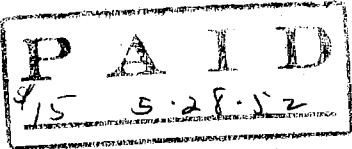

DARIEN, Conn., May 24-- James S. Hornbeck, ⁽⁶³⁾an architect and a former senior editor of Architectural Record, the professional magazine published by McGraw-Hill, Inc., died yesterday at his home, 18 Granaston Lane, after a long illness. He had retired from the Record staff in 1968 for reasons of health.

Mr. Hornbeck, who was also the author of the book, "Design for Modern Merchandising," published by F. W. Dodge Corporation in 1954, had joined the staff of Architectural Record in 1952, after 19 years of experience in architectural education and practice. His practice experience included two and-a-half years with Harrison & Abramovitz and three years with Skidmore, Owings & Merrill in New York.

After getting his B.S. in Architecture at Penn State University in 1931, Mr. Hornbeck taught for five years at Penn State before doing graduate work in architecture at the Harvard Graduate School of Design. His interest in teaching continued, and after joining the Record staff he taught design theory for several years in the evening program of the Columbia University School of Architecture. His professional experience included two years with the Manhattan Engineer District, with wartime work on design and development of industrial buildings at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

MORE

Mr. Hornbeck was a member emeritus of the American Institute of Architects. As an A.I.A. member for many years, he had been active on such committees of the New York Chapter, A.I.A., as Architectural School Liaison, Esthetics, Publications and the Arnold W. Brunner Scholarship. Mr. Hornbeck had also been a member of the Architectural League of New York and had served as editor of the League's News-Bulletin and as chairman of its Membership Committee.

Survivors include his widow, the former Helen Miller (State College) of ~~CHEN/BERN~~, Pa.; a son, Geoffrey H. Hornbeck of New York; a daughter, Miss Christina ^(L.)/Hornbeck of Darien; and a brother, Richard M. Hornbeck of Pittsburgh.

A memorial service will be held on Wednesday (May 26) at 11 A.M. at the Noroton Presbyterian Church chapel. In lieu of flowers, friends may contribute to the memorial fund of the Noroton Presbyterian Church or to the Intensive Care Unit of the Stamford Hospital.

JAMES HORNBECK, WROTE ON DESIGN

Architecture Teacher and
Editor Is Dead at 63

DARIEN, Conn., May 24—
James S. Hornbeck, an architect and a former senior editor of Architectural Record, a professional magazine, died yesterday at his home, 18 Granaston Lane, after a long illness. He was 63 years old.

Mr. Hornbeck retired from The Record, which is published by McGraw-Hill, Inc., in 1968 for reasons of health. He was the author of the book, "Design for Modern Merchandising," published by the F. W. Dodge Corporation in 1954.

He was born in Greenville, Pa., and graduated in 1931 as an architect from Penn State University, where he taught five years, before doing graduate work in architecture at the Harvard Graduate School of Design.

His practical experience included 2½ years with Harrison & Abramovitz, and three years with Skidmore, Owings & Merrill in New York. He worked for the Manhattan Engineer District during World War II, and helped design and develop industrial buildings at Cal-Ridge, Tenn.

After joining The Record, he taught design theory for several years in the evening program of the Columbia University School of Architecture.

Mr. Hornbeck had been a member of the American Institute of Architects and the Architectural League of New York, and had edited the League's news-bulletin.

Survivors include his widow, the former Helen Miller; a son, Geoffrey of New York; a daughter, Christina, and a brother, Richard M. Hornbeck of Pittsburgh.

A memorial service will be held at 11 A.M. Wednesday at the Noroton Presbyterian Church Chapel.
