NATIONAL COUNCIL OF ARCHITECTURAL REGISTRATION BOARDS: While serving for six years on the Board, Hesson's leadership was instrumental in adopting NCARB goals of:

- facility of reciprocal registration
- standardization of the Architectural Registration Examination
- requirement of a professional degree for certification
- universal acceptance of the Intern Development Program

SAN ANTONIO HISTORIC REVIEW BOARD: As a Mayoral appointed member of the City Historic Review Board, Hesson was responsible for introducing a policy that promoted preservation of the best examples of nineteenth century residences in the King William Historic District. This policy set the example for historic preservation of neighborhoods throughout the City.

PUBLIC EDUCATOR OF ARCHITECTS "PRACTICE ACT": Since the passage of the Texas "Practice Act" in 1989, Hesson has been actively involved in educating the Public on how the law affects them. He planned and organized a symposium that included representatives from all sectors of the community to discuss contractual relationships between Owners, Architects, and Contractors and how the law pertains to negotiating these contracts.

INTERN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM: Hesson has dedicated much of his time and effort toward the promotion of the IDP. Through his presentations to state registration boards and student groups, the number of jurisdictions participating in IDP has doubled.

CHAIRMAN OF 1985 ANNUAL MEETING OF NCARB: As Convention Chairman of the 64th Annual meeting of NCARB, Hesson organized and coordinated the meeting arrangements, mayor's welcoming address, social functions and visitor accommodations. The convention was acclaimed to be one of the most successful meetings in the history of NCARB.

TEXAS BOARD OF ARCHITECTURAL EXAMINERS: As Chairman of the TBAE, Hesson initiated early efforts to enact a "Practice Act" for Texas which resulted in the passage of the legislation in 1989.

EXEMPLARY LEADERSHIP ON NATIONAL COUNCIL OF ARCHITECTURAL REGISTRATION BOARDS

Hesson dedicated six years as Texas representative to the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards. During this time, he advocated and took floor leadership roles in several major issues, including the requirement of a professional degree for certification by NCARB, standardization of the architects registration examination, and mandatory requirement of the Intern Development Program as a prerequisite for registration.

PROMOTED "PRACTICE ACT" AS CHAIRMAN OF TEXAS BOARD OF ARCHITECTURAL EXAMINERS

Governor William Clements appointed Hesson to the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners in 1979. During a six year term on the TBAE, Paul Hesson was elected Chairman for one term and Vice Chairman for two terms. Under his leadership as Chairman, the initial efforts towards passing the first "Practice Act" in the State were launched. These early efforts were rewarded by the enactment of the legislation in 1989. During his tenure on the Board, more than 1,000 candidates were examined annually for registration.

FORMULATED POLICY FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION IN SAN ANTONIO

In 1970, Mayor Walter W. MacAlister presented Paul Hesson with a citation for his dedication to the San Antonio Historic Review Board from 1968-1970. Representing the Architects in the community, Hesson was responsible for reviewing and formulating policy for the preservation of historic structures within the City. A major accomplishment was his initiating a program that promoted the preservation of the Cities best examples of nineteenth century residences in the now famous King William area. This program established a guideline for the historic preservation of other neighborhoods throughout San Antonio.

LEADING ADVOCATE OF INTERN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

During six years as a member of the National Coordinating Committee of the Intern Development Program, Hesson earned the reputation of a most dedicated advocate of the program. Through his numerous presentations to state registration boards and student groups throughout the United States, he was able to convey the advantages of the program not only to his colleagues, but to the interns seeking the experience necessary for successfully passing the registration examination. His efforts resulted in the number of jurisdictions employing the program doubling during his tenure. To strengthen his background of intern programs, Hesson met with members of the Royal Institute of British Architects to discuss the effectiveness of their program.

**1985 CHAIRMAN OF SOUTHERN CONFERENCE OF
NATIONAL COUNCIL OF ARCHITECTURAL
REGISTRATION BOARDS**

In 1985, the nominee was elected Chairman of the Southern Conference of the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards representing Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Florida. As Chairman of the Conference, he led the organization and coordination of all aspects of the meeting including; meeting arrangements, social functions, and visitor accommodations. He involved the local community by arranging for Mayor Henry Cisneros to deliver the welcoming address to the delegation. At the conclusion of the Conference it was hailed as one of the most successful meetings in the history of NCARB.

**CITY OF SAN ANTONIO CONSTRUCTION
CONTRACT TASK FORCE**

Hesson was called upon by the City to represent the local architects as a mediator in construction contract negotiations between the City and building construction trades. His contributions resulted in an agreement between the parties that addressed the concerns of all interests.

**CITY OF SAN ANTONIO CAPITAL
IMPROVEMENTS BOND PROGRAM**

The City of San Antonio requested the representation by the nominee once again to assist with the 1980 Capital Improvements Bond Program. Hesson was instrumental in promoting the capital needs for the improvement of public facilities and urban design within the City.

**PUBLIC EDUCATOR OF ARCHITECTS "PRACTICE
ACT"**

During the last eighteen months, the nominee has been actively involved in the education of the public regarding the recently enacted Practice Act". He planned and organized a symposium that included representatives from all sectors of the community to discuss contractual relationships between Owners, Architects, and Contractors and how the new law affects each one of them.

This home, designed as his personal residence reflects a modern interpretation of the Texas colonial character of the development in which it is located.

