


Dear Sirs:




This letter is an endorsement of the nomination of Sanford W. Goin of Gainesville for advancement to fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.



Gentlemen:

It is with a great deal of personal pleasure that I heartily endorse the nomination by The Florida Association of Architects, A.I.A., of Sanford W. Goin for Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects, based on his achievements in Service to the Institute and in Public Service. The factual information with respect to Sanford W. Goin's achievements is included in the formal nomination papers. It is my purpose to substantiate that such achievements have constituted a real service to the profession and that his service has been rendered so faithfully, efficiently and strikingly that it has become outstanding and inspiring and has resulted in a notable contribution to the advancement of the architectural profession; also, that the Civic Service which Sanford W. Goin has performed in public and semi-public office has been of inestimable value to his community. In furnishing such substantiation, it will be impossible to itemize in complete detail all of the many outstanding achievements of Sanford W. Goin. It will be my purpose, however, to seek to show through the circumstances surrounding certain of his activities with which I am most familiar, that Sanford W. Goin is thereby worthy of elevation to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects.

For many years the City of Gainesville, Florida had only one architect regularly practicing in his own name. It has often occurred to me that had that architect been one who was less dynamic and vigorous than Sanford W. Goin, Gainesville could not have been the fine City which it is today. The aggressiveness which Sanford W. Goin has always shown for the right as he sees it, has resulted in his having served outstandingly, unselfishly and constructively in numerous public and semi-public offices in Gainesville. The word "Architect" has thus come to mean to the many high officials of Gainesville, with whom he has come in contact, the utmost in straight thinking and conscientious effort to achieve the most for the largest number of people. The time and effort so expended by Sanford W. Goin, at considerable expense to himself, has been a continuing inspiration to us, his fellow architects.

Amongst the many unselfish and time-consuming services which Sanford W. Goin has rendered to The American Institute of Architects through his work in The Florida Association of Architects, A.I.A., the following two items are examples of the excellence and thoroughness of his work:

1. The booklet entitled "Better Planning Makes Better Schools", which was written almost single-handedly by Sanford W. Goin, as Chairman of The Florida Association of Architects, Special Committee on Architectural Services to School Boards, illustrates through the wide acceptance and approval which it has received the outstanding ability of the Nominee. This booklet has received wide acclaim throughout the United States, and has resulted in the position of the Florida architect being firmly established in correct relationship with the new multi-million dollar school construction program in this State. Permission has been granted for the booklet to be quoted, and the architects of South Carolina have issued their own publication of a similar nature, with the text and illustrations having been lifted almost verbatim from The Florida Association of Architect's booklet. The South Carolina publication has probably received as much as, or more commendation than The Florida Association of Architects' booklet, from school officials and architects throughout the country, further reflecting on the fine work of Sanford W. Goin.

2. As Chairman of the Legislative Committee of The Florida Association of Architects during the past six years, the writer has had occasion to call upon Sanford W. Goin for assistance in promoting the endeavors of the architectural profession with members of the Florida Legislature. An excellent example of the selfless service which Sanford W. Goin has always contributed, is his work during the 1953 Session of the Florida Legislature. One of the objectives of The Florida Association of Architects in recent years has been to reduce, and if possible, eliminate the inroads on the practice of the architectural profession, which have been made by State and Governmental bureaus, as particularly exemplified by the State Improvement Commission. During the 1953 Session of the Legislature, we at last found ourselves face to face with the opportunity to accomplish some results along this line. The State Improvement Commission came into disrepute during 1952 through reported improper substitution of materials, omissions of proper credit items to the State, and poor administrative procedures with respect to several construction jobs for which it handled the design and supervision. A select committee of the 1953 Legislature requested of the architectural profession in Florida, assistance in furnishing responsible technical assistance in their investigation of these irregularities. Sanford W. Goin and R. Daniel Hart were requested by The Florida Association of Architects to go to the State Capitol at Tallahassee to assist the State Government in this matter. Sanford W. Goin went to Tallahassee entirely at his own expense, and as the Chairman of the two man committee made a personal study of the drawings and specifications prepared by the State Improvement Commission and of the work in place as a result of these documents. After a characteristically thorough investigation, extending over a period of several days, a written report was submitted, which was a masterpiece of carefully evaluated and documented recounting of the numerous irregularities which were found. The objectiveness of this report and the convincing personal testimony of Sanford W. Goin brought great credit and new stature to the profession.

October 26, 1953

The report was carried at some length in leading Florida newspapers and Sanford W. Goin was extended the appreciation of the Legislature for his fine work. The result has been the elimination of the architectural activities of the Florida State Improvement Commission, and the use of private architectural firms for the professional services needed during the current \$37,000,000.00 building program for State Institutions.

During the period when the undersigned was President of The Florida Association of Architects, I became intimately acquainted with Sanford W. Goin, since he served as Secretary-Treasurer of the organization during that period. The large quantity of routine and worthwhile work which he accomplished was entirely beyond the call of duty and resulted in The Florida Association of Architects being placed on a level far above that which it had previously held. I watched him carry this same spirit of selfless labor into his job as President of The Florida Association of Architects for two terms, and found that as a result of his activities the State Association became accepted in all branches of Florida life, as representing the profession in the finest manner possible.

The nomination of Sanford W. Goin for A.I.A. Fellowship by The Florida Association of Architects is the first so submitted by that organization, and I am sure that your thorough study and investigation of Sanford W. Goin will result in the realization that he is eminently worthy of the elevation to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects.

I know of no individual who has contributed a more valuable service for the betterment of the profession and for the Florida Association of Architects.

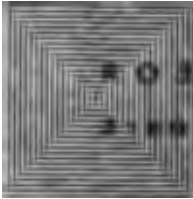


I am very happy to have the opportunity of adding my endorsement to the nomination of Sanford W. Goin for advancement to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.

2. Public Service.


