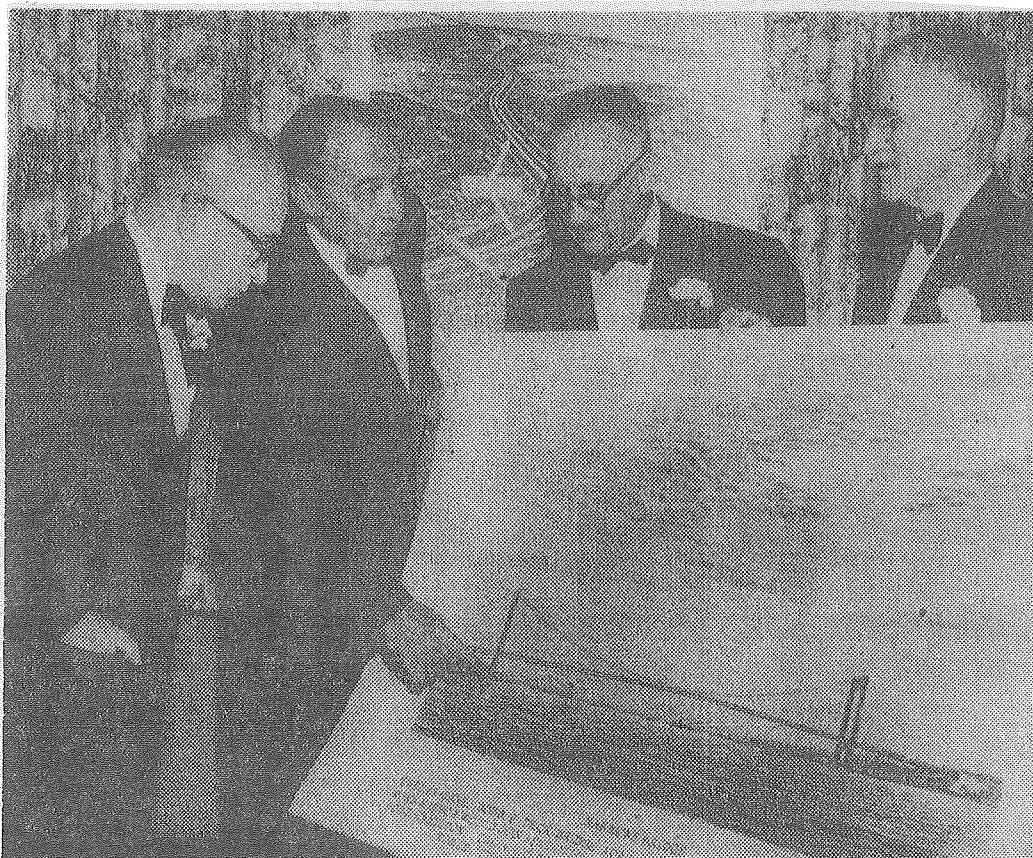

Dear Mr. Goldberg:

We have learned with pleasure that you have been selected as Chairman of the Regional Judiciary Committee for the New York District and have accordingly enrolled your name. You are undertaking an important assignment and one which entails a considerable amount of responsibility. It will be necessary for you, therefore, to divorce yourself from all local discussion of ethical matters and absent yourself from any meeting where such matters are discussed.

The function of the Regional Judiciary Committee is to act primarily in the manner of a grand jury and to determine as to how the cases which are brought before it may best be disposed of and make recommendations accordingly. It is not the function of a Regional Judiciary Committee or any of its members to act as prosecutor or to instigate proceedings in matters of unprofessional conduct (unless you should find yourself a direct party to some case, in which instance you would have to disqualify yourself from further action as a member of the Judiciary Committee in that particular case).

For your information, we are sending you copies of relevant portions of the By-laws of The Institute, the Judiciary Procedures, and a review of some of the judiciary cases taken from the files of The Institute.

As questions arise, we shall endeavor to keep all judiciary committees informed so that actions and procedures will be as uniform as possible throughout the domain of The Institute.


