My dear Mr. Harringston:

We send the enclosed bill for Institute dues for the year 1934, with an explanatory letter from the President, so that you can see just what is proposed by the Board of Directors with respect to a reduction in dues for the year 1934, and readjustment of outstanding dues for the three-year period, 1931-1933.

As you will note, the proposed readjustment with respect to outstanding dues applies back as far as 1931. It does not apply to unpaid dues for the year 1930.

On the record at The Octagon it appears that your indebtedness for 1930 is \$18.75, and in addition \$75 for the years 1931, 1932, and 1933.
