The Treasurer, and the Secretary's Office, sent to you various statements of account and letters, in the hope that you would find it possible to make a remittance, in whole or in part, and thereby continue your affiliation with The American Institute of Architects and your Chapter.

It is realised that conditions in the building industry have remained on a most unfavorable basis during the past year, and for that reason the Institute made a special effort to retain your membership as long as possible.

It is believed that you will approve of the action taken. tive was to allow the dues to so increase as to make future reinstatement a heavy expense.

I am hoping very much that the circumstances which prevented you from carrying on your Institute membership will speedily change, and that you will soon be thinking of taking up your membership again. Dear Mr. Glesecke:

At Mr. Baldwin's direction, I am responding to your letter of April 11th to him, with regard to your membership in the Institute.

Am sorry to say that we were obliged to terminate your membership, and Mr. Harris's, on December 31st, under a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors at its November meeting.

That resolution was only adopted after long consideration and with much regret. The Board has been and is carrying a large number of Institute members who were indebted for two years or more on December 31, 1931.

Finally, and for the protection of the members themselves, it was decided that the memberships of those indebted for two years or more, on December 31, 1931, should be terminated so that the indebtedness would not pile up, thus making reinstatement very difficult, if not impossible.

Am sure you will appreciate the wisdom of this procedure. We have found that members who accumulate an indebtedness of \$75.00 or \$100.00 almost never come back into the Institute.

When they go out with an indebtedness of only \$50.00, the return is much simpler and easier.

The Board also authorized the Treasurer to accept notes from those former members who wished to be reinstated, and those notes, covering the indebtedness at the time of termination, may cover a period of from one to five years. If for a period greater than one year, payments will be accepted in equal installments.

The procedure for reinstatement is not complicated. If you will address a letter to the Secretary of the Institute, requesting reinstatement and attaching thereto such payment on account as you can make con⇒ veniently, with a note covering the balance - thus taking care of your indebtedness - and if that letter is sent forward through the Secretary of your Chapter with his O.K. thereon, the record is complete, except for the affirmative vote of the Board, which can be depended upon.

If you will get such a letter to this office by April 20th, the reinstatement can beacted upon by the Board at its meeting on April 22nd.

We hope this suggestion will meet with your approval.

Deer Mr. Goldsmith:

A meeting of The Executive Committee in New York and other meetings at The Octagon last week, as well as meetings here the first part of this week have delayed a response to yours of March 9.

Responding to your inquiries concerning the status of Messrs. August Watkins Harris and R. Max Brooks.

Harris, August Watkins: Owes for Institute dues for 1930 and 1931 in the amount of \$33.34. His membership was terminated December 31, 1931.

Brooks, R. Max: Elected December 12, 1942. He paid \$10.00 when his application was filed, \$5.00 of which was for the admission fee and \$5.00 for the first twelve menths of Institute dues following election.

Ordinarily, these dues for the first twelve menths are pro-rated on a quarterly basis, but we find in the correspondence a record that the Chapter desired Mr. Brooks' election to begin as of January 1, 1943, and that, apparently, it went through on a routine basis and he was elected as of December 12, 1942.

We agree with you that an adjustment should be made and therefore have credited his payment of \$5.00 - for one year's dues - as payment in full for dues for the year 1943.

With reference to admission fees - these are collected in advance of election and are not recorded on the bills for dues.

As requested, we return Mr. Brocks' old statement and attach a corrected statement, and we should appreciate it if you would forward it to him with your own supplementary word of explanation.

Deer Mr. Walling:

Responding to yours of January 3rd, concerning Mr. A. Watkins Harris, a former member of the A.I.A.:

We find that his previous membership lapsed on December 31, 1931, for non-payment of dues at which time he owed for his dues for the years 1930-1931, inclusive, in the total amount of \$33.34. He was then assigned to the West Texas Chapter, and it may be possible that there were some outstanding chapter dues at that time. This could be check with the West Texas Chapter.

If he does apply, it would be appreciated if he would fill in a new application form, since there has been such a lapse of time since his original application was filed. However, it is not necessary that the application he signed by two corporate members as required for an original applicant.

Such application should be accompanied by payment of his back dues, as given above, plus \$5.00 readmission fee; and plus one year's dues in advance. This latter amount would be \$40.00 if his income from professional service in 1950 was over \$5,000; or \$25.00 if such income was \$5,000 or less.

Further action on the application is the same as for newly-elected corporate members.

We shall be glad to give Mr. Harris' application every attention if he decides to send it in.
