



Six Good Years of Homsey

Without Samuel E. Homsey the Zoning and Planning Commission of New Castle County will continue to function. There is no reason why the men of caliber on those two boards should not take the county forward in the work of examining plats for new construction, holding hearings, and making decisions. But we confess it will be hard to imagine all this going on month after month, year after year, without Mr. Homsey's special brands of imagination, dedication, and judicial temperament,

Mr. Homsey, the architect, resigned last July from the Zoning Commission soon after accepting appointment for a second five-year term. An original member of that agency, he resigned because of pressure of private work. He remained on the Planning Commission. Now, just before expiration of his term on that body, he says he will not be available for reappointment.

This time his many admirers will see no chance of prevailing on him to stay in service. His excuse that he has to be out of the country more than in the past must be accepted. With his architect wife, he is supervising the construction of buildings they designed for the U. S. Embassy in Tehran, capital of Iran.

Some call Mr. Homsey a dreamer and an idealist—and these people fall into two kinds. His friends admire him for his devotion to working for the orderly and sightly growth of this region. The other group are his critics. They include persons who have felt the force of his opposition to what they wanted to do in distorting or invading established land use for their own special interests.

If you ask us what kind of idealism it is that Mr. Homsey practices, we'd reply this way: He has no patience, intellectually, with anything which his education, common sense, and taste tell him is bad for the community as it grows. Nor has he patience with the kind of self-seeking and selfish persons who are out to make

a fast dollar with no regard for the future residential or commercial destiny of the county. But he has shown endless patience in dealing with people, housing developers, or industrial firms who demonstrate a desire to fit their projects into the community.

If he was regarded by many as "Mr. Zoning" himself in the formative years of it here in Delaware, the county and state are fortunate. He leaves many a good guidepost from his active service. We hope he will keep on offering whatever advice and counsel he may think the community needs as time goes on.

The Institute's committee structure has become so cumbersome and complicated that not only were we functioning inefficiently but also the financial burden of supporting the committees prevented us from engaging in other needed services to the members. The Board therefore had a study made for the purpose of streamlining our organization. This study recommended a number of changes which have been put into effect. These changes included the abolishment of some committees and reductions in personnel in others.

The Committee on School Buildings has now become a standing vertical committee of only five members. The reduction naturally entails disappointment to those loyal and devoted members who have not been designated to continue on the committee. Personnel decisions were difficult in the extreme, as virtually without exception all members of committees have made substantial contributions to the welfare of the profession and prestige of The Institute.

Selections of those to continue was made by The Board by ballot - in many instances only after prolonged balloting.

Although you have not been selected to continue, The Board has requested me to convey to you its deep gratitude for the service you have rendezed and expresses the hope that in the not too distant future further opportunity will be given to call upon you again.


