Mr. Gove is an authority on institutional planning. For many years he has been in close contact with this type of design, and is not only familiar with the architectural and structural problems, but the humanitarian and sociological aspects as well.

His researches in the work have carried him throughtout the United States and abroad, and he has made important contributions to this field of architecture. Especially noteworthy is his three wing, star shaped, hospital ward building for centralized control and services, giving maximum light and air to the patients. This design has been carried out at the Western State Hospital, Fort Steilacoom.



Applications for membership in the Chapter were received from Mr. George Gove, Mr. Myron P. Potter and Mr. Earl N. Dugan, of Tacoma and after information supplied by Mr. Bullard that is appended, it was unanimously voted to recommend their election at the following Chapter meeting.

Information supplied by Mr. Bullard, as follows:

Mr. George Gove, studied in Paris, in Atelier (Understeecht) for one year, took special work at the Washington University, St. Louis, was later with Parrish and Schroeder, then on the Stanford University Buildings, California, and also two years on work at the St. Louis World's Fair.

Although he has not held particular office, he has always participated in chapter activities, giving his time and energy freely in all causes that seemed to the best interests of the group. He is generally considered our "youngest" older member and has gained the respect and devotion of all through his tireless and unselfish activity.

Mr. Gove has served on the Education, City Planning, Honor Award, and Program committees, and is at present the secretary of the Tacoma Society of Architects.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

1. List the public offices held by the nominee and the positions of trust held by him in recognition of civic leadership, and state clearly his notable work in public service and the particular influence of that work which the nominators believe to be a notable contribution to the advancement of the profession.

Mr. Gove was the chairman of the Washington State Board of Examiners 1924-1932.

In public service Mr. Gove's participation is of a general rather than of any specialized nature. He has long been an ardent student of History, Art, and Architecture. He takes a keen and analytical interest in world affairs and has been active in various peace movements. His ideas are often visionary and many projects may be traced back to his original conception, such as a plan for the Washington State 50th Anniversary Celebration, 1939; a theme for the Washington State exhibit at the New York, 1935 Architectural League exhibit; The annual local sketch competition for architects and draftsmen, etc.

Outstanding and unique among Mr. Gove's activities is his lifelong devotion to the "nouveaus" of the profession. Over 100 men from this region have come under his personal guidance and inspiration during his 25 years of practice in Tacoma. Many young men, unable or not desiring to attend architectural schools have found a worthy substitute as apprentices and draftsmen in his office. To these men he has given freely of his time and energy, advising, laying out courses of study, encouraging to do architectural problems, competitions, sketching, preparation for state license examinations and always inspiring with his endless optimism and enthusiasm. Many have gone on to schools or active practice, scattered to the four corners of the United States. Among those who have made good in their particular field, are-

Robert Durham - office of Dudley Stuart, Seattle, Wash.
Chester Benjamin - model builder at Grand Coulee Dam, Wash.
Walter Lund - with Boeing Airplane Co. Seattle, Washington.

At the same time Mr. Gove has always been interested in the work of the University architecture schools, especially the University of Washington, Washington State College, University of Oregon, University of Idaho, and the Tacoma and Seattle High Schools. He frequently visits these schools, giving talks on architectural subjects and assisting at judgments of design problems.

He has promoted the annual A.I.A. sketch competition and exhibit for northwest architects and draftsmen for years. In this work he personally organized the entries, secures prizes from various sources, and sees that the drawings are judged and exhibited throughout the State.

Through his work with the "younger men" Mr. Gove has become an inspiration for all who follow the architectural profession in the northwest.


