Dear Mr. Hedrick:

This will notify you that a formal charge of alleged unprofessional conduct has been filed against you by the Executive Committee of the Houston Chapter, A.I.A., for violation of Article 2 of the Mandatory Rules of The Institute, Part II of the Standards of Professional Practice, by signing a contract with the City of Mission, Texas, to provide architectural services for a proposed building with the condition that the City of Mission, Texas, would not be obligated to pay for such services if some unforeseen circumstances caused them to be unable to construct the building.

Enclosed is a copy of the provisions of the By-Laws and the Rules of The Board of Directors of The Institute which govern the procedure for handling charges of unprofessional conduct, and to which your attention is invited. Also enclosed is a copy of the Standards of Professional Practice under which the charge was filed.

The first step in the processing of the charge falls under the jurisdiction of the chapter of which the accused is an assigned member.

Therefore, the charge has been forwarded to the President of the Fort Worth Chapter, Mr. C. O. Chromaster, 403 Century Building, Fort Worth, Texas, and no doubt you will hear from him in due course.

We call to your attention that the charge is privileged and all matters concerning the procedure and acts of the Chapter and The Judiciary Committee are confidential. The Chapter Executive Committees and all parties concerned therein should treat the charges in a like manner.

OFFICES WERE LOCATED AT FORT WORTH, DALLAS, AND HOUSTON, AND IN 1942 THE FIRM HAD A PAYROLL OF 900 EMPLOYEES.

IN 1958 HIS FIRM WAS LISTED AS THE 36TH LARGEST ARCHITECTURAL FIRM IN THE UNITED STATES, BY THE ARCHITECTURAL FORUM. IN 1962 IT WAS AGAIN LISTED AS ONE OF THE TOP 50 LARGEST ARCHITECTURAL FIRMS.

AT THE TIME OF HIS DEATH, MR. HEDRICK WAS REGISTERED TO PRACTICE ARCHITECTURE IN 29 STATES.

IN 1951, ROANOKE COLLEGE, SALEM, VIRGINIA PRESENTED MR. HEDRICK A CITATION "IN RECOGNITION OF OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENTS AND SERVICES IN THE FIELD OF ARCHITECTURE AND CONSTRUCTION.

AMONG THE OUTSTANDING PROJECTS HIS FIRM EXECUTED WERE NAVAL BASES AT PORT OF SPAIN, TRINIDAD AND BRITISH GUIANA, S.A.; THE APPROXIMATELY \$221,000,000 AIR BASE AT KEFLAVIK, ICELAND; AND THE SHAMROCK HOTEL IN HOUSTON, TEXAS.

NEXT TO THE ARCHITECTURAL PROFESSION HE LOVED RANCH LIFE AND AT ONE TIME OWNED EIGHT DIFFERENT RANCHES, ONE OF WHICH WAS THE 22,000 ACRE "ANACAOH" IN KINNEY COUNTY, NEAR SPOFFORD, TEXAS, WITH ITS PRIVATE LANDING STRIP FOR HIS OWN PLANES AND THOSE OF HIS FRIENDS.

AMONG HIS HOST OF FRIENDS WERE MANY DIGNITARIES, INCLUDING SEVERAL PRESIDENTS OF THE UNITED STATES, PROFESSORS AND HEADS OF COLLEGES AND CLIENTS WHO HEADED VAST CORPORATIONS. HE WAS EQUALLY FRIENDLY WITH HIS EMPLOYEES, AND AS A FORMER EMPLOYEE WROTE MRS. HEDRICK AFTER MR. HEDRICK'S PASSING: "TO ME HE WAS A GIANT IN HIS PROFESSION. I SHALL ALWAYS REMEMBER HIS WARM HAND AND FINE SMILE WHEN HE USED TO SHAKE HANDS WITH ALL HIS DRAFTING STAFF EVERY MORNING".

