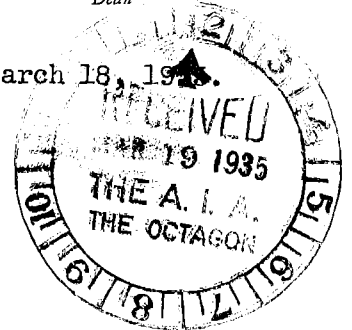

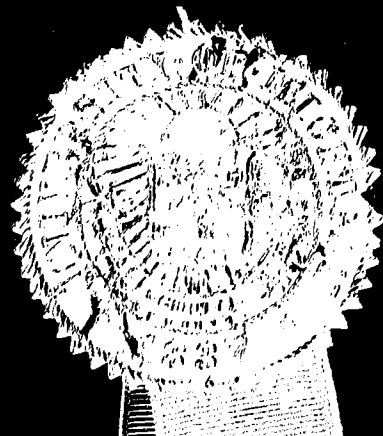



The appointment of Harold D. Hauf of New Haven as Director of the Department of Public and Professional Relations of The American Institute of Architects was announced this week in Washington by Edmund R. Purves, Executive Director of the national architectural professional organization.

Purves pointed out that Hauf comes to The Institute with a long and varied experience in the fields of architecture and architectural engineering--including private practice, teaching and research, writing and editing of architectural publications, government service, and military service with the U. S. Navy where he was assigned to the development and supervision of major construction projects. He has been closely associated with Yale University over a period of years. Hauf will take over his new duties at The Institute's Washington headquarters on February 1, 1954.

Born in Utica, New York in 1905, Hauf received a B. S. degree in Architecture from the University of Michigan in 1927, where he majored in architectural engineering; and an M. S. from Yale in 1932.

From 1927 to 1929 he was employed in private architectural offices in Ann Arbor and New York City. Appointed as an instructor at Yale in 1929, he subsequently became Associate Professor of Architectural Engineering continuing in that capacity until 1941, when he entered military service with the U. S. Navy.

- m o r e -

He was on active duty, assigned to the Bureau of Yards and Docks, from 1941 to 1945, serving as head of the Camouflage Section, in the South Pacific with Naval Construction Battalions, and as head of the Hospital Facilities Division.

After his discharge he resumed his duties at Yale, and for a five month period during 1946 took leave from the University to serve as Director of the Technical Branch of the National Housing Agency in Washington. Recalled to Yale in September of that year, he was named acting chairman of the Department of Architecture, and in June 1947, was appointed chairman and Professor of Architectural Engineering at the University.

Hauf resigned his teaching post in August 1949 to accept position as Editor-in-Chief of the "Architectural Record" and remained in that capacity until he was recalled to active duty by the Navy in May 1951, in connection with the Korea defense build-up. Assigned to the First Naval District in Boston, he served as Coordinator for Design and Construction and subsequently as Assistant District Public Works Officer.

Upon completing his term of military service in October 1952, he returned to Yale as a Research Associate and has served as technical manager of an urgent defense research project carried on by the University for the Office of Naval Research. Concurrently with his teaching and administrative work there, he has carried on a private consulting practice in the fields of architecture and building construction, chiefly in the nature of research on new materials and methods of building design and construction. He will wind up his duties at Yale by the end of the year.

Hauf is a member of The American Institute of Architects (past-president of the Connecticut Chapter), the American Society of Civil Engineers, Building Research Advisory Board of the National Research Council, Housing Research Council, ad hoc Visiting Committees of the National Architectural Accrediting Board, and is a past vice-president of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture.

He was Consulting Examiner to the Connecticut Architectural Examining Board from 1935 to 1941, and in 1947 was a Special Consultant to the Comptroller of the State of Connecticut, to reorganize procedures for handling design and construction of public buildings. He is author of "Design of Steel Buildings," first published in 1932.
