Dear Sir:

I realize that my long delay in complying with your request for further information on my application for membership in the Institute is an awkward gesture, to say the least. May, I offer a word of explanation.

As you observed from my application I am retained by the Shell Petroleum Corporation in the capacity of architect. I am responsible for the designing and executing of working drawings for service stations for our entire territory which reaches from the Gulfito the Canadian Border and from Ohio to Iowa. Needless to say we turn out a vast quantity of work during the course of a year. I have a draughting room employing nine men constantly busy, and from all indications I will have to augment this force to accommodate our spring building program. Now, the explanation! At the beginning of November we started on our building program for next year which involved the expenditure of several million dollars. Since this program was approved I have been busy day and night developing new schemes and formulating my work for the next year. This lengthly discussion will indicate to you, I hope, that my delay in answering your letter was not prompted by a feeling of procrastination.

I am sending you, under separate cover, blueprints and photographs of some of my work in service stations and some other jobs done in partnership with my father under the firm name of Henri Rush and Company. I have labeled these various units Exhibit "A", "B", "C", etc., and will briefly describe them in the following:

SERVICE STATIONS

Exhibit "A". Delmar and Hanley, University City, Mo.

This service station comprising an office unit and a separate

lubrication building was designed to conform with some of the latest stations built in California by the Shell Oil Company (This company operates along the West Coast). The basic design was modified to conform to our different climatic and marketing conditions. The exterior of stucco and cast stone was painted with cream colored cement paint so that these buildings have a monolithic appearance that is quite unusual. This design was not favorably received because the cost of these units was too great for the revenue derived from most locations.

Exhibit "B". Oneida and East River, Davenport, Iowa.

This building was designed for locations where cheaper buildings were required. You will observe that the drawings indicate a cast stone and stucco building but the photographs indicate a brick building. This change was made in Davenport without preparation of drawings for this revised treatment so I do not have drawings available for a brick building. Neither do I have photographs of a building of this type executed as shown on the drawings. You will observe, however, that the basic design is maintained and brick was used only because of economy.

Exhibit "C". 38th and College, Indianapolis, Ind.

This is one of our more pretentious stations built in a profitable neighborhood. We have built a number of Terra Cotta stations where the revenue or advertising justified their installation and these stations have been very favorably received by the public. It must be remembered, however, that stations of this character comprise only about 15% of our buildings, the majority being smaller and more modest in character for economic reasons.

Exhibit "D". Main and Eagle, Houston, Texas.

This design executed in cast stone and stucco is a favorite in our southern territory. You will observe that my perspective drawing for this type station is a bit crude but I bring to your attention the fact that I cannot find time to go into more elaborate delineation in presenting designs to the Management for approval. Moreover I do not attempt to sell the design but merely present a rough indication of how the station will look.

STUDIO ALTERATION

Exhibit "E".

This job was rather an interesting one. The problem was the alteration of an old stable in back of an old-time mansion into living quarters. The front building was used for an undertaking establishment, and Mr. Craig and his wife were living in the upper floor of this

building. The atmosphere, although restful, was not particularly cheerful so they decided to remodel the upper part of the stable.

The lower part of the stable is used as a garage for two hearse and also houses a hot air heating plant. The entire second floor was made into living quarters. I am sending "before" and "after" pictures to show you how this problem was handled. The remodeling resulted in a very cheerful little apartment.

HOSPITAL BUILDING

Exhibit "F".

This building was executed by my father and me in 1935. The rather poor snapshots show the rear building complete and in use with the front residence still in tact and connected to the rear building. I have no photographs of the interior or good photographs of the exterior to date, but if you desire interior views I shall have some made.

The front building which will replace the present residence will be built when financing for this project is completed. I am sending you the drawings of this front building so that you may see the relationship between the wing now built and the future hospital building.

I have attempted to comply with your request for examples of work but should these exhibits be insufficient I will gladly send you other examples. I am quite anxious to be admitted to membership in this organization because of its prestige and the excellent work the Institute has done in advancing the architectural profession.

I am also enclosing a check for five dollars to cover my initiation fee. If there are any other details that might delay my admittance to the Institute I would be glad to complete them in an expeditious manner upon notification from you.







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Dawson, Evans, Rush Join Octagon Staff

Executive Director William H. Scheick AIA has announced the appointment of three men to the Octagon staff:

C. Henri Rush AIA of Washington, D. C., succeeds Kenneth C. Landry AIA as head of the Department of Institute Relations. Landry was appointed director of the Division of Public Services last April. Rush, a native of St. Louis, brings to the position a wide and varied background in government and private practice, including five years as architect-engineer advisor for U. S. military construction in Formosa; three years as an administrator in the Agencies Coordination Division of the Smaller War Plants Corp., and two years as chief priority specialist for the War Production Board.

John F. Dawson AIA of Ann Arbor, Mich., succeeds M. Elliott Carroll AIA as head of the Department of State, Chapter and Student Affairs. Carroll was appointed director of the Division of Professional Services earlier this year. Dawson has been a faculty member in the Department of Architecture at the University of Michigan since 1956.

Ben H. Evans AIA of College Station, Tex., becomes head of the newly created Department of Research. Since 1952 he has served as coordinator of architectural research at Texas A & M College. A native Texan, Evans is immediate past president of the Brazos Chapter, AIA.

Eric Pawley AIA resigned recently as the Institute's research secretary to accept a position as professor of architecture at the University of Southern California. He will teach and also direct USC's research in architecture.

'Report' Returns for Urgent Matters

The REPORT, AIA's newsletter of government and legislative affairs which was discontinued last March, returned this month with a new mission. Beginning with issue #13, mailed to the membership July 10, the REPORT was reinstituted as a medium for communicating government and legislative news of particular urgency to the membership.

Henceforth, whenever urgent developments occur which the membership should be immediately made aware of, a REPORT will be issued. Often, as with #13, it will request specific action from the membership. Its red masthead will signal its urgency.

The REPORT, in its old format, was merged with the MEMO last April, and the MEMO became a fortnightly publication. This allowed the Institute to disseminate all news affecting the profession while it was still timely and fresh. Future issues of the REPORT will not affect the MEMO's regular schedule, and the MEMO will continue to carry government and legislative news.

Mies Awarded Medal of Freedom

The highest civilian honor which a U. S. President can bestow in peacetime is the Presidential Medal of Freedom. On July 4 President Kennedy announced the award of Freedom Medals to 31 citizens, one of them to Architect Ludwig Mies van der Rohe FAIA. The medal will be presented in ceremonies at the White House in September.

The Medals are awarded to persons who have made meritorious contributions to (1) the security or national interests of the U. S., (2) world peace, or (3) cultural or other significant public or private endeavors. Mies received AIA's highest honor, the Gold Medal, in 1960.
