Larry Melillo has served the profession at local, state and national levels for over twenty-five years. He first served his AIA chapter as treasurer, secretary, and vice-president before moving to the national scene as a member of the AIA's Urban Design and Planning Committee. He was one of the earliest architects in the AIA to recognize the enormous potential of the R/UDAT program for improving America's quality of life. He not only served as chairman of numerous R/UDATS and chaired the R/UDAT program for many years, but has been a member of the R/UDAT task force for 20 years. Possibly his greatest contribution has been his leadership in defining the architect's role in disaster assistance. After years of hands-on work and analysis of the devastation and human tragedy caused by natural disasters, he coauthored the AIA's national disaster policy statement in 1978. He is currently updating this policy handbook. He now chairs a subcommittee that recently completed a handbook entitled "Creating a Design Assistance Team for Your Community" which applies grassroots principles to the R/UDAT program. In private practice since 1961, his outstanding work includes Urban Design projects as well as architectural achievements. One of his many notable successes is his design of the highly acclaimed public waterfront on the Ohio river in the heart of Louisville. This was one of the earliest waterfront reclamation projects in the nation, and set a standard for public process and excellence that has stood the test of time and public enjoyment.

## 2.4. Describe how the nominee's work may be considered notable and how it has advanced the profession of architecture.

Larry Melillo's greatest contribution to the profession has been in two program areas of the Institute which he has helped develop into very successful programs for the profession. These programs are the Regional/Urban Design Assistance Team (R/UDAT) and Disaster Assistance programs.

#### R/UDAT Program

Larry became involved in the R/UDAT program in 1969, while a member of the Urban Design Committee. On becoming Chairman, he significantly restructured the program, enabling the Institute to expand the scope and quality of the program. One idea which he initiated was that of a team approach to the administration of the program. This provided a more efficient and comprehensive service to the cities requesting R/UDAT visits. He also developed a much larger, more diverse and better qualified pool of professionals in many disciplines from across the nation for R/UDAT team special-He edited the early guidelines and publications making them more comprehensive and easier to implement. committee process which he initiated is currently called the R/UDAT Task Group. He has been a member of the Task Group since its inception and has chaired 5 R/UDAT visits, reconnoitered and assisted in many others over the last 20 years.

#### Disaster Assistance Program

Possibly Larry's greatest contribution to the profession is his initiation of the Disaster Assistance Program of the AIA. When Larry was chairman of the R/UDAT program in 1972, he received a call from the Mayor of Rapid City,SD, which had previously been visited by R/UDAT. The Mayor asked for a team revisit because of a devastating flood and the city needed immediate help. There was no immediate response program of the AIA so from this request, Larry organized the AIA Disaster Assistance program as a subcommittee of the AIA Urban Design Committee. He became the first Chairman. wrote the first set of AIA guidelines which were used to administer the program from 1972 - 1978 when an official AIA handbook on disasters was published under the guidance and co-authorship of Larry. This publication is the current policy statement of the AIA and is currently being updated under Larry's direction. Over the years Larry has assisted many communities throughout the country with their disaster problems including the WV Governor's office and the WV State Society of Architects and their 1985 floods. Larry also visited Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands as an AIA team member to assist in the Hurricane Hugo disaster. The Disaste‡ Assistance Program of the AIA has been developed by Larry from a phone call in 1972 into a full time 24 hour a day funded program. Disaster Assistance is a major program of the AIA.

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#### **FOREWORD**

The Old Louisville Renewal Plan is based solidly on the fact that many people still living in an old section of the city wish to stay there. Only, they lack the knowledge of over-all planning to keep their area a desirable place in which to live. Also, even if they had this knowledge, they — and newcomers — do not possess the ways and means of carrying it out. A valuable living-space is well on the way to destruction.

This is where urban renewal comes in. But it should not come, wisely equipped with predetermined ideas. Its function is to ask and then to merge understanding with training and imagination.

This book is an attempt to explain just that fact, neither with arrogance nor with dishonest humbleness. Indeed, the emphasis intends to avoid either and in their place to show reasonably how Old Louisville can and should still function as a happy habitation for many sorts and conditions of men — not as a museum piece, either for the viewer or the setting for the lover of old things for their own sake (although if some wish location here, they are welcome). But it will be essentially a home for all people. As a corollary, the renewal acknowledges the growing desire of many to live within cities. There is an urban, as well as a rural, persistency of pride and satisfaction in house and garden.
