SECTION 1. DIGEST OF CAREER AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Herbert K. Gallagher, Cambridge, Massachusetts

DESIGN

- a. Coming to The Architects Collaborative in 1953 after a period of practice and teaching at the University of British Columbia as well as research in building sciences at Pennsylvania State University Thermal Laboratory and the National Research Council of Canada, Mr. Gallagher was made an associate of TAC in 1955. He acted as Co-Principal and Principal in many significant school projects and later in the field of urban design and health care. Among the educational facilities are the Wayland Senior High School, Wayland, Massachusetts, which received a special citation by AASA which was published in January 1960 by EFL as a profile of a significant school. This was one of the first schools in the nation employing team teaching techniques and grouped under the house system around a central resource area. Also significant in this design was one of the first uses of a geodesic dome to enclose a large physical education facility in secondary education. From this departure, Mr. Gallagher was Co-Principal directly responsible for the design of the Fox Lane Middle School in Mt. Kisco, New York, selected for exhibit by the AASA in 1967 as a further example of open planning and the house system. In 1967 Mr. Gallagher received a national honor award of the AIA as Co-Principal of the C. Thurston Chase Learning Center at Eaglebrook School, Deerfield, Massachusetts. In 1968 this project was awarded the Architectural Award of Excellence from the American Institute of Steel Construction. Other design projects of note include the Fine Arts Center at Northwestern Michigan College, Traverse, City, Michigan, completed in 1975, and the Norwell High School, Norwell, Massachusetts. This latter school was the culmination of many advances in systems technology employing a precast structural system, integrated lighted ceiling system with flexible wiring, the design of which was developed for industry under the direction of the nominee.

URBAN DESIGN

A significant contribution in the field of urban design by the nominee is the masterplanning and execution of the first units of the Tufts New England Medical Center, Boston, Massachusetts. In a tightly congested urban site, this project was conceived as a megastructure which would permit a gradual expansion of a teaching medical center crossing over city streets by means of air rights and integrating commercial shopping vitality on the street level providing equivalent tax return to the city and at the same time permitting orderly expansion of the Medical Center's needs. The nominee had a key role in bringing five different entities to work together and create a single megastructure facility by means of a merger of three hospital entities and ultimately employing interlocking condominium ownership of functional space. The achievement of air rights approval resulted from a 2-year effort on the part of the nominee and the Planning Office of the Medical Center to achieve approval of the Redevelopment Authority and Public Facilities Department. The first two units were completed in 1973.

PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

Section 1. Digest of Career and Achievements (Continued)

Herbert K. Gallagher, Cambridge, Massachusetts

Mr. Gallagher became a full Principal and Director of TAC at the time of incorporation in 1964. In 1972 he was elected President of the firm and served three years until 1975. Under the nominee's leadership the firm made extensive expansion from primarily a regional practice to a national and international practice, expanding its services to include strong departments of interior design, graphics, and computer technology. Under his leadership the firm expanded in size and scope in the midst of economic decline in the U.S. He was instrumental in bringing to TAC many advances in business administration while still maintaining the principles of the collaborative design approach. Mr. Gallagher served the Boston Society of Architects on the Honors and Awards Committee in 1970, 1971, and 1972 and served on the Harleston Parker Medal Committee in 1967, 1968, and 1969. Enclosed in this presentation as an exhibit is an address given by Mr. Gallagher to the NCARB annual convention in Hawaii in July of 1968. The remarks therein indicate his thoughtful concern for the future of professional practice. I highly recommend the granting of a fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.

While serving as a Director of TAC, the nominee while continuing to manage design and projects, took an active role as Chairman of various committees including long-range planning, personnel, and later as director of the entire marketing area of the firm. During his term as president of TAC, which was uniquely extended to a third year, the nominee gradually relinquished involvement of design of projects while directing the firm through a major growth period to the point where it is today - one of the largest pure design firms in the country. He was responsible for initiating the growth of interiors and graphics departments and the introduction of computer technology, both for business and for design purposes. At the same time he made efforts to improve areas of quality control and cost control. With timely expansion into overseas markets, TAC was able to survive the economic decline in the early 1970's.



I am very pleased to be asked to act as a reference for Mr. Herbert K. Gallagher in his nomination for Fellowship to the American Institute of Architects. I apologize for not have responded more promptly as I have been out of the country.

I have known Mr. Gallagher since 1953 when he joined The Architects Collaborative. He was at that time an extremely bright, young man with good experience and obvious potential. Herb is, in my opinion, a very good, all-around architect. He has strong design ability as well as a good sense of management and job production. He works well with others as a member of a team. This ability and the general respect he commands by doing a good job led him to become, first, an Associate at TAC and subsequently a Principal in 1964. 


