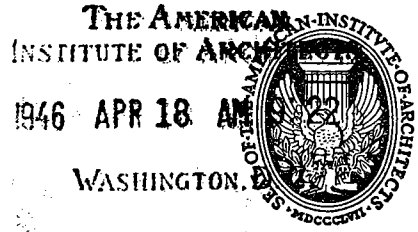

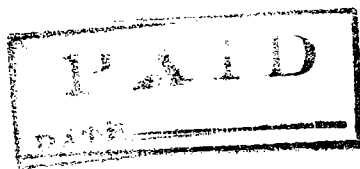



NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE

1. List the public offices held by the nominee and the positions of trust held by him in recognition of civic leadership, and state clearly his notable work in public service and the particular influence of that work which the nominators believe to be a notable contribution to the advancement of the profession.

COUNTY PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION

The Nominee is a charter member of this organization. He was named Vice-Chairman in December, 1935 and Chairman in September, 1956, which office he has occupied to date. Concurrently he was named Chairman of Maricopa County Executive Parks Commission, being appointed by the Governor in March, 1964. This is the legal entity of the County Commission.

During this tenure his cohorts have expressed deep appreciation of the tremendous drive and knowledge that he has exhibited in planning for recreational facilities and his deep understanding of the need for such facilities. The Nominee is credited with being "the driving force" in the acquisition of some 93,000 acres of land for County Park use and development. Over seven years ago it was under his direction that the Youth Work Camp Program was instituted which has since become a hallmark of such activities nationwide. The principle concerns of this body, primarily under the energetic direction of the Nominee, have been for rational long-range planning for development of park facilities utilizing existing and extensive canal systems within the County, beautification of the canal areas and other properties within the Park System, development of total park site concepts including riding trails, picnic grounds and other amenities for the greater enjoyment of public use of such facilities. Both fellow volunteer members of the Commission as well as paid County employees serving the organization credit the Nominee with being principally responsible for the receipt by that organization recently of a commendation for "framing of one of the nation's concepts of park policies to curb urban encroachment of our park lands". The results of his efforts have reportedly served as a model of Park & Recreational facilities master planning around the nation. It has unquestionably been due to the architectural background and orientation of the Nominee that so much success has been achieved in this type of master planning.

DON'S CLUB (an organization dedicated to the perpetuation and appreciation of the history, culture and natural attributes of the Southwest, particularly Arizona and immediate surroundings.

The Nominee first became a member of this organization in 1935 and is the oldest continually active member. He became President in 1940 and held many offices and shared numerous committees. He is credited with inaugurating the design and erection of

historical markers around the State setting forth important historical data concerning the numerous historical sites of interest to both the resident citizen and the tourist at locations which had previously been unmarked. In 1945 the Nominee, accompanied by his wife and another couple of the Don's Club made a trip (in costume) to Washington, D.C. to research the Library of Congress records regarding information pertinent to the Lost Dutchman's Mine, famous in legend in this area. En route both to Washington and on return, the Nominee and this small group were met at numerous airports around the country by the Mayors and important citizens of the various communities, making known the reason for the journey and simultaneously gaining a great deal of nationwide publicity for Phoenix and Arizona. During the course of this trip the Nominee and this group made a presentation to then President Truman, naming him as an honorary member of the Dons. Mr. Guirey was instigator of the Legend Drama concerning the "lost mine", and directed this production for several years. This presentation is made each year during annual "Don's Trek" which is a highlight of local activity pertinent to appreciation of lore and history of the State and is attended by many out-of-State visitors as well as local residents. Mr. Guirey has written articles for the nationally known publication, ARIZONA HIGHWAYS, furnishing much of the photography to illustrate the articles. This has spread abroad the entire nation a greater understanding of the rich cultural and natural heritage of our region. The Don's organization has a series of "Travelcades" each year which are unusually successful both as tourist attractions and in furthering the knowledge and enjoyment of permanent citizens in Arizona and the adjacent southwest region. For the past several years he has scheduled and shown the annual slide show for the Don's which sets forth at large public gatherings photographic presentations of the natural and cultural wonders of the area.

The Nominee has consistently over the years contributed greatly to the enjoyment and appreciation of the cultural heritage of Arizona and the Southwest on the part of local citizens and tourists alike. This has been accomplished in a way that only an Architect drawing on his knowledge of history, cultures and manifestations of such history in architectural endeavor and related creative fields can convey to those without equivalent background in the physical manifestations of human culture.

KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL (Camelback Club, Phoenix)

Among other worthwhile activities of this organization Mr. Guirey was a key member in a civic project by this group regarding the planning building of Camp Wamatachek, a summer camp in the mountains for underprivileged children.

NOMINEE'S ACHIEVEMENT IN PUBLIC SERVICE (Continued)

STATE FAIR COMMISSION

For some eight years Mr. Guirey was a member of this Commission in the capacity of Superintendent of the Hobby Department for Arizona State Fair. During this period he is credited with achieving a significant expansion of the Department both in terms of the quantity of entries and the caliber of their character and execution.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES

The Nominee was selected by this organization in 1956 to perform architectural services pertinent to the major headquarters for this organization. From 1958 to 1963 he served as a member of the Board of Directors of Goodwill Industries and in 1962 was President of that group. It was through his efforts that business sponsorships were obtained for setting out collection boxes to be stationed about the metropolitan area. These boxes annually serve as depositories for tremendous quantities of worthwhile goods to be rehabilitated and sold by Goodwill Industries for the benefit of handicapped persons working under their aegis. It is considered that it was during his tenure on the Board that the success of the \$300,000 building fund drive and ultimate significant expansion of the charity organization was able to be realized.

TONTO MULTIPLE USE ADVISORY COUNCIL OF THE TONTO NATIONAL FOREST
DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

The Nominee is a member of this Committee which members are selected as an aid to efficient administration of various programs of the Department. The Advisory group is regarded as an important factor in obtaining advice and counsel of business, agriculture and other groups for the beneficial interaction of both their operations and those of the Government Forest Service.

ARIZONA ACADEMY

The Nominee is an appointed member of this organization. The Arizona Academy was founded in 1962 to create by research and discussion an ever increasing body of citizens accustomed to the process of search analysis and the group well informed in the main facets of economical, cultural and social life of the Arizona community. It periodically brings together leaders from all areas and all walks of life to consider subjects bearing on present and future well-being of Arizona. Participating in this group the Nominee has been able to contribute something of his acumen in fields of logical as well as aesthetic planning and over-riding concern for human environment.

The Nominee has been recently appointed as a member of the Advisory Council of this group. It is a public agency established under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act in 1965, to translate educational research into usable practice.
