

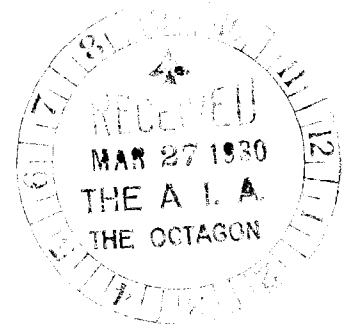

My dear Mr. Delano:

My partner, Mr. Clinton M. Hill, has been obliged to retire permanently on account of ill health and while he would be unwilling to give up his membership in the New York Chapter I know he would much appreciate being placed on the retired list as is provided for in the Constitution, Article 14, Section 1, subdivision 5.

Mr. Hill has not been active for a little over two years and is now residing in California, his address being 333 South Irving Boulevard, Los Angeles.

Mr. Hill's difficulty is of a serious nature which is probably incurable, and he realizes that he will not be able to resume practice, and has chosen the California climate as the best suited to his condition and will undoubtedly reside there permanently but will not practice there as he is not able to attend to any business.

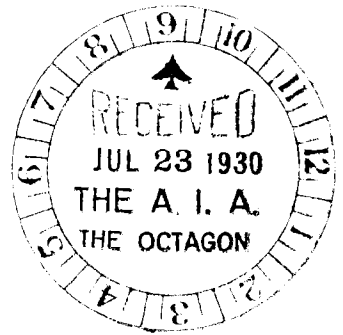

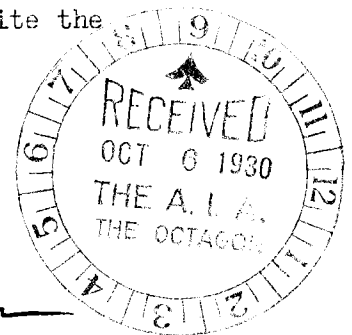
Dear Mr. Kemper:

Clinton Murdock Hill, a member of the firm of Jardine Hill & Murdock, architects, died at Los Angeles, California, on September 31st, after a long illness. Mr. Hill was born in Massachusetts in 1873 and practiced architecture in Boston as a member of the firms of Bacon & Hill and later Hill & James. His practice of architecture in New York commenced in 1910.

He was a former member of the Boston Society of Architects and the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

During his career he designed many outstanding buildings in New England and New York.

He is survived by his wife, Nellie Parsons Hill; his mother, Mrs. Julia E. Hill; his sister, Mabel E. Hill; two sons, Edward A. and Richardson; and two daughters, Evelyn and Virginia.
