Mr. Kemper, who has just gone to New York, gave me today your letter of January 15th, asking me to measure the Lincoln Memorial and to wire you the results. On my own initiative I am taking the liberty of prolonging the suspense until a letter can reach you.

To give you a first hand report, I sent one of my men to the office where the drawings of the Memorial are kept. His memeorandum is as follows:

"A straight edge applied to the 2" detail shows the Doric columns have a distinct entasis departing from a straight line slightly more than 1" at the widest part of the curve. The lower diameter of the columns is 7'- 22", the upper diameter 5'-9". These dimensions are scaled from the drawing and are only approximations since the proportions of this structure are attained thru subtleties impossible to accurately discover at this scale. A reproduction of the drawing referred to here will be found in Pencil Points of October, 1923."

As this question is now settled and you are open for other problems, may I charge you for service rendered by calling your attention to the enclosed felders? Will you assist your Chapter representative, Mr. Wm. H. Schmehardt, in our efforts to obtain a planning commission for Washington?



## Death Takes . C. Guth. 59

Milwaukeean Recognized Nationally for Research on Historic Buildings

Alexander C. Guth, 59, Milwaukee architect, recognized nationally for his research on historic Wisconsin

buildings, died Tuesday at his home, 1931 N. 73rd st. A lifelong Milwaukeean, Mr. Guth became interested in architecture while working as office boy for Herman W. Herman Buemming, a local architect. His employer was so impressed by the youth's eagerness to learn that he obtained

a scholarship for him to Columbia university, New York City. After Mr. Guth's return from college, he entered the Buemming firm as an active partner. In 1926 he joined the firm of Herbst & Kuenzli as head draftsman. He left the firm in 1933 when his health began to fail.

Was His Hobby, Too

Architecture was both a profession and a hobby for Mr. Guth. Because of his extensive study of the development of Wisconsin architecture, Secretary Ickes selected him to direct the Historic American Buildings survey begun in Wisconsin in 1933. Under his direction a corps of architects measured scores of old buildings in Milwaukee and other Wisconsin cities and made detailed drawings of the structures. These drawings are on file in the national archives in Washington,

Mr. Guth's most recent activity was the preservation of the Benjamin Church homestead, the second oldest surviving structure in Milwaukee, which now stands in Estabrook park. A series of articles on historic old houses in the Milwaukee area were prepared by Mr. Guth in 1940 and printed in The Journal.

Officer of Society

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Mr. Guth established a record unequalled in the American Institute of Architects-14 consecutive terms as secretafy-treasurer of the Wis-consin chapter. The AIA and the consin chapter. The AIA and the Wisconsin chapter elected him to life membership as a result of his achievement. For many years he was also an active worker in the Milwaukee Businessmen's Sketch club. He also held an honorary membership in the Seven Arts society and the Archaeological society of Wisconsin.

Mr. Guth was one of the founders of the Milwaukee County Historical society of which he was later voted a life membership. For many years he was active in the City club's city

planning committee.

#### Member of Masons

An active member of Masonic organizations, his affiliations included the McKinley lodge, F. and A. M.; the Palmer chapter, R. and A. M.; and the Ivanhoe commandery. He was also a member of the Garfield lodge of the Knights of Pythias.

Survivors are his wife, Laura; two sons, Maj. Sylvester of the army engineers, Fort Belvoir, Va., and Stanley of Milwaukee; his father, Louis Guth; and three sisters, Mrs. E. L. Jius of St. Louis, Mo., and Mrs. Olive Williams and Miss Adela Guth of Milwaukee.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at the Ritter chapel, 5310 W. North av. Burial will be in Wanderers' Rest cemetery. The body will be at the chapel after 1

p. m. Wednesday.
