

Your dues to The Institute and the chapter will continue during the period of your suspension.

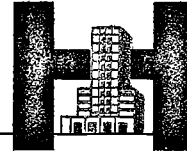
