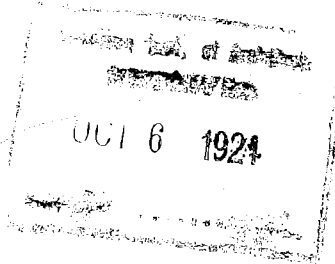

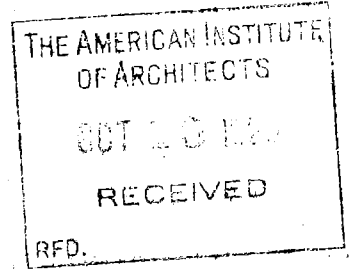

Dear Mr. Kemper,

One of the members of the Chapter has asked me to look into the matter of membership in the Institute of one John F. Jackson, 137 East 45th Street.

It appears, according to my informant, that Jackson was a member of the Institute but was dropped for non-payment of dues some time during the War or afterwards. According to my informant, he was in difficult financial situation on account of the health of his daughter and for other reasons and had asked to be carried and allowed to pay his arrears of dues later on. According to my informant, this was refused him and he was dropped from the rolls of the Institute.

According to the same source of information, Jackson appears to have made application recently for admission and appears to have been told that he could be reinstated upon paying the arrears of dues. This seems to have made him peevish. He claims that they are now offering to let him do what he once offered to do and was refused permission to do.

Will you look up the original records and give me the facts in the matter? It seems that I originally endorsed Jackson and they tell me that if I speak to him I can smooth him out and get him to make his application in due form or do whatever is necessary to get back in the Institute. Of course, I know nothing about what happened at the time of his dropping out and I want to know more about that before I take any action in the matter.

At present it seems that Jackson refuses to pay up back dues and is going to do nothing about coming back in the Institute because he is mad. What do you know about the case?

Attendance at the Executive Committee meeting in Providence has delayed a reply to yours of October 14, concerning Mr. John F. Jackson, former Institute member.

It is found that he was dropped by the Executive Committee of the Institute in August, 1920, on the recommendation of the New York Chapter. The Chapter stated that Mr. Jackson was then indebted for Chapter dues for more than two years. He was also indebted to the Institute for \$60.00 on account of dues for 1918, 1919 and 1920.

In 1924 Mr. Jackson made an application de novo which was forwarded through the New York Chapter. We wrote to him on October 7 concerning the procedure to be followed in applying for reinstatement. Copy of that letter is enclosed and it brings his record up to date - so far as we have it at the Octagon.



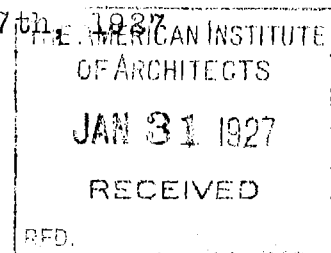

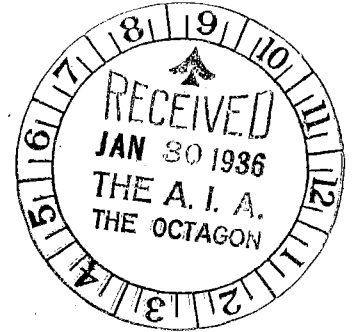

Dear Mr. Jackson:

This will acknowledge your letter of January 29th concerning your dues in default.

The Board appreciates that there may be difficulty in making cash payment in full at this time, and desires to aid you as far as it can in retaining your membership in the Institute.

To help in this way, the Treasurer is authorized to accept your note in payment of the indebtedness, provided you will make a partial payment on account.

In order to retain your membership we are required to have coverage of your delinquent dues by January 31st. For your convenience, we are sending herewith a note, without interest, payable on or before December 31, 1936, which covers your indebtedness except for a difference of \$5.00 which should be paid now by check.

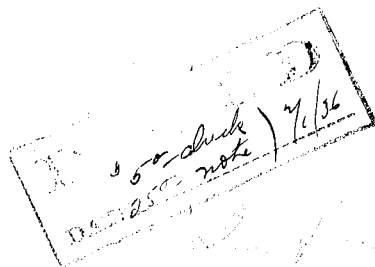
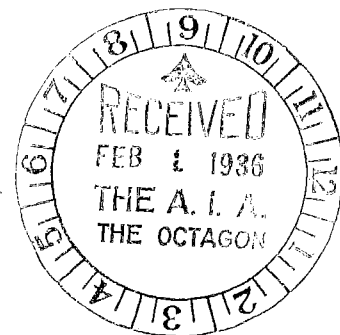
