

I have just received your letter regarding application for corporate membership from L. Quincy Jackson.

Our Chapter, after investigating an applicant's qualifications, reads the name of applicants at three successive Chapter meetings prior to taking final action. Mr. Jackson's name was read at the April meeting. Subsequently, the Secretary received letters from two of our corporate members protesting what they considered unethical procedure by Mr. Jackson. His firm is titled "Associated Architects and Engineers" and these two members believe that Mr. Jackson is the only licensed person in the office. Following receipt of the letters, our President turned the matter over to the State Board of Architectural and Engineering Examiners for investigation. They have not reported back their findings as yet. Consequently, Mr. Jackson's name was not read at this month's meeting and will not be read again until this matter has been clarified.

I think I am correct when I say that no one in the Chapter wants him as a fellow member - I guess we would just as soon have him as Martin Luther King. You can be assured that the investigation is not a delaying action. The Chapter is resigned to the fact that it cannot keep the man out if he is a legitimate applicant.

Dear Miss Swan:

I apologize for the delay in responding to the Request for Transfer of the Corporate Membership of Mr. L. Quincy Jackson from the Detroit Chapter to the Middle Tennessee Chapter. This particular matter had some extenuating circumstances which needed to be checked out before our Executive Committee was able to make a proper decision.

In an attempt to inform you of the findings, I will summarize them as follows:

1. Mr. L. Quincy Jackson submitted an application for Corporate Membership to the Middle Tennessee Chapter, AIA on December 18, 1964. It was followed by the usual letters of recommendation from the references listed in the application. None of these expressed any objections to consideration of Mr. Jackson for membership.
2. In April, 1965, letters were received by the Executive Committee from seven members of the Chapter expressing objection to Mr. Jackson being granted membership because of alleged unethical behavior on the part of Mr. Jackson. It was the understanding of these members that Mr. Jackson had been approaching clients and potential clients representing himself as both an Architect and an Engineer, and that he was practicing under the firm name of "Associated Architects and Engineers." Since Mr. Jackson was not a registered engineer, and no registered engineer listed Mr. Jackson's firm as his business affiliation in the Tennessee State Board's 1965 Roster or in the, then current, telephone directory, this warranted the action of the seven members to file their objection.
3. In May, 1965, further action on Mr. Jackson's application was postponed until the State Board for Licensing Architects and Engineers had an opportunity to check the matter out.
4. On May 19, 1965, Mr. Jackson sent to the State Board a list of principals and consultants affiliated with his firm. This list consisted of two registered Architects (including Mr. Jackson) and one registered engineer as a principal of the firm and one registered engineer as a consultant to the firm.
4. On June 2, 1965, another letter from Mr. Jackson to the State Board provided supplementary information with respect to the previously mentioned list of principals and consultants. In part it read, "please be informed that the firm of Associated Architects and Engineers, Inc., at a meeting on May 22, 1965 voted to elect Mrs. Yvonne Y. Clark, Engineer License No. 4144,

as a principal and stockholder to its organization." The letter continued, "Mrs. Clark will be our replacement of Dean Napoleon Johnson, whom we lost by death several months ago." Dean Napoleon Johnson was the engineer listed as a principal of the firm in the May 19, 1965 letter to the State Board. Copies of both of these letters were sent to the Chapter Secretary.

5. At their meeting on July 14, 1965, the Executive Committee of the Middle Tennessee Chapter authorized one of its members to consult with an attorney about this matter, and to write a letter rejecting Mr. Jackson's application.

6. In the minutes of the September 8, 1965 meeting of the Executive Committee is reference to a meeting between the authorized representative of the Chapter and Mr. Jackson to discuss the application, and the decision to keep the application forms on file, but to return the check that accompanied the application to Mr. Jackson.

7. On September 14, 1965 the check was returned to Mr. Jackson.

I hope that this summary is adequate. There has been no further attempt on the part of Mr. Jackson to re-apply for membership with the Middle Tennessee Chapter.

The presently active Executive Committee of the Middle Tennessee Chapter has taken into account that Mr. Jackson's firm no longer operates under the name of "Associated Architects and Engineers." It is now known as "L. Quincy Jackson and Associates, Inc." and is listed in the telephone directory under "Architects". Further, no one on the Executive Committee knows of any recent incidents wherein Mr. Jackson knowingly misrepresented his firm's qualifications or the extent of professional services it offered.

The Executive Committee of the Middle Tennessee Chapter, AIA has, therefore, decided to approve the Request for Transfer of the Corporate Membership of Mr. L. Quincy Jackson. This decision is motivated by the abovementioned current situation, and by his being considered worthy of membership by the Detroit Chapter, AIA.


