Dear Mr. Ferrar:

Responding to your letter of November 24th, received this morning, relative to Mr. F. A. Henninger, Institute member assigned to the Nebraska Chapter, who is indebted for dues for 1939 in the amount of \$20.00 -

Retirement or election to Membership Emeritus is not automatic, but must be by action of The Board of Directors on application of the member qualified for such retirement.

Up to January 1, 1939, Mr. Henninger had the required fifteen years of good standing for such retirement. Under the established procedure, if he should sign and send in the enclosed application it could be submitted to The Board at its meeting in 1940 just preceding the convention. The Board has the power to make such retirement or remission of dues retroactive, and his election as a Member Emeritus could be made effective as of January 1, 1939, should The Board be so disposed. This would have the effect of remitting his Institute and chapter dues for 1939 and 1940 - as well as all future dues.

We do not have information as to his standing in the chapter; but he should be in good standing therein, as well as in The Institute.

In the above event, if his 1939 dues are not paid by December 31, Mr. Henninger's membership will be in suspense in 1940 until the dues are remitted.

This is merely a suggestion and the only course we can find which would preserve his membership unless he continues to pay the dues required of all corporate members.


