I have your letter of February 17th relative to my privileged communication regarding Institute application of Mr. Arthur H. Hoddick.

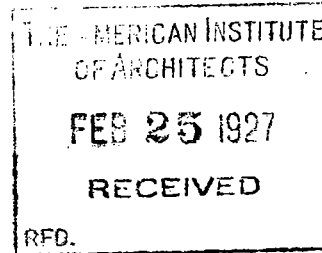

Dear Mr. Hoddick:

This will acknowledge your letter of January 14th concerning your dues in default.

We have your letter of January 9, with reference to your account for Institute dues.

According to the records of this office, your payment of January 29 for \$15.00 was received on the 31st and was credited to dues for 1934.

On December 31, 1936, we received your payment of \$15.00 to cover your note in that amount for 1935 dues.

This leaves an outstanding balance of \$20 for 1936 dues, in default on December 31. 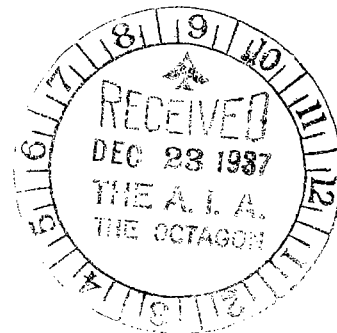