HIS BUSINESS TRIPS TOOK HIM ALL OVER THE WORLD, AND IN JUNE 1963 HE WENT TO HONG KONG TO INSPECT AND ATTEND THE OPENING OF THE HONG KONG HILTON HOTEL AT THE INVITATION OF WYNNCOR LIMITED (LEO F. CORRIGAN AND TODDIE L. WYNNE OF DALLAS) AND HILTON HOTELS INTERNATIONAL. FROM THERE HE PROCEEDED TO BANAKOK, BIERUT, NEW DELHI, ROME, MADRID, PARIS AND LONDON.

We have not done anything that would particularly refer to item, "Professional literature, research, --inventions, etc." On design, we did in 1936 and 1937, a Coliseum for the City of Fort Worth that the unusual span and the treatment of this structure attracted engineers throughout the area. The building still stands as one of the outstanding Coliseums in the Southwest.

PROFESSIONAL ETHICS: The applicant has always been known for his ethical practice among employees, clients and profession.

The writer came to Texas in 1913 with Stone & Webster Engineering Corp. to handle underground work in the City of Dallas. In 1914, I formed the W. C. Hedrick Construction Co. and maintained that operation until November 1922, when I became a full partner of Sanguinet, Staats & Hedrick, Architects-Engineers, with offices in Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth. In 1925, at the retirement of partners Sanguinet & Staats, name of the business was changed to Wyatt C. Hedrick, Inc., and later to Wyatt C. Hedrick, under which name it was operated until 1956. 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TEXAS RANCHER HAS WIDE RANGE

Wyatt C. Hedrick Now Has
Interests in Many of
Nation's Industries

By WILLIAM W. FREEMAN

Wyatt C. Hedrick is a Texas rancher with a considerable list.

At the age of 16, the son of a Virginia tobacco planter of modest circumstances, he borrowed money from a neighboring farmer to put himself through a year at Roanoke college.

At 68, he owns eight ranches in Texas, some with their own airstrips for his planes and those of visitors and he has built airfields, naval bases and office buildings throughout the Southwest and abroad.

In an interview on a visit to his city a few days ago, Mr. Hedrick told how he came to operate his own fleet of airplanes, direct several concerns and, since 1922, design and engineer construction valued at \$1,200,000,000.

Mr. Hedrick directs several concerns in Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston, and is associated with others in various cities.

One of Mr. Hedrick's major projects, now nearing completion, is the Keflavik Air Base at Keflavik, Iceland, on which the construction cost is estimated at \$221,000,000. The work, which was started in 1952, is nearly done, with four dozen workers supervising a project that at one time employed many hundreds.

Over the years Mr. Hedrick has taken part in all sorts of projects. From his earliest years he was interested in building and in construction work, he said.

At the end of his first year at Roanoke College he took up shorthand and typing and became part-time secretary to the president of the college. This income enabled him to complete two more years of the four-year course. Then, again with borrowed money he went to Washington and Lee University at Lexington, Va., where he received a bachelor's degree in civil engineering in 1910.

He then took a job with Lane Brothers, railroad contractors, in Alta Vista, Va. He worked as timekeeper on a Baltimore and Ohio Railroad job in West Virginia and then as night tunnel foreman in 1913 in Baltimore on a project to divert a stream.

Company Formed

In 1913 he went to Stone & Webster Engineering Corporation in Dallas and worked on an underground project for a year. Then he formed W. C. Hedrick Construction Company in Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston. He was on his way, specializing in general building construction. In 1922, at 34, he joined Sangumet & Staats as a partner, and the name was changed to Sangumet, Staats & Hedrick, with offices in Fort Worth.

Mr. Hedrick did the construction work for Texas Technological College from 1923 to 1950; for Love Field, a 1917 project valued at \$10,000,000 that still is Dallas' leading airport; the Naval Base in Trinidad, in 1911; airfields in Kansas, Texas and Florida from 1941 through 1943 with 550 men on his staff, and Houston International Airport in 1958, a \$3,500,000 project.

Among others on the Hedrick list are an aluminum extrusion plant for the Aluminum Company of America in 1942 a \$50,000,000 project, the Atlantic Refining Company office building in Dallas, The Post-Dispatch building in Houston, and the Will Rogers Coliseum in Fort Worth.

Mr. Hedrick helps college students become architects. Each summer two or three promising architectural students work in his organization learning about the field.
