The nominee has for twenty-five years specialized in design and construction of schools. Years of research and development have resulted in office standards which are briefly enumerated as follows:

- 1. Site planning must give consideration to community and neighborhood needs as well as provide for flexibility and future expansion.
- 2. The buildings must be designed to provide control of sound, sunlight and daylighting; with consideration for size, shape and scale of the rooms; with provision for expansibility and flexibility as it affects future educational needs; with soundness of structure.
- 3. Use of materials, with full regard for soundness of structure, must present general characteristics of suitability for educational services and economical maintenance rather than monumental grandeur.

This criteria is best illustrated by the accompanying photographs. The composite view of the several school sites shows the variations of planning developed to provide pleasant and practical composition and to take advantage of the site conditions as regards orientation, accessibility, expansibility while reflecting thoughtful regard for the different instructional and activity needs of the educational program.

EXHIBIT ONE

Administration Building and Classroom Building, Savanna School, Stanton, California. Noteworthy is the use of extensive roof overhang to form covered walks and the horizontal louvers which provide glare control of sunlight.

EXHIBIT TWO

Classroom Interior of the Savanna School, showing dihedral ceiling. Cabinets provide storage for ample supply of educational materials, enclosed wardrobe space, teachers closet, etc. Attention is called to the easel boards which are stowable in a lower cabinet thus providing ample work counter.

EXHIBIT THREE

Administration Building, Visalia Senior High School, Visalia, California, is a view from the west which illustrates the use of vertical louvers for sunlight control.

EXHIBIT FOUR

Visalia High School, close-up view showing cantilever, construction of roof and second floor corridor. The building is a reinforced concrete structure, laid out in 12 foot modules.

EXHIBIT FIVE

George M. Green Auditorium, Inglewood High School, Inglewood, California. The structure is of reinforced concrete with steel trusses and steel panel roof and is designed to seat 1,000 persons.

EXHIBIT SIX

Kindergarten and Classroom Building, Big Bear Lake School, Big Bear Lake, California, is situated on mountain terrain in snow country north of San Bernardino, California. The walls are constructed of reinforced concrete; roofs are wood framed with heavy gauge aluminum covering for easy maintenance and fire protection.

EXHIBIT SEVEN

Administration Building, Susan Miller Dorsey High School, Los Angeles, California. The use of reinforced concrete for exterior walls is exploited esthetically by the use of rough horizontal form boards to present a pleasing soft texture.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN SCIENCE OF CONSTRUCTION

The nominee's observation of damage resulting from California earthquakes and experience in the specialty of school design and construction reflects the soundness of structure in the frame of the classroom building. Research and experience has established an office standard of a modular frame with fixed-end columns to transfer seismic forces to foundations.

EXHIBIT EIGHT

Classroom Building Frame, 154th Street School, Lawndale, California, using glued laminated wood beams on steel tube or pipe columns, set up on 8 foot modules. Beams extended to provide framing for roof overhang on the corridor side of building. Dropped stiffeners form frame for typical dihedral ceiling. Use of wood, as illustrated here, is a solution to the problems advanced by material restrictions or shortages.

EXHIBIT NINE

Classroom Building Frame, 168th Street School, Lawndale, California, is variation of use of glued laminated wood beams for roof framing. Framing contemplates a pitched roof to provide maximum sunlight control at minimum cost; corridor and out-door activity area are to be combined on north side of the building, on which side the roof is cantilevered; south side has high windows for bilateral lighting, which windows are protected by glare control louvers.

EXHIBIT TEN

Classroom Building Frame, George Air Force Base School, Adelanto, California, shows development of structural frame and sill walls constructed of precast reinforced concrete members, fabricated at the site and "tilted-up" into place. The 8 foot module is maintained with the arches above the wall panels left exposed. Wall panels which have been cast on the floor slab are being raised into position.

Nominee's Achievement in Science of Construction (Continued)

EXHIBIT ELEVEN

Classroom Building Frame, Savanna School, Stanton, California, using steel trusses and pipe columns for roof framing. Photograph illustrates the framing for the dihedral ceiling, which framing provides for necessary depth of truss while preserving the straight plane of roof surface, maintaining a pleasing "child-scale" and to aid in deflecting light and sound. Structure consists of light steel trusses set up at 8'-0" modules on 4" pipe columns embedded in the reinforced concrete sill walls which provide fixity for the columns and transfer seismic forces to the foundation.

EXHIBIT TWELVE

Hughes Aircraft Company, Cargo Plane Assembly Building, Culver City, California, exemplifies an early and somewhat daring use of glued laminated wood structural members in connection with one of the industrial plants designed by the nominee. Facility requirements for the Cargo Plane Assembly Building, wartime material restrictions and unstable foundation soil conditions resulted in a unique structural problem in wood framing to obtain clear spans of 125 feet and clear height of 65 feet.

EXHIBIT THIRTEEN

Hughes Aircraft Company, Cargo Plane Assembly Building, illustrates construction details at center bearing of the double arched structure. Storage Mezzanine framing is also shown. The use of I-beam shaped glued laminated wood arches of three-hinge design was determined after careful consideration of all restrictions and requirements.

EXHIBIT FOURTEEN

Light steel trusses and framing for the Susan Miller Dorsey High School, Los Angeles, California. Due to very poor foundation soil bearing capacity, light weight construction on piling was indicated. The notable feature of the resulting structure is the adaptation of steel columns on piling at the corridor walls from which light steel roof trusses are cantilevered out over the reinforced concrete exterior sill walls which carry no loading.
