It occurs to me that Mr. Grindle, because of his age and past service, may be eligible for transfer to the retired class which is exempt from the payment of dues.

Dear Mr. Foltz:

I write under difficulties so please excuse slovenliness etc. of note.

During bisit to my son in Indianapolis Thanksgiving I collapsed had to be brought home and from that time to date have been on the disabled list. A severe attack of sciatic rheumatism coupled with -- ---- (?) pneumonia floored me and I have not been able to leave my room to date - however, I seem to have won ant and am now convalescing and gaining strength.

In 1932 high blood pressure got me. I was ordered to leave my office and come here and rest. The depression was on - losing money every day I came home - had my traps and office moved here. I expect this to be my headquarters so long as I remain on this earthly sphere.

During the last 3 years my total professional income has not exceeded one thousand dollars and I have had to depend upon my son who has fortunately for me been able to help his mother and myself, notwithstanding he himself has had a hard fight. He pays my life insurance, taxes and much of our support and I hardly know how he has managed it. This being so -

I cannot allow him to sacrifice further by paying license and other fees, A.I.A. etc. It would be too much to ask.

Much as I wish otherwise I must let my A.I.A. membership go with great regret as I see no prospect of improvement for my circumstances - at least for some time.

My health and my age (73) handicap me greatly, naturally, as I can no longer actively employ myself instruggling with professional speculation and uncertainties.

June last I was appointed a Fee Architect for the F.H.A. Up to this date nothing whatever has materialized from it even to one dollar's return. I do not seem to have been able to obtain the benefit of a Bureau- cratic Swivel Chair appointment and I am evidently one of your "forgotten men".

All this does not prevent my continued interest in all that goes for the good of the cause. I am deeply interested in the success and welfare of the architect - particularly of the younger members of the profession for whom I visualize glorious opportunities. They must not be discouraged - difficulties must be met and conquered in which ease they will have a great

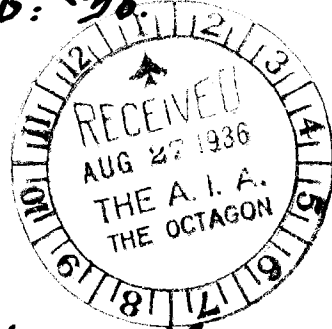

Dear Mr. Kelley:

Acknowledging your letter of January 26 and its enclosures, informing us of action taken by the chapter with regard to the indebtedness for chapter dues of Messrs. Wayne Everett Bell, and Alfred Grindle.

We note that at the annual meeting of the chapter, held January 22, 1938, Alfred Grindle was exempted from the payment of all chapter dues, and that chapter dues of Wayne E. Bell were remitted until such time as Mr. Bell was able to resume the practice of architecture.

According to The Institute records, Wayne Everett Bell was elected to corporate membership in The Institute on October 26, 1927 and now is indebted to The Institute for dues for the balance of 1937 and for 1938, a total of \$30.00. Alfred Grindle was elected a corporate member of The Institute November 30, 1930 and is now indebted to The Institute for dues for 1937 and 1938 in the amount of \$40.00 (Mr. Grindle's dues for 1934, 1935, and 1936 were remitted by action of The Board of Directors at their meeting in May, 1936).

We quote from The Institute By-Laws, Chapter I, Article 2, Section 6 - Exemption from Dues:

"Section 6. Exemption from Dues.

(a) Exemption by Retirement.

(a-1) Qualifications for Retirement. A corporate member who has been a corporate member in good standing in The Institute for not less than fifteen successive years immediately preceding the date of his appli-

"cation for retirement and either has attained the age of seventy years or is incapacitated and unable to engage in any vocation may be exempted by The Board from the payment of annual dues to The Institute. Under exceptional conditions and circumstances in any individual case, The Board may lessen the requirement of the period of good standing but no other requirement.

"(a-2) Retirement Effective. A member's exemption by retirement from the payment of annual dues shall be effective in The Institute and in each of its component organizations."

As remission of dues can be accomplished only by action of The Board of Directors, we are putting the Indiana Chapter's recommendations with regard to Messrs. Bell and Grindle on the agenda for the next meeting of The Board which will be held in April.

As Mr. Grindle is past seventy years of age, and inasmuch as The Board may lessen the requirement of the period of good standing, prerequisite to his being made a Member Emeritus, we enclose herewith copies of A.I.A. Form S40, Application for Retirement, with the suggestion that you have Mr. Grindle fill out copies in duplicate and send them to The Secretary of The Institute at The Octagon.

We will then be in a position to put the entire matter forward for consideration.
