Thank you very much for your letter of February 23. If it meets with your approval, I will take your letter with me to The Board meeting next week and read it when the subject of housing comes up.

(Sec. 443)

I am enclosing a copy of Louis Justement's statement to the Senate Banking and Currency Committee. I might say that Louis presented his case so ably and argued so well that he won the admiration of both the Democratic and Republican Senators on the Committee. What he said, in effect, was that as long as we have to have a housing Bill, let's get it right. He maintained two main themes throughout the argument — one, to divorce urban redevelopment from housing and set it up properly on its own feet; and two, to grant virtual autonomy to local authorities. In other words, he was certainly not advocating federal control.

I think his presentation did The Institute a great deal of good. I learned afterwards that we were the first people that had the nerve to tell the Senate that urban redevelopment is something that they cannot treat lightly, and that it does not belong in a housing Bill.

I hope you and Mrs. Heitschmidt will come to Houston, as it would be good to see you again.

Dear Earl:

Thank you very much for your nice letter of February 7th, and all the good things you said.

I do not believe the origin of this emergency lies in politics, at least not in American politics, although it certainly had its genesis in international and power politics, or what the Germans call "weltpolitik." However, it was inevitable that American politics would creep into the situation as it progressed, and I think without doubt they already have done so. Witness the present controversy between Senator Taft and General Eisenhower.

Both major parties will now probably use the situation as best they can to their own immediate advantage.

But I still think the emergency would have been upon us, regardless of whether we had a Republican administration instead of the Democratic administration now in power.

With its attendant restrictions and controls the impact of the situation on the construction industry threatens to become more severe every day. We are told that there lies ahead of us, however, sufficient construction to engage practically the entire construction industry, including the architectural profession. The form of that engagement probably will be quite different from the practice that was anticipated one or two years ago, especially by the younger members of the profession. We will do out best to see to it that the profession is kept engaged and on the most equitable basis possible.

The Jim Follin story is a long one. If you see Ralph Walker on the West Coast he can tell you about it as he has the inside information. I have too, but it is rather long to attempt to put it into a letter. Suffice to say that Jim got mad and frustrated, picked up his marbles and went home. He is still in the government and now back with the GSA.

We are planning to come out to Chicago and look forward very much to seeing you and Mrs. Heitschmidt.

Dear Ralph:

Am extremely sorry that my little note to you of March 30 caused you so much concern. However, I can very well appreciate the thought and study you have put into the problem and also realize what has happened in New York City. However, in our little country village out here, we have property values as high as some of those on Lower Manhattan Island, and are unable to develop them economically because of this high cost. We are not planning for additional areas in buildings, - all we wanted to do was be permitted to perhaps use the same areas in a different manner but not limited to 150 feet in height. By so doing, it will be possible to develop better light and air in our narrow and congested streets without further congesting the traffic.

Our problem has been given considerable thought, and has the support of a great many in the Profession. We think it would make our city much more inteesting, and would certainly aid in getting better light and air to our streets, so contrary to your fine arguments, we will continue to carry on the battle with the hope that some day we will come to an agreeable settlement with the building owners and managers who are opposing our ideas.

I am looking forward to seeing you in Chicago when you are relieved of your arduous duties which have taken so much of your time. We are all deeply grateful to you for contributing this time to the Institute, and appreciate very effort you have made in our behalf. You have given us a very conscientious and inspiring Administration for which I want to personally express my appreciation and thanks.

Purves, we have made several inquiries concerning the progress of the Electrical Union workers' strike in the Otis Elevator Company plant in Yonkers.
