OBITUARY.

Alfred W. Hertz, a Charter Member of the Kansas City Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, was born in Kansas City, Missouri, December second, 1883, and died there March thirty-first, 1945.

Mr. Hertz took his degree at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1906. He was employed as draftsman by well known firms in the East, particularly in New York, before returning to his home in Kensas City.

He was employed locally as designer and draftsman and as such he established himself as a competent architect of pleasing personality.

Later he, with the late John VanBrunt A.I.A., formed the firm of Van Brunt and Hertz, doing Y.M.C.A. work and much of interest in the Country Club district of Kansas City, including several notable residences.

For many years Mr. Hertz was a Deacon and Trustee of the First Congregational Church of Kansas City. He was highly esteemed by his fellow craftsmen; other friends will remember him for his integrity and as a sincere and lovable man. His associates in the Kansas City chapter deplore his accidental and untimely death and offer our condolences to his bereaved Mother and brother, Gustav C. Hertz of Washington, D. C.
