty-five dollars. (For 1936 this fee was reduced to five dollars.)

A member pays annual dues both to The Institute and to the chapter. The annual dues to The Institute normally are twenty-five dollars (for 1936 Institute dues were reduced to twenty dollars) and those to the chapter are fixed in its by-laws.

Normally the period between the time of filing

an application and the time it is acted on by The Board of The Institute is four months. The period will be longer if the application must be returned to the applicant for corrections or if additional exhibits of the applicant's work are required by The Board of Examiners.

If an application is denied, the amount prepaid by the applicant for annual dues and for admission fee, less five dollars for examination fee, will be returned to him.

An applicant whose application has been denied without prejudice may reapply for admission to membership a year or more after the date of The Secretary's notice to him of his non-admission.

Church Architects Elect Grigg

ALEXANDRIA — Milton L. Grigg, well-known church architect, who maintains offices at 1420 Prince St., Alexandria, and in Charlottesville, was elected president of the Church Architectural Guild of America at the annual conference on church architecture in Seattle, Wash., last week.

More than 800 clergy architects and laymen attended the conference. Grigg succeeds Anthony Ferrara of Washington, D. C., who also has designed many churches in this area.

IN THE NORTHERN Virginia area, Grigg has designed the following churches in recent years: The Church of the Covenant (Presbyterian USA), Arlington; The Falls Church (Episcopal) restoration and addition; the Beverley Hills EUB. Church, Alexandria; Emmanuel-on-the-Hill (Zabriskie Chapel and parish hall); Temple Beth El, Alexandria; Grace Episcopal Church, Russell Road, Alexandria; St. Alban's Episcopal, Annandale; St. Michael's Episcopal, Arlington; the Christian Science Church, Russell Road, Alexandria; the First Congregational Church of Washington, and others.

Grigg was educated at Alexandria High School and the University of Virginia department of engineering and school of architecture. He also studied at the Beaux Arts Institute of Design.

HE WORKED ON the restoration of Williamsburg, and from 1942 to 1945 was chief of the design section of the Washington District of the Corps of Engineers. After the war he resumed private practice with offices in Charlottesville and Alexandria.

Grigg is a past president of the Virginia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, and is a member of the AIA College of Fellows, the Committee on Preservation of Colonial Churches, the Commission on Church Architecture of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia, and the national committee on religious buildings of the AIA. He is a Rotarian and a member of the Cosmos Club of Washington.

He is also a member of the Charlottesville planning commission and board of architectural review, is chairman of the city's building code review, and is a member of the mayor's Advisory Board of Alexandria.

Milton L. Grigg, FAIA, is senior partner in the firm of Grigg, Wood, and Browne, Charlottesville and Alexandria. Born in Alexandria, Va., in 1905, he attended the University of Virginia Department of Engineering and School of Architecture, as well as the Beaux Arts Institute of Design. He was elevated to the College of Fellows in 1953, for accomplishments in design.

Mr. Grigg served on the Committee on Standards and Acceptance, 1938, Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, 1954-57, and Committee on Religious Buildings, 1960-66. A member of the Virginia Chapter, AIA, since 1937, he has served as its President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Director, as well as member of several committees.

His principal commissions include numerous public and governmental buildings, such as the American Embassy Extension and the U.S. Information Building in Canberra, Australia, and the City Hall Police & Welfare Building and the Central Fire Headquarters in Charlottesville, Va., several hundred residences, some 60 restoration projects, and nearly 400 churches. Included in the list of restorations are Monticello, Gadsby's Tavern in Alexandria, Va., Cornwallis House in Wilmington, N.C., Christ Lutheran Church in York, Pa., and Albemarle County Court House in Charlottesville. His miscellaneous projects include the Thomas Jefferson Inn in Charlottesville, Sigma Nu National Headquarters, prefabricated redevelopment housing for the French Government, an industrial complex in Havana, Cuba, and City Plan for Hamilton, N.J. He also has served as consultant on set designing for Columbia Pictures and Paramount Pictures.

Mr. Grigg served as President of the Guild for Religious Architecture in 1963-65, and was a panelist at the International Conference on Church Art and Architecture in Lucerne, Switzerland, in 1961. He is President of The Interfaith Research Center on Religious Architecture (the AIA representative on the I.R.C. 
