A member, by virtue of his membership in The Institute, becomes a member of the chapter of The Institute within the territory of which he resides or has his place of business, as he elects, but he pays an admission fee to The Institute only. The admission fee to membership in The Institute normally is twenty-five dollars. (For 1936 this fee was reduced to five dollars.)

A member pays annual dues both to The Institute and to the chapter. The annual dues to The Institute normally are twenty-five dollars (for 1936 Institute dues were reduced to twenty dollars) and those to the chapter are fixed in its by-laws.

Normally the period between the time of filing

an application and the time it is acted on by The Board of The Institute is four months. The period will be longer if the application must be returned to the applicant for corrections or if additional exhibits of the applicant's work are required by The Board of Examiners.

If an application is denied, the amount prepaid by the applicant for annual dues and for admission fee, less five dollars for examination fee, will be returned to him.

An applicant whose application has been denied without prejudice may reapply for admission to membership a year or more after the date of The Secretary's notice to him of his non-admission.

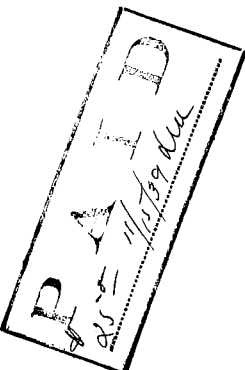




Dear Mr. Harris:





Dear Mr. Harris:

Your note of July 13th has been turned over to me by The Treasurer's Office, together with the statement for your 1959 Institute dues which you returned.

You say that you sent in your resignation as a corporate member in December, 1958, which we find is so; however, in correspondence thereafter with the Executive Secretary of the New York Chapter, to whom we had written for approval of acceptance of your resignation as required under the A.I.A. By-laws, we were advised as follows:

"I had a chance to talk to Mr. Harris and would like to mention that he does not wish to sever his connections with the Institute and the New York Chapter."

We had further correspondence with you concerning the possibility of your eligibility for election as a Member Emeritus, but found that, in view of your age, you are not eligible at this time. Hearing nothing further from you to indicate that you had reconsidered and again decided to resign, your membership, of course, has been carried throughout this year as a member in good standing, and the JOURNAL and other publications have been mailed to you. As a consequence at least one-half of your 1959 Institute dues have accrued.

Strictly speaking, those dues (in the amount of \$25.00) should be paid at this time if you wish your resignation to be considered. However, if it is your feeling that your resignation submitted last December should stand as of that date, we shall, of course, arrange to waive the 1959 dues and to accept your resignation submitted then - subject, of course, to approval of the New York Chapter.


I have your letter of October 9, 1959.
