Under Article IV, Section 3 of the Institute By-laws, as amended at the last Convention, a resignation should be made in writing to the Board of Directors of the Institute, and addressed to the Secretary of the members chapter, who shall then promptly submit it to the Executive Committee of the Chapter for consideration. After consideration by the Executive Committee of the Chapter, unless the resignation be withdrawn, it is sent with a statement regarding the members financial obligations to the Chapter, and such further comment as the Executive may deem desirable, to the Secretary of the Institute for official action.

This is the new procedure adopted by the last Convention (see page 28 of the Proceedings) and must be complied with before a resignation can properly be placed before the Board of Directors.

An insistence upon the procedure is required of us here at the Octagon, and I trust you will not attribute to this letter a desire to be technical.