The paved and landscaped motor court serve as a dramatic transition zone between the street and entrance to the house. Stucco walls and a standing seam roof were chosen as traditional building materials with glass block used for the introduction of natural light. Traditional building forms are also repeated with the use of dormer windows and a columned veranda running the full length of the rear portion of the house.

The main living areas of the house are interconnected by the use of a two story gallery. This connection of spaces is repeated externally with through the design of the veranda. Together they create a stunning openness throughout the house, without destroying the intimacy and warmth of the individual areas.

This automobile dealership designed for the sale of expensive luxury cars required a setting that was an appropriate backdrop for the quality of product the company was marketing. Located along a major expressway, the design utilizes a trellised canopy structure to extend the showroom to the access road. The introduction of carefully placed landscaping maintains the important visibility of the automobile display area yet softens the harshness of the South Texas climate.

Polished floor tile is used in the showroom to reflect the automobiles on display and to project an image of quality. Sales offices are separated by the use of glass block walls to create an open feel throughout the space.

The service area is screened by the interior showroom and office areas.

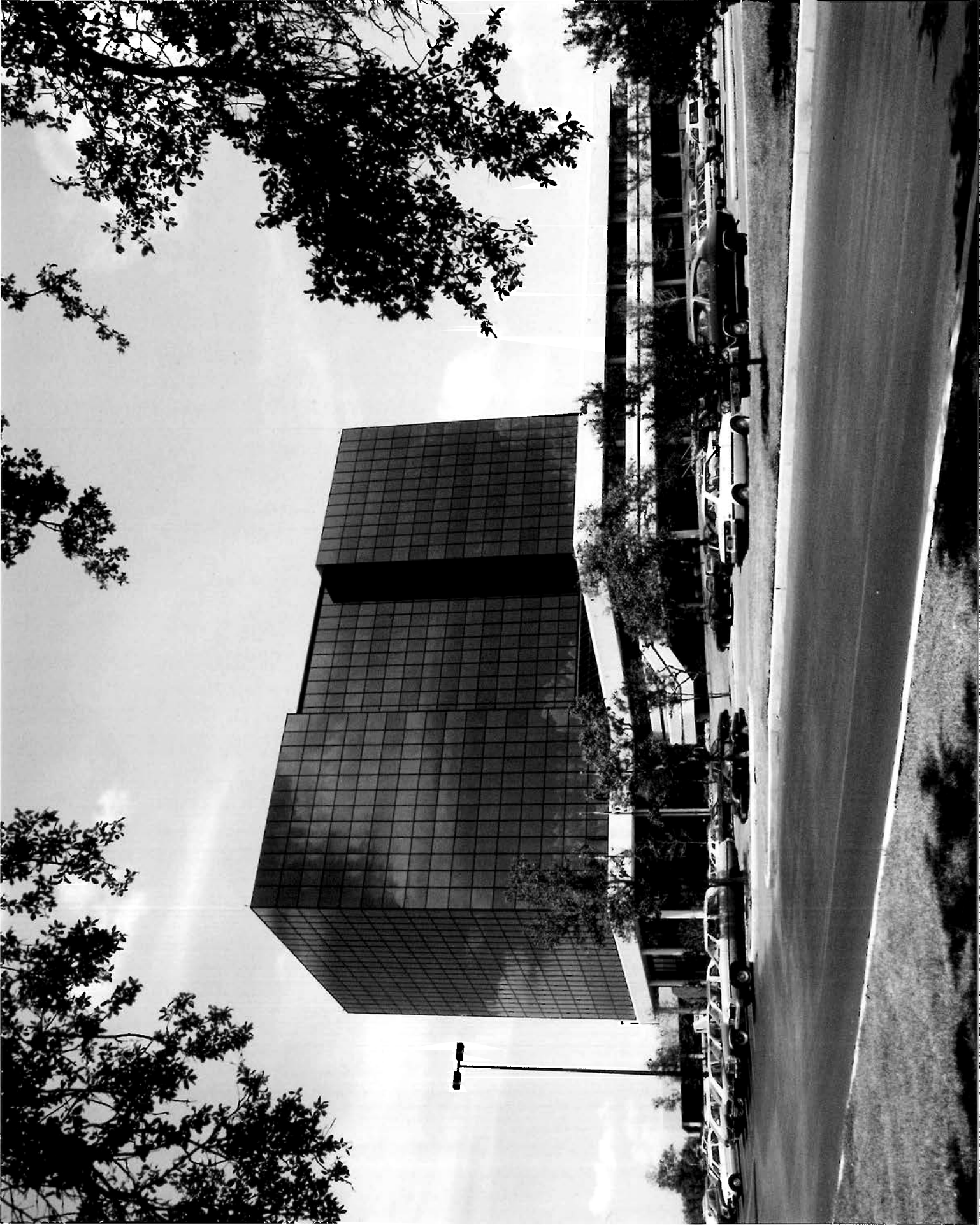

The Corporate Square Office Complex was designed as a speculative office development totaling 265,000 square feet. The project was built in two phases with the initial phase being a two-story 65,000 square foot garden office. The first phase design elements were repeated in phase two to provide continuity and serve as a base to the ten-story reflective glass tower.

The glass line is recessed at the first two levels providing visual depth to the structures and solar protection for the tinted glass at these areas. A three-story atrium lobby provides a spacious entrance to the tower. Parking is provided on site and within a parking structure strategically located at the rear of the office buildings.

Included in the design is an entry gallery that is a showcase for the districts trophies and awards. The Districts athletic department is located within the facility.

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
