

Your note of July 13th has been turned over to me by The Treasurer's Office, together with the statement for your 1959 Institute dues which you returned.

You say that you sent in your resignation as a corporate member in December, 1958, which we find is so; however, in correspondence thereafter with the Executive Secretary of the New York Chapter, to whom we had written for approval of acceptance of your resignation as required under the A.I.A By-laws, we were advised as follows:

"I had a chance to talk to Mr. Harris and would like to mention that he does not wish to sever his connections with the Institute and the New York Chapter."

I have your letter of October 9, 1959.


