

In reply to your letter of November 22 concerning the status of Mr. Henri Rush of the St. Louis Chapter:

According to Institute records, Mr. Rush suspended his membership on December 31, 1938, at which time he owed dues in the amount of \$20.00. Mr. Rush now owes dues for 1939 in the amount of \$20.00, making a total of \$40.00, and his membership will be terminated on December 31, 1939 unless payment in full is received before that time.

According to Institute By-Laws, Chapter I, Article 2, Section 6, a corporate member may be exempted from the payment of annual dues and become a Member Emeritus is he has been in good standing in The Institute for not less than 15 successive years immediately preceding the date of his application for retirement and either has attained the age of seventy years or is incapacitated and unable to engage in any vocation.

Mr. Rush cannot qualify for retirement under the 15-year good standing stipulation as he was elected to membership in 1932. The Board has the power to lessen the requirement of good standing (15 years) but no other requirement.

If Mr. Rush is incapacitated or more than seventy years of age, he should restore his membership to good standing before December 31, 1939, and then make application for election to the status of Member Emeritus, petitioning The Board to waive the 15-year requirement.
